

. . . Efficiency on the Farm

An interesting comparison between farming the American way and the communistic Russian way is contained in a report compiled by Herrell DeGraff, professor of agricultural economics at Cornell university for a national steel publication.


Russia has about the same harvested crop acreage as the U. S. but, based on prewar figures, this country harvested one and a half times as much agricultural production.

It takes a Russian farmer 330 hours to raise and harvest an acre of cotton. Americans do the same in 91 hours. Russian farmers harvest an acre of wheat in 47 hours, Americans in 9 hours. Soviet farmers work 265 hours to raise and harvest an acre of potatoes, Americans 68 hours; it takes a Russian 63 hours to produce an acre of corn, Americans 16 hours with double the yield.

DESPITE the fact that GOP party bosses here completely ignore Minnesota's Harold Stassen and his Republican presidential aspirations, there is little question in the minds of objective observers that the young exgovernor is gaining ground with the masses of the voters Stassen represents what little lib eralism there is in the Republicar

party. He is logical successor

to the role of Wendell Willkie who stampeded the 1940 conven tion and snatched the GOP nomination from under the neses of Taft and Dewey. Carroll Reece, GOP national chair-

man, and other STASSEN party leaders, however, do not intend to let such a stampede happen in another convention. So despite the fact that Stassen is popular with the masses. particularly the younger element in the ranks of the Republican party, the odds here are that he never will be able to capture the nomination at Philadelphia next June.

So the word has gone out from the bosses to beat down any rising Stassen sentiment and for this reason many Republicans who believe in the Minnesotan likely will go some place else for the reason that no one likes to back a loser.

Indications are, however, that under certain circumstances probably even if Stassen can get some of his liberal planks in the GOP platform, be might accept the second spot on the ticket. As a result, it may be that he can force some of his progressive liberalism down the throats of the party bosses despite themselves. That is something which hasn't been done since the days of Theodore Roosevelt.
