## It is Rumored That This Road is A Katy

 Project.Guthrie, Okla., Feb. 8...Grading on the Mountain, Valley \& Plains railroad is being pushed westward from Guthrie to King. fisher, twelve miles being completed during this week. This will be the first stretch of rad built, forty miles, and construction will then begin from Kingfisher toward the Texas Panhandle. At the same time, construction is in progress eastward toward Guthrie from Cimmaron, N. M. Guthrie gave the company $\$ 75,000$ bonus to secure the eastern terminus of this line and the citizens of Kingfisher gave a bonus of $\$ 20,000$. It is rumored that this is a Katy extension.
