Those reports made out Sept. 15th and Dec. 15th, were only estimates and does not take place of this one. Those aiding in making such reports, urge you to figure up your total income, and itemized expense account, for the year, before coming in, as it saves much time needed in the rush of the last few days.

## Troy Fort Again Winner In Roping Match

Troy Fort of Lovington won the calf roping match over Jack Skipworth of Clovis, at the rodeo sponsored by the Brownfield Roping club, here last Sunday.

In the jack-pot contest, Roy Lewis took first; Buddy Fort, 2nd; and Bill Bomer, 3rd. Better time was made in some of the latter roping, than in the Match.

Chairman L. Nicholson of the recent war bond drive, this week received a letter of thanks from the war department for our successful drive. The state bought over 478 million in bonds, of which 145 million was of the "E" series. He was admonished that buying bonds was like the war front, a continuing thing, that the March quota for Series E, F, and G, bonds is \$30,000,000, and Terry county has a quota of \$40,000.

## Scholastic Census Being Taken

Full returns are incomplete on the scholastic census being taken this week by sending blank forms by the children to their parents. It was pointed out that the apportionment made by the state for 1944 will be \$25 per pupil over six years of age, and not over 18, by Sept. 1st, hence every child enumerated means that much to the school fund.

## Red Cross Drive Progressing Nicely

The Red Cross Drive launched last week is meeting with liberal response in Terry county. Leo Holmes, Treasurer, reports that about 60 per cent of the quota had been subscribed up to Wednesday night, and field workers are busy contacting those not yet reached.

Lack of transportation, and their own work, makes it difficult for committeemen to visit everyone. Management urges those missed to contact some worker or pay direct to the treasurer. They also express the hope the quota will be filled by end of next week.

## Tractor Tires Must Be Recapped If Possible

"A replacement certificate for a tractor tire will not be issued under any circumstances when it is possible to get further service from that tire by means of vulcanizing or recapping, or by using a boot or reliner," J. Doyle Settle, District OPA Rationing Executive, has announced.

Due to the acute shortage of farm tractor and implement tires, especially tractor rear tires, the 1944 spring quota will be considerably less than that of 1943. Though the quota, because of extensive agricultural activities in this section, is larger for this district than any other, the demand will be much greater than the supply unless operators will take care of their present tires, he urged.

Mr. Settle emphasized the fact that unless these precautions are taken, there will be many tractors without tire replacements available, for the quota allows replacements only when there is no other way of keeping the tractor in operation.

Mrs. Dunlap had been with her only a week and both were preparing to leave next day for Mrs. Dunlap's home near Los Angeles.

Brown, who lived nearby, was arrested next day at noon at Denver City, after an all night manhunt by officers of this and adjoining counties and a large posse. He has been in jail since.

## The Old He Does A Bit Of Rambling

Some asked us while away if we were going to write up our trip. Others have asked the same thing since our return. It will depend somewhat on our mood from day to day, as well as time spared from something more essential. Will say that we had a good trip without any mishaps, and found the tables in old Tennessee loaded to the rims with good eats, and that is where we shine.

Being a country boy, with all the country still in us, unlike some of the editors of this area who make trips, we will not tell of the tall buildings that we saw, or the big shots we met. We saw plenty of the former but met none of the latter—thank goodness. Our idea of greatness, however, does not coincide with the opinion of many, and we can never have as good a time among the canyons of tall buildings as we can among tall pines, oaks and gums.

When one can get clear away from noise and confusion, and be awakened by the crow of the old rooster, the bawl of cows and the neighing of horses, for their breakfast, you have found our idea of the haven of rest here on earth, where you can stretch out and relax. And was our people considerate? Usually they would slip around when they arose, talk in low tones and refuse to turn on the radio, and that meant we could prolong our nap, as we would usually talk until near midnight before retiring. As it was raining most of the time, most of the men-folks were not busy.

It had been some 41 years since we had been back there in winter, so we got to set by those old roaring log fires, where you could see the glowing coals, and if a good tobacco chewer, you had a fine target at which to aim. No matter how long you slept, your breakfast was kept warm. Now folks, when you begin to smell country cured ham, eggs and Ar-buckle aroma floating around the room, it was no hard matter to get up, especially if a long, tall, hungry looking nephew that towered 6-2 came in and made a roaring log fire for you to get up by.

But there was rain almost every night with flashes of lightning and thunder, which the old boys back there say means frost in April. One day while there, we went along with other relatives way up in the New Hope hills, close to where we first saw the light of day to have the noon meal with a cousin, with whom we played, fussed and fought when boys. As a general thing, however, we got along just fine.

Just as we sat down to a prime meal that we knew we'd never get around to sampling half what was on the table, the elements broke loose; forked and zigzag lightning played around the oaks on the hills, and rumbling thunder roared, and echoed through those eternal hills. Water poured from the clouds as we had not seen it for many years, and rushed pell mell down the gullies and ravines, each drop seemingly trying to see how quickly it could get back to the river. It was nothing new to them, however, and the meal went on calmly. So, after the meal, Cousin Will and the writer kinder scrunched over in one corner by the big log fire, and began rehearsing some of the stunts we pulled in childhood and boyhood, and some of them would not exactly fit in as stories for a Sunday School class.

Finally, leave was taken and when we reached the bottoms, there was water, water everywhere, and little land in sight. This may or may not be continued next week.

Surgical dressing rooms are open from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday.

## With Spring Will Come Typhoid Fever

AUSTIN — With the approach of spring and summer, an increase in the incidence of typhoid fever may be expected, but under war-time conditions it can very easily become a major health menace, as was pointed out in a statement released by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Nearly all cases of typhoid in Texas can be traced to a supply of contaminated water or food," Dr. Cox said. "Some cases, of course, occur by direct contact with patients or their excreta, usually when sanitary conditions surrounding the patients are bad."

Dr. Cox said that individual water supplies which are poorly located and wells improperly enclosed may receive surface drainage and pollution; therefore, springs and wells should be protected adequately. Sanitary pit privies or septic tanks also help protect wells and springs from pollution. There is real danger in the seepage from poorly constructed or delapidated privies. Fly screens and covered toilet seats help in warm weather to keep flies from breeding in toilets and carrying infection to food.

Carriers, or walking cases, never should be food handlers. A carrier, the doctor said, is a person who harbors typhoid germs in his body, though having no symptoms of the disease. Typhoid fever is one of the many infections that can be carried by raw milk. Pasteurized milk therefore should be used, since pasteurization kills disease organisms if they are present in the raw milk.

"Everyone contemplating trips where the safety of the milk and water supplies cannot be established," Dr. Cox declared, "should be immunized by the family doctor. Three doses of the vaccine are given in weekly intervals. The treatment is not dangerous, and it gives protection for two years or more."
