

We have never offered the Herald for less than \$1.00 per year, which barely pays for the paper it is printed on, plus postage. Thus, we believe we have the cream of the town readers on our list, together with the best farmers and rent farmers of the county. Another thing, too, we have never cut ad rates to below cost, yet we have the business of some of the best merchants in the city. This applies equally to stationary. But we have always given people a class of work they are not ashamed to send out to any correspondent.

And, another reason we did not attend the Texas Press Association, at Lubbock, was that we are not a member, and we just did not care to enter when there be a fight brewing. Contrary to the general opinion that some of our neighboring editors have of us, we are a peace loving old boy, and hate to get into political spats, believe it or not, especially in hot weather. It's hard on the nerves and sweat glands. BOND ROAD BILL PASSES

The Senate finally passed the road bond assumption bill, but it was a far different measure from the montrosity originally sponsered by the Texas County Judges Association, which sought to put the State's guarantee behind nearly \$2,00,000,000 of "dead horse" county lateral road bonds. The Senate amended and adopted the Tarwater house substitute, which distributes the surplus in the bond retirement fund to counties, but on a formula involving road mileage, population, motor car licenses and area, rather than on the basis of the amount of the debt owed. Since the bill seeks to put the State's credit behind the lateral road bonds, with which the state has no concern, many legal authorities believe it is unconstitutional, and it is regarded as vertually certain to face a court test, as soon as it is finally enacted. through the acceptance by the Mouse of Senate amendments, or by adoption of a conference com-
