PUBLIC ACTS OF THE THIRTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

CHAP, CXXXV.—An Act making Appropriations for the current and contingent Expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling Treaty Stipulations with various Indian Tribes, for the Year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-three.

[CONTINUED.]

And be it further enacted, That

SEC. 2. And be it further enocied, That after the end of the present issual year the salary of the superintendent of Indian affairs for the northern and for the southern districts of California shall be three thousand dollars. Sec. 3. And be it further enacted. That the sum of forty thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, be, and the same is hereby, appropriated to enable the President to negotiate treaty with the Nex Perce Indians Indians of Oregon and Washington Territory, for the relinquishment of a portion or all of their present reservation, or is exchange for other lands.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted. That ander any of the appropriations contained in

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted. That ander any of the appropriations contained in this act for the purpose of negotiating treaties, there shall be no new engagements entered into to pay moneys to any Indian tribe; that all payments to be made under such treaties shall be made in specific treaties of clothing and agricultural implements.

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted. That hereafter ne goods shall be purchated by the Indian Department, or its agents, for any tribe, except upon it c written requestion of the superintendent in charge of the tribe, and only upon public hids is the mode prescribed by law for the purchase of other supplies.

SEC. 6. And be it farther enacted. That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, directed to cause settlements to be made with all persons appointed by Indian councils to receive meneys die to incompetent or orphan Indians, and to require all moneys found to be due to said incompetent or orphan Indians to be returned to the treasury of the United States; and all moneys so seturned shall bear an interest at the rate of air per contour per annum, until paid by or returned shall bear an interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, until paid by or a der of the Secretary of the Interior to those entified to the same; and no money shall dereafter be paid to any person or persons appointed by any Indian council to receive moneys due to incompetent or orphan In-diana but the same shall remain in the trea-sery of the United States until ordered to be paid by the Secretary to those estitled to re-prive the same, and shall bear six per centum interest until so a 4.

interest until so ja 4.

SEC. 7. And be it further enacted, That the following sums be, and the same are here by, in like manner appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the Indian service in California.

For salaries of clerks to superintendents of Indian Affairs for the Northern and Southern Districts of California for three-quarters of the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen nhundred and sixty-two, at eighteen hundred dollars per annum, twenty-seven hundred

dollars.
For the same service for the fi.cal year ending June thirty, eighteen hund ed and sixty-three, at one thousand five hundred dollars per annum, three thousand dollars.

And any holder of said United States notes depositing any sum not less than fifty dilars, or some multiple of fifty colas with Treasury of the United States, or either of the assistant tra surers, shall receive in exchange tharefor duplicate certificates of deposit, one of which may be transmittal to the change tharefor duplicate certificates of deposit, ope of which may be transmitted to the Secretary of the Treasury, who shall thereupon issue to the holder an equal amount of bound of the United States, coupon or registered, as may by said holder he desired, bear ing interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, rad redeemable at the pleasure of the United States after five years, and payable twenty years from the date thereof: Provided, however, that any noise issued under this act may be and report thereon to the next regular session of Gosgress.
