BOND ELECTION CALLED FOR AUGUST 19

After abandoning original plans to have a bond election in July the Commissioners court of Gaines county has called an election to vote the proposition of voting \$250,000.00 in bonds to be issued by Gaines county for the purpose of building roads. The election will be held on Saturday, August 19th.

Efforts are being made at this time to get the state and the PWA to join in the road building program and if plans materialize that are being worked on considerable road mileage will be built in this county with the money available.

A hearing from the state highway commission is being awaited and the Congressman also will be

contacted to determine whether Federal help will be available.

It is hoped to be able to complete a highway across Gaines county to tie in with a state and national system being worked out, from both north to south and from east to west.—Seagraves Reporter.

Lyntegar Lines Are Energized

Electric energy was turned into Lyntegar Electric Co-operative lines Monday at the Substation No. 1, 2 1/2 miles north of Meadow. Electricity will be furnished by Texas-New Mexico Utilities Co., on contract.

Distribution lines are being made "hot" as fast as workmen can make connections in the

northwest part of the county.

Lines are ready for use as far east as the Tahoka-Lubbock highway.

In the meantime, lines in the east part of Lynn county and in west Garza county are going up steadily.

Dawson and Hockley county residents seeking extension of the lines to include their counties must hurry, Resident Engineer Edward P. Price says, for funds in Washington for these extensions will not be available much longer.—Tahoka News.
