

## Health Unit Offers Sanitation Services

By. Dr. Wm. S. Brumage, Director Five County Health Unit.

Sanitation facilities on the farm and on camping areas in our towns should be checked and made satisfactory before the arrival of migratory farm laborers for the comng cotton picking season.

The several cases of typhoid fever in this county this year have all shown a history of having lived or visited on premises which, upon inviestigation, were found to have unsatisfactory toilet facilities and unprotected water sup-

An outdoor toilet which is open is used by the visitors and migrafory laborers as well as the farm family, is recognized by health authorities as a real menace to the health of the community. Such a method of disposal has been found typhoid fever and other filth born where they spent the week end. diseases originate.

A safe waste disposal should nclude the use of a fly and rodent proof privy, where a water-type ystem cannot be made available.

A safe water supply from the standpoint of sanitation should in-At Meadow Mrs. J. M. Burleson, clude a well which is sealed against water infiltration and filth at the surface and to include a covered and protected storage tank The average farm well with no surface protection against storm water, dusts, and rodents, is potentially dangerous.





The \$20 minimum payment for each farm has been continued, the chairman pointed out, and an additional \$15 is available for planting trees. Thus, any farm can earn as much as \$35 by cooperating Monday. with the 1941 program.

In addition, on small farms where the maximum payment is not more than \$20, any part of the soil-building allowance may be earned by carrying out locally adapted conservation practices not recommended by county commit- ents at Littlefield.

## Uniform Classing of Loan Cotton

College Station, Sept. 2.-All cotton used as security for government loans in 1940 will be classed by official boards of cotton examiners of the Agricultural Marketing Service.

Used for the first time in 1939, this system of classing cotton will avoid any inequities among producers whose loan cotton formerly was graded by warehousemen and individual licensed classers, and only slightly more time will be required for approval of the loans, Donald L. Cothran, state AAA committeeman from Paris, points out.

The class placed on cotton by a board will be final, thus avoiding for the producer any expense or inconvenience for reclassing and for making deficiency payments for overclassing. In addition, the cost will be only 15 cents per bale as compared with the usual charge of 25 cents per bale under other procedures.

"The uniform and reliable classing by the boards will give the Encouraging feed production, producer information of value in negotiating with buyers for the eventual sale of his equity or his cotton," the state committeeman said. "The increased value of such classing will more than offset any inconvenience arising from the additional time needed."

> On delivery of cotton to the warehouse for the Commodity Credit Corporation loan, samples will be drawn by the warehouse-! man and shipped to the nearest central classing office. The samples will be classed and each bale listed on a special form signed by the board and returned to the producer. Loan values will be based on the class shown on this form. The Agricultural Marketing Service predicts samples will be classed usually within 36 hours at the longest, 72 hours.



#### Mexican Bed or Kissing Bug Dangerous

AUSTIN, Aug. 26.-Discovery in Texas of Mexican bed bugs (kissing bugs) infected with trypanasoma cruzi, a parasite capable of causing Chaga's disease, was reported this week in the United States Public Health Service report, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

While no human cases of Chaga's disease have been reported to the State Health Department, the presence of the organisms in the insects that transmit the disease make it a potential health problem, Dr. Cox pointed out.

About 65 per cent of 150 specimens of the bed bugs collectel in one Central Texas town were found to be infected with the parasite trypanasoma cruzi. Eperience with the disease in the tropics has indicated that adults are less susceptible to the disease than children and that in some instances persons may harbor the parasite of Chaga's disease in their blood stream without the actual condition of the disease being present.

It has further been shown in areas where the disease is prevalent that infants of about one year of age are most susceptible to the disease and in the presence of the the disease show a low grade fever at night. During the period of infection the face becomes puffy and the thyroid gland and superficial lymphatic glands are enlarged. The puffiness of the face accompanied by sore eyes is so characteristic as to be almost diagnostic of Chaga's disease. In the final stages

The State Health Department, through its Division of Bedding is intensifying its activities to secure proper sterilization of second hand mattresses before resale and to supervise closely the manufacture and retailing of bedding products so as to minimize the potential infection of mattresses with the Mexican bed bug and other disease carriers.

Cooperation of the public is urged in buying new or used bedding products by demanding that each product carry the regulation labels and stamps certifying the product as being approved by the Bedding Division of the State Health Department. Compliance in purchasing only approved bedding products will insure that the bedding obtained will be as free as possible from the carriers of disease which may be harbored in mattresses.

#### LIVE STOCK MOVEMENT SLOWS IN JULY

AUSTIN, Sept. 1.-Movement of livestock from Texas ranches to Fort Worth stockyards and to other states for July dropped 20.5 per cent from July, 1939, University

Only 4,632 cars were shipped, consisting of 2,614 cars of cattle, 741 cars of calves, 565 cars of hogs, and 712 cars of sheep. Cattle shipments were down 9 per cent, calves 43.8 per cent, hogs 12.5 per cent and sheep 27.8 per cent.

During the seven-month period from January 1 to August 1, 40,-951 carloads of livestock were shipped, 16.8 per cent less than during the corresponding period last year, University Bureau of Business Research figure show.

#### POULTRY, EGG SHIPMENTS SHOW BIG INCREASE

AUSTIN, Sept. 2 .- Poultry and egg shipments from Texas to interstate points during July registered a large increase over those of July a year ago, University of Texas business statisticians report. Rail forwardings of poultry-36 cars-were 80 per cent above the comparable month last year, and 68 cars of eggs left the state as compared with 33 cars in July

The poultry movement was made up of 30 cars of chickens and six cars of turkeys, compared to 20 cars of chickens and none of turkeys a year ago.
