cestion, adopted by the so-called Convection of the people of Texas, assembled in the City of Austin on the 28th day of January. 1861, is, and was from the beginning sull and void; that all the action of the Rebel organization, under the authority of the said Convention, or the so called Confederate States of America, of which it was a constituent part, its ordinances, Constitution, pre-tended laws and official acts, whether Exec-utive, Legislative, Judicial or Military, were and are declared to be null and void; that no liability or debt contracted or incurred under said authority, after said 28th day of January, 1861, shall ever be recognized as obligatory on the people of this State, nor suall any of the so-called laws or decisions of pretended courts ever having place among the states of this State, be classed as "Texas Reports," or read as authority in any of the Be it further declared, That the Conven-

be it further declared, has the Conven-tion which assembled in the city of Austin on the day of February, 1856, and the so-called lith Legislature, which convened in declerace to the requirements of the amended Confederate States Constitution, on Legislature, will be respected so leng only as the Commanding General shall enforce them as rules of action under his government. The special laws, so called, enacted by the said body, for the most part designed as rewards for treason, are hereby declared nucl and void, Nevertheless, along with the vast mass of void action, and the numberless wrongs and outrages perpetrated upon the l-yal citizens of the United States resident and non resident in Texas, under the sanc-than of the pretended laws and authorities of the same, during these years of anarchy and misrule, at the same time many acts inoffen-sive in themselves and beneficial to cifizens, purporting to be official, were attempted to

Be it therefore further d clared, Tlat the By it therefore further d clared, Tlat the acts of the so-called officers in solumining ma rings, in taking acknowledgments, and recording deeds and other instruments of writing, the decisions of so-called courts, where parties were present in the State and due notice given, and all contracts between private parties, subject to the laws of the United States, since the said 23th day of January, 1861, be, and the same are hereby declared and established as valid and of binding force, to the same extent that such acts, decisions, contracts and precedings would have been, had the same been performed by the legal constituted authorities of the State: Provided, That neither the State of Texas, the United States, nor any loyal of Texas, the United States, nor any loyal citizen thereof, shall in any manner any extent be prejudiced thereby; and forther provided, that any loyal person, or his heirs, or legal representatives, may by proper legal proceedings, to be commenced within two years after the acceptance of th stitution by the Congress of the Tuited States, show proof in avoidance of any con-tract made, or revise or annual any decree or judgment rendered, since the said 28th day of January, 1861, when through fraud practiced, or threats, or violence used toward such person, no adequate consideration for the contract has been received, or when through absence from the State of such person, or through political prejudice against such person, the decision complained of was not fair or impartial.
