#### A SENSELESS BILL

Senator Gordon Burns of Huntsville has introduced in the Legislature a bill described as the most severe ever placed before that body to regulate the practice of a profession.

This bill would restrict the advertising of optoetrists to such an extent that they would be unable to use the columns of newspapers, the radio, printed handbills, billboards, display signs or any other device, means or methed to tell of their services.

The optometrist, under this bill, could be fined \$500 and put in jail for six months for advertising his business address or office location in type larger than his name, and each day would be a separate offense of. It would allow cancellation of licenses of optometrists for 13 practices and make 15 practices punishable by jail sentences and fines.

If Dr Joe Doakes purchased the most modern and expensive equipment obtainable for use in his practice, he would be prohibited by law from telling any of his friends and patients about it in any form of advertising.

This bill, in short, would put a senseless restraint upon optometrists. It would make it virtually impossible for department stores and other merchants to lease space to optometrists as a convenience to their patrons, for the important reason that they would be unable to state in their advertising that first class service was obtainable in their establishments.

Advertising is a legitimate means of telling of one's goods services. The optometrist should have the same opportunity to tell of his services as the merchant, the manufacturer, or what-

EFFECTS OF TOBACCO

Almost anything can be proved by statistics and examples. This appears to be particularly true with respect to the effects of tobacco, long a subject of spirited rgument.

So far as physical consequences go, its effects seem to depend largely upon the individual. Many who lived to an extreme old age were users of the weed, while others were not. Leading physicians and sc'entists report that little influence is exerted upon the intellectual powers by the use of tobacco. Many literary men believe that smcking is a stimulant to their creative pulses.

While tobacco is no doubt inurious to the young, its deterimental effects, physically or otherwise, upon mature persons have been perhaps greatly exaggerated.



#### FARM TENANCY BILL

Rural Texas has an important stake in the Corry bill on farm tenancy, now being studied by the House committee on agriculture in Austin. Unlike most remedial proposals on tenancy, this measure does not seek to convert tenants into farm owners. Instead, it aims to remove the evils of tenancy and make tenancy contracts of longer duration, with benefits for both parties.

In Texas, the average farm tenant stays only two years on one place. In England he stays fifteen years. The Corry bill seeks to make the terms of Texas tenancy more like those of the English system, which has been copied elsewhere in Europe and has been widely advocated here. It would apply, however, only to tenant farmers who provide all or part of their operating capital. Gains for the tenant from the



So far, nobody has suggested in the Legislature how much revenue, if any, needs to be raised. There is a deficit in the general fund, and certain phases of the social security program are as yet unfinanced. But the Senate's economy committee recommended savings in governmental cost that would probably cover these costs, and there is evident a strong determination on the part of many legislators to put all or most of the recommendations in effect. To save \$5,000,000 a year, would of course, be better legislation than to load \$5,000,000 of new taxes onto the backs of the taxpayers.
