

HOME IS NOT THE SAFEST PLACE

AUSTIN, March-The general opinion prevails in America that home is about the safest place there is. However, the facts prove that, far from being the safest, it is often quite the opposite. A keener realization of this fact, plus amending the carelessness responsible for most of the home accidents, is a goal that cannot be over-emphasized at this time when health and physical efficiency mean so much to the nation at large.

In commenting on this urgent need for the protection of life Cox said. and limb in the American home, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer today declared that accidents in the home are the cause

of more deaths than diphtheria, scarlet fever, whooping cough, and measles combined; of more than appendicitis; of nearly as many as diabetes; of over two-thirds as many as automobile accidents; and of over a third as many as deaths as tuberculosis.

"Slippery floor surfaces, lack of handrails on cellar steps, absence of protective gates at the top of stairs, un-anchored small rugs on polished floors, poisons in medicine cabinets accessible to children, and the careless storage of sharp tools and firearms are some of the more prominent hazards resulting in home accidents." Dr.

"However," he added, "in the last analysis the problem boils down to one of reasonable caution. We cannot view complacently the more than 30,000 deaths annually due to home accidents. These deaths, chargeable to remidiable carelessness, can and should be reduced."

Dr. Cox declared that such a needless and profitless loss of life should be deplored at any time, but to permit such a condition to persist in 1942, in view of our national crisis, is a neglect that cannot be condoned.





Six Million New Income Tax Payers

In a last message to the press pefore the deadline, which will be March 16th, on account of the 15th coming on Sunday, Mr. Henry Morgenthau, jr., Secretary of the Treasury, states that there will be six million new people who will have to make income! tax returns, and that many more, who will make their first con-I tribution by this route to the government treasury.

Mr. Morgenthau jr., wants to stress again and for the last time that it is imperative that people make out their returns promptly and send them in, and that if possible, they send all the money with their returns. Of course people can, if they wish, make four equal payments the tax, but in view of the fact that our nation is spending billions of dollars for war purposes, the sooner the money is at hand, the better.

Farmers Getting Machines Keady For Job Ahead

College Station-The farmers of Texas, in general are getting their equipment in order for the production job ahead, but in most areas of the state farmers still need to order more repair parts.

This was indicated by a survey just completed by the Texas USDA War Board in which county boards were asked to determine the status of the farm machinery repair program throughout

The survey indicates that farmers and dealers already have ordered great many more parts han by the same date last year, B. F. Vance, state board chairman declared. County board estimates of the percentage increase in num ber of parts ran as high as 30 percent, although most counties reported increases ranging from 25 percent to 75 percent.

At the same time, the reports indicated that in only a few counties have farmers ordered all the the state's counties reported difficulty in obtaining parts, while only thirty counties reported de- for one day, March 28. lays in the repair program because of a shortage of machines, Welders, or blacksmiths.

"We must have all farm equipment in shape in ample time to avoid serious breakdowns at critical moments," Vance pointed out. "Production is what counts and any slowdown of production by breakdowns which could have been avoided is inexcusable. The thing to do is to order repair parts now so as to be ready for any emergency."
