New light was thrown on the Brownsville raid by the court of inquiry in its session here today and a number of here-to-fore un developed points were brought out, all of which areclaimed to be detrimental to the cause of the hegro soldiers charged with shooting up the town. Celso Olivere, a former policeman, and Manuel Morales, formerly a tail or at the post, were the principal witnesses.
Olivere testified that he saw Captain Macklin, whom he knew well, picking up scattered cartrid ges the morning after the raid At the former inquiry, Captain Macklin testified the shells were ound in one place, it being al. eged they were placed there by citizens in support of a conspir acy. Morales told of a conversafter the raid, in which the nes been wounded, as the Americans vere the only ones the negro troops "were after"

 was Joseph K. Powers of San Antonio, former keeper of the National cemetery at Ft. Brown
## Powers said he had a conversa

tion with Major Penrose follow
ing the shooting, quoting the lat
ter as saying he would rather have lost his right arm than have had his men do the shooting, and he would give a years pay te now which of the soldiers did it. That the officers know who did the shooting, was testified to in addition to the above, Mrs. Kate Leahy, whosaid Lieutenant Greer told her the ofticers recognized the reports of the high-power rifles, but were afraid to leave their families to investigate, be eving that the soldiers were fighting among themselves, as on previous occasions
The court of inquiry concluded its hearing here late today and adjourned to meet at a later date in Washington. Theinquiry wi be completed by hearing such discharged soldiers as may apply for reinstate $n=n t$ in the army and who will be callel to testify

\section*{peLiy is atekl <br> The following lispatch appear} ed in the Dallas News last Saturday under a Dalhart date line:Three cars of steel rails for track laying on the Enid, Ochiltree \& Western Railroad arrived Wednesday, sufficient to push the road a little further toward the first station out from Dalhart to the east. This is the first steel to arr r in two weeks, it being claimed by the steel mill people at Chicago that while they are running their mills day and night trying to catch up with orders, it is impossible to do so, the orders ahead of the Dalhart road's order, for Texas mileage alone, being sufticient to keep their mills running six months, not to figure in Oklahoma and other nearby states. This delay in getting steel is seriously ham pering the track work on the Enid, Ochiltree \& Western, and will doubtlessly delay the com pletion of the first thirteen miles some weeks beyond the date set, which was Jan. 1st. In the meantime, many new ties are received every day and are being placed on the grade, while the graders are now pushed several miles


beyond Dumas, the Moorecounty capital. Since Nov. 1st the Oklahoma end of the road has been organized at Enid, and the Commercial club of that place reports very satisfactory progress in the work of raising the stock and bonus for the 130 miles of the road which will be built in Okla
