TRAPS OF THE DEVIL

A Straight-out Talk Which Should be Read and Heeded

The cigarette is not only a coffin screw, but one of the favored instruments of the devil, declares Rev. Clovis Chappell, pastor of the Weatherford Street Methodist church. In discussing the topic of, "Traps of the Devil" Mr. Chappell said:

"I know few higher authorities than Thomas A. Edison, the great inventor and a man of the most wonderful physical endurance and he has the following to say of the deadly cigarette: 'When paper and tobacco are burned together a deadly gas is formed which tends to kill the moral film of the brain.' Other investigators have said that the boy who smokes cigarettes can not keep up with his classes and suffers his mental capacity to be dwarfed and his health to be unimpaired. A continued and constant use of the cigarette will render him totally unreliable, untruthful and dishonest, and at last he'll become so depraved that he will commit almost any crime that does not require too much exertion."

At this point the minister read a letter from the Superintendent of the North Texas Hospital for the insane, in which the statement was made that the cigarette will warp, blunt and destroy the better nature of a boy and if he uses them long enough his soul and spiritual nature will be entirely dominated by his physical propensities. Loss of energy and total disregard for the rights of others were some of the other results depicted in the letter as following the constant use of cigarettes.

In conclusion Mr. Chappell said: "Parents owe it to themselves, their children and to society and to good government to exact implicit obedience from their children. They should keep them out of the devil's traps, and point them instead to the footprints of the lowly Nazarene. Teaching them at all times the lessons from the Bible that will enlighten them and enable them to avoid all traps of the wicked one."

THE LORD'S PRAYER

A Beautiful Version made in 1823 and Picked Up During the Civil War.

The following beautiful composition was captured during the war at Charleston, S. C. It was printed on very heavy satin, July 4, 1823. This copy, says the New York Journal, was taken from the original, and was picked up by A. P. Green of Auburn, Ind., in Corinth, Miss., the morning the Confederate forces evacuated it, May 30, 1862:

THOU to the Mercy Seat our souls

 To do our duty unto Thee OUR FATHER,
 To Whom all praise, all honor
 should be given,
 For Thou art the Great God WHO ART IN HEAVEN,
 Thou, by Thy wisdom, rul'st the
 world's whole fame;
 Forever, therefore HALLOWED BE THY NAME.
 Let nevermore delays divide us
 from
 Thy glorious grace, but THY KINGDOM COME
 Let Thy commands opposed be by
 none,
 But Thy good pleasure and THY WILL BE DONE
 And let our promptness to obey be
 even
 the very same ON EARTH, AS 'TIS IN
 HEAVEN.
 Thou wouldst be pleased to GIVE US THIS DAY
 The food of life, wherein our souls
 are fed,
 Sufficient raiment and OUR DAILY BREAD,
 With every needful thing do Thou
 relieve us,
 And of Thy mercy pity AND FORGIVE US
 All our misdeeds, for Him, whom
 Thou didst please,
 To make an offering for OUR TRESPASSES,
 And foras much, O Lord, as we
 believe
