## WAR BONDS AND STAMPS GIVEN IN SCRAP METAL DRIVE HERE

### The USO Drive Is Now Under Way

Thirty volunteer workers, both men and women, have canvassed the city of Brownfield and 14 surrounding communities have workers in this county to raise the Terry County quota for USO.

We cannot give you a report this week as the active drive ends Saturday, June 15th. If you have not been contacted personally and you wish to give our boys in service, a homelike, wholesome atmosphere while off duty, send your check or money to USO War Fund in care of either bank or USO Treasurer T. R. Black. The National drive for this year ends July 4th. The USO contribution is allowed as exemption on income tax.

A lonesome, homesick soldier boy is a discontented one. He has no will to win this war. Help keep up his morale! We live in a democracy where every one does his share. Have you done your part by buying War Bonds and Stamps, helping in Red Cross and USO?

For the million dollars that Texas is asked to raise this year, over three millions will be spent in Texas for USO clubs in the new bases and camps located here in last year and to maintain those already in operation.

No money out of this fund is spent in the local campaign. All publicity is free by cooperation of local newspapers. All workers and officers are giving their time as well as money to make this quota of \$2,000.

Glen Akers has offered his services as auditor of funds received.

A permanent record of persons and donations received will be kept in the courthouse.

### Allred Hits The Campaign Trail In West Texas

With the preliminaries behind him, James V. Allred, candidate for United States Senator, swung into the main bout this week, taking his candidacy to the voters on the wide plains of West Texas.

In old-time fighting trim, the former Governor let loose the fire of campaign oratory in a series of stump speeches.

Allred unfolded more chapters in the "Book of O'Daniel," which in his opening Wichita Falls speech he promised to reveal strictly from the written record during his campaign.

Levelling a blast at those obstructionists in congress who blocked fortifications at Guam and other Pacific outposts, Allred declared:

"The blood of every boy who fought at Corregidor or in Java is upon the hands of the isolationists with whom our junior senator aligned himself by his first speech and vote."

Allred quoted from the "Book of O'Daniel" the present senator's vote against the extension of the selective service act after he "had pledged himself to help the president 'get the job done.'"

Before heading into West Texas, Allred appeared before the state democratic executive committee in Austin Monday to champion the right of service men to vote in party primaries.

After the above was put in print, it was learned that Jimmie Allred would visit this city Thursday afternoon on his way to Lubbock. A fair sized crowd, considering the busy season, and that the stores were all open, greeted the candidate.

After a full day in business sessions at which the war completely dominated the program, Panhandle bankers concluded their streamlined 36th annual convention at Amarillo Wednesday with an evening of entertainment.

fair-grounds along with the convention delegates for a John Snider barbecue beginning at 7:30 p. m. Among the many visitors were many Amarillo Army officers. Later there was a dance at the Herring Hotel.

In the final business meeting, S. E. Brown, cashier of the Citizens State Bank at Dalhart was elected the association president. James L. Farwell of Amarillo and J. O. Gillham of Brownfield were named vice-presidents. T. H. Deaver of Memphis was chosen secretary and Chester Albritton of Amarillo was selected as treasurer.

550 Registered

Registration at the convention was approximately 550. Through their free handling of war bonds and stamps the men of this organization have performed what is probably the biggest volunteer war service done by any single group in this area. The bond sales handled by the Panhandle banks total millions of dollars every month.

### After A Month's Trial Of City Delivery

Well, how do you like city delivery? Had you rather go back to the old method of going to the postoffice once or twice or more times daily, to collect your mail, or have it brought to your desk, or delivered in your mail box at home?

Yes, we realize the cost is greater. For instance, you now put a 2c stamp on drop letters instead of the 1c before the city mail delivery started. And it has almost doubled the amount of postage on the newspapers, as they have to pay not only for their poundage in the city, but on every rural route going out of the city. However, all other offices in the county, such as Meadow, Wellman, and Tokio, the postage is free as usual. It was free delivery all over the county before city delivery started here.

Would like to hear others express themselves about the matter. We don't believe many would want to do without this delivery, however. It gives two extra men employment for one thing, and payrolls mean a lot these days, in small towns and cities.

We understand that most business men have retained their boxes at the postoffice in order to get Sunday mail.

### Better than A Half Inch Rainfall

The Herald has no idea who reports the rainfall of Brownfield to the Lubbock dailies, but he or she missed the last one quite badly and are doubtlessly doing guessing instead of phoning some one that keeps a rain gauge. They reported the weekend rain as a quarter inch, when as a matter of fact, the Saturday-Sunday rains amounted to 62/100 inch.

The gauge out at the oil mill indicated 87/100, and we understand that some parts of the county received even more, while some others received less, much less.

Will state that the Herald will be just too glad to give exact figures on rainfall, if you will phone 1 or 45 before turning in reports.

### Price Makes Formal Announcement For District Judge

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE 106 JUDICIAL DISTRICT OF TEXAS:

Since January 1, I have been solicited by citizens of the district to enter the race for District

Judge. Remembering the pangs of a former campaign I hesitated to make this race. A worthy vote throughout the District in this former race has been, however, a continuous source of consolation to me. Then too, I have hesitated to enter this race on account of the war. Our young men are all in it. My only son entered the Nation's army as a private at \$21 per month, and has been stationed in the war zone for the past 20 months. I say this because I know that the war is the one thing of supreme concern to fathers and mothers with sons in the armed forces.

No matter how deeply the news from the front affects us, we have to carry on at home. Our boys would never forgive us if we quit, and did not try to overcome our failures and seek to live by achievements worthy of us as a parent.

From this angle, I have been cheered to attempt to do a thing in which I have heretofore failed—to be placed in the position of your District Judge, elected by the Sovereign Voters, rulers of this great democracy. Our sons are now fighting to protect the high ideal, that we, as a sovereign people, may control our own destiny and live as we have lived through the ages in our own free way of life.

Four years ago I made the race for District Judge, speaking in every schoolhouse in the district. I said then, that a District Judge should be a man trained in the law, a man of decision, a man with patience, a man that had control of himself, a man with due regards for every man, a man of firmness coupled with human sympathy, a man that believed in staying in the middle of the road, plowing deep to determine the rights between men, without fear or favor, a man who would respect the rights of the humblest practitioner of the law, as well as the most noted barrister, a man that would see that the voice of the down and out be heard in the temple of Justice.

I feel that I have reached the age in life, where I am able to act with precision based on experience gained the hard way. I feel that I know the highest values for a human life, the things that elevate and the things that destroy. I have schooled myself to think that a defeat was just something to overcome, a stepping stone, instead of a barrier. In this spirit I took the rap in the race I made four years ago.

Most of you know me. I have lived in Terry County since December, 1900. I have served Terry County as County Attorney and County Judge. I have never been defeated in my own county for any position I have sought. I hope that I may be elevated in your opinion above petty politics, as a candidate from this county, that I may be considered as a man seeking a position in the district as a citizen of the district. I have been in the active practice of law for 20 years, licensed to practice in

Rather, we imagine the Commando are practicing rough and tumble methods that were borrowed from the U. S. Marines. Next week is the big week in Brownfield and area for the collection of scrap for the Japs, and incidentally a goodly portion for the squareheads. There is hardly a farm, shop or back yard that does not have more or less re-used steel or iron laying around in the way, rusting out, that is to say the least unsightly. Our country needs this scrap badly to provide arms and munitions to our fighters at the front. Some of these boys are your boys, or at least your neighbor's boys. Shall we let them down? Not by a heck of a sight. ## From where I sit...

A FEW weeks ago, I had occasion to visit some friends of mine in Nebraska.

Nebraska certainly is a great State. I like Nebraska. I like those immense cornfields that seem to stretch from horizon to horizon. (Plenty of wheatfields in Nebraska, too.)

But the thing that interests me most about Nebraska right now is the very important social experiment the beer people started there several years ago.

Beer itself is naturally a beverage of moderation. Yet, all too often, people are inclined to blame beer wrongly for any misconduct of the customer or the proprietor in a place licensed to sell beer.

So, the brewers got together to see what they could do about this. They weren't really responsible for their retailers... in fact, they're not allowed to control retailers. But the brewing industry worked out a plan by which it cooperates with the public authorities to eliminate bad conditions in the minority of places whose conduct would reflect on the law-abiding majority.

The beer people urge proprietors of retail places to conduct them properly and to obey the law. They urge consumers to cooperate, and ask the public generally to report law violations to the authorities. They send warnings to careless retailers and if conditions are not corrected they take the case up with the authorities. Naturally the authorities and the public have welcomed this as an added force in building respect for law and order.

That program is now operating in many states—and with the Nation at war, brewing industry organizations cooperate with civil and military authorities to assure good conditions in beer outlets around the army camps and naval stations.

Somehow, to me, that's a mighty important, public-spirited effort. I don't know of anything like it ever having been tried before. If people really help the brewers with that program they'll be doing a great thing for the country.

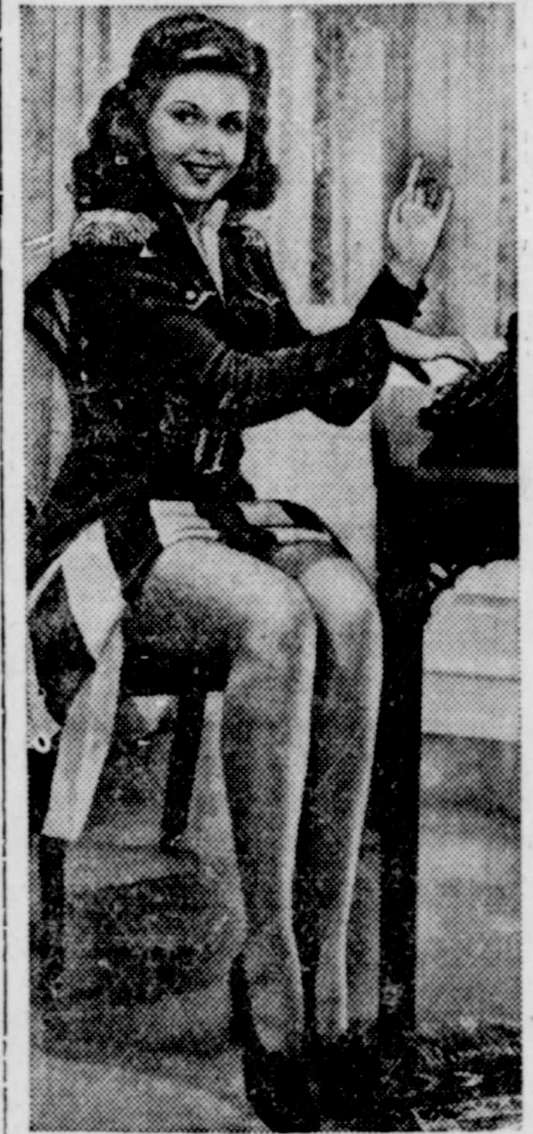
The fighting, the fun, and some of the history of the corps is presented along with a fascinating plot in the technicolor picture.

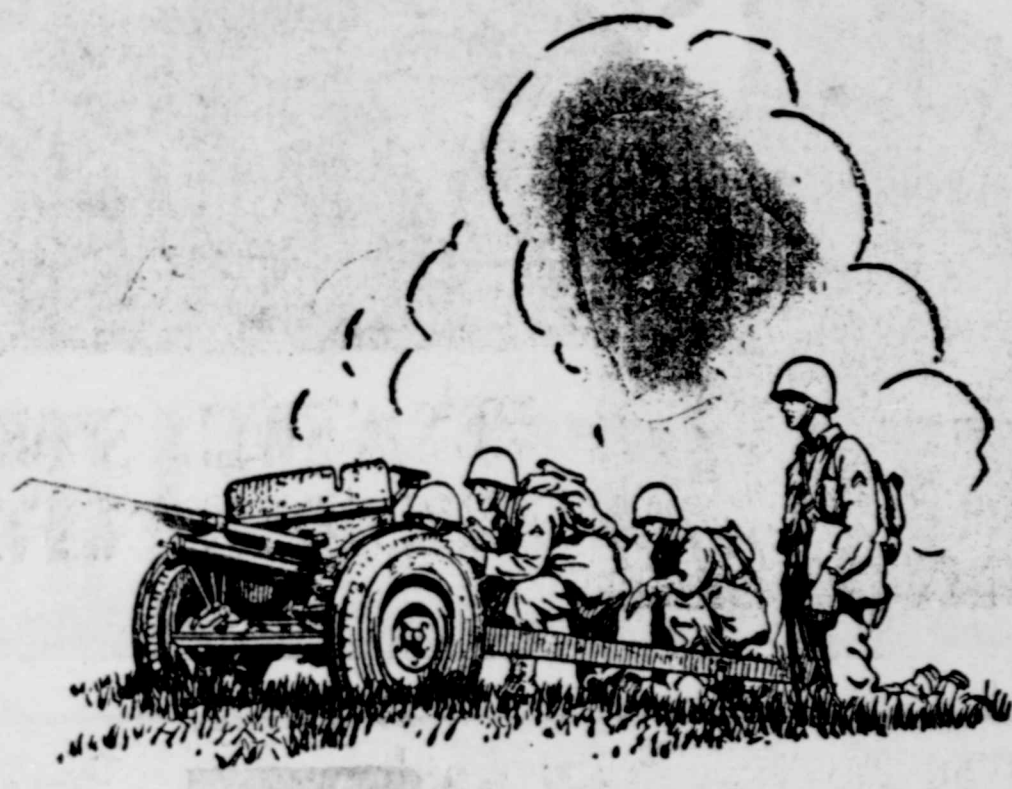

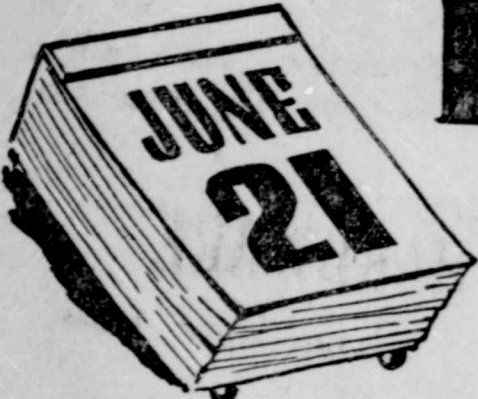
