Brownfield School May Get Recreation Project

Mr. Alvin Eggling, district supervisor of the WPA recreation project, of Lubbock, met Thursday afternoon at the Chamber of Commerce office with representatives from the Lions, Rotary, Maids & Matrons, Business and Professional Women's clubs and a committee of the Chamber of Commerce to discuss the organization of a recreation project here and explain how the work is carried on and what would be expected of the city when and if the project is started here.

Mr. Eggling stated that it was a project for every citizen and go over this matter thoroughly. that while it is intended to make better citizens of our youth, that many adult participants are welcome. It would cost the city 25 or 30 dollars per month, which is used for equipment and supplies, and the city would also have to provide a building. The project would employ twelve local people. with approximately \$600 or \$700 monthly payroll, which is payed by the government. The supervisor must be a college graduate.

The city appoints a managing committee or council. Weaving, sewing, clay modeling, woodcraft, and dramatics are among the subjects taught, and sports are also stressed. Littlefield, Lamesa, Lubbock, Snyder and Post already have this project. Cooperation with the school and their recreation program is planned.







DWELLING SHOULD BE INSPECTED TWICE A YEAR

AUSTIN, Aug. 19 .- The inspection of all dwellings twice a year is a very important part of an adequate fire prevention program, and it is particularly desirable that rooming houses be checked frequently, according to Marvin Hall,





No definite time has yet been set when all the necessary forms and instructions will be available so that loan applications can be accepted, George Slaughter, chairman of the state AAA committee, said, but the material is now being printed and will be shipped to the loan agencies as soon as

Loans will be made directly by the Commodity Credit Corporation and by banks and other local lending lagencies under arrangements similar to those pertaining to previous cotton loans. The loans will bear three per cent interest and will be called on demand with the maturity date fixed July 31, 1941. Loans will be available until May 1, 1941. All cotton to be eligible for the loan must be classed by Board of Cotton Examiners of the Agricultural Marketing Service of the Department of Agriculture.

At a home county rally held last week McLennan County went on record for its native son, Judge James P. Alexander, candidate for the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas. The farmers, labor, the professional and business men were all represented on the program.

A past president of the Waco Trade Council told og Judge Alexander's unending fairness toward the laboring classes and their prob-

A former district judge, H. M. Richey reviewed Judge Alexander's career as judge, stressing his service of four years as county judge, four years as district judge, 14 years in the private practice of law, and 10 years as an Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals.

"In those ten years, Judge Alexander has made a record that should be the envy of every man on an appellate court", said Judge

Dr. J. T. Harrington, for many years a member of the board of Trustees, of Baylor University, where for twenty years Judge Alexander has taught a class in law at off hours, declared that for years he was a close and warm friend of the late O. S. Lattimore, Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, now deceased, but that in this race he recognized Alexander was the best qualified man for the Supreme Court.

"Judicial greatness is not inherited. It is only achieved through laborious work, and James P. Alexander has attained his outstanding place in judicial circles through long years of diligent effort. The people should not confuse Judge Alexander's opponent with Justice O. S. Lattimore, he declared. "That great man has long since passed to his just reward."

In McLennan County in the first primary Alexander received nearly 15,000 votes, while his opponent received only 2200.

RAINS REVIVE PASTURES IN LAMESA AREA

Recent rains have done much to revive pastures and row crops in crops where soil and moisture conservation practices were used were holding up well, but on other farms crops were rapidly being cut short when the rains came.

In parts of the county as much as four inches of rain fell during the night and only two farms that were terraced reported any runoff. This rain was followed by continual cloudy weather with additional rain which insures sufficient moisture to maintain row crops.

Moisture is always the fimiting factor in crop production on the Plains, and moisture stored in the soil before the crop is planted is often equivalent to a rain while the crop is growing. Certainly the water that is permitted to run off the fields and pastures during heavy rains will not be of any use to the crops and grass growing on
