**The Convention.**  
SEVENTY-FOURTH DAY.  
CAPITOL, AUSTIN, TEXAS,  
Aug. 26, 1868.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment; roll called; quorum present. Prayer by the chaplain; journal of yesterday read and adopted.

A resolution was passed asking Gen Reynolds to authorize the payment of the balance due to member and expenses of the Convention up to time of recess.

Smith of Galveston moved to suspend the rules to consider the motion to reconsider the vote by which the tax bill was passed.

The question recurring upon the motion of Caldwell to lay that motion upon the table, upon which the yeas and nays were demanded and resulted thus:  
Yeas—38. Nays—34.  
So the convention refused to lay on the table.

The question recurring upon the motion to reconsider the vote by which the tax bill was passed.  
The report of the Political and Legislative taken up and passed through to the sections upon the registration and qualification of voters, which was postponed.

Caldwell introduced a section minding Austin the seat of government, and setting the title to a third of a league of land about the Capitol, withdrawn.  
**EVENING SESSION.**  
Jordan of Galveston, called up a declaration relating to the tax on land.

Flanigan, from the committee on internal improvements made the following report:  
City of Austin, Aug. 26, 1868.  
To the Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Constitutional Convention:

Sir—Your committee have had before them a declaration for the relief of the Texas Central Railroad, and from the testimony before your committee, they find that this road is in better condition than any road in the State, and that it deserves all it asks. I am instructed by a majority of the Committee to recommend the passage of the Declaration.

**W. FLANIGAN,**  
Chairman of the Committee.  
A DECLARATION.  
Whereas, the Houston and Texas Central Railway Company has become the owner, by purchase, of the Washington County Railroad; and whereas, the said Houston and Texas Railway Company, and the Washington County Railway Company were indebted, on the 1st day of March, A. D. 1868, to the State of Texas, for sums borrowed from the Special School Fund, in the sum of \$539,074 96, and are further indebted for accrued interest since the 1st day of March, 1868; and whereas the said Houston and Texas Central Railway Company is desirous to extend the Washington County Branch to the city of Austin as soon as it can be done and to build their main trunk to Red River in the shortest time possible, and upon the best ground, and to strike said River at such point as will enable said company to form a connection with any railroad that may be built southward from Kansas or Missouri to Red River; and whereas the ability of said company to build said trunk and branch roads would be greatly increased by the consent of the State to exchange for the seven per cent. gold bearing bonds of the said Houston and Texas Central Railway Company, and whereas, it is believed that such exchange can be made without in any manner endangering the security of the School Fund;

Therefore, Be it declared by the people of Texas in Convention assembled, That the Washington County Railroad is hereby declared to be a branch of the Houston and Texas Central Railroad, and shall henceforth be known and called the Western Branch of the Houston and Texas Central Railway Company; and the said Houston and Texas Central Railway Company shall have the right to extend the said Western Branch of their road from the town of Brenham, in Washington County, to the city of Austin, by the most eligible route, as near an air line as may be practicable.

24. That it is hereby made the duty of the Provisional Governor to accept from the Houston and Texas Central Railway Company the seven per cent. land grant, sinking fund, first mortgage, gold bearing bonds of said Company, for the whole amount of principal and interest due to the State from the said Houston and Texas Central Railway Company, and the said Washington County Railway Company, on the 1st day of July, A. D. 1861, and to cancel the bonds now held by the State against said companies.

33. The Houston and Texas Central Railway Company is hereby authorized to build its main trunk from its present northern terminus, by the most eligible route, to be selected by the engineers of the Company, to any point on Red River within thirty miles of the town of Preston, in Grayson county.

34. This declaration shall take effect from and after its passage.

35. It is resolved by the people of Texas in Convention assembled, That the following newspapers be, and they are, hereby authorized and requested to publish, in the form of "extras" of their several journals for distribution among the people, copies of the constitution as far as passed upon by this convention, that is to say, that the Austin Republics publish 5,000 copies for distribution among the people of the counties of Colorado, Fayette, Lavaca, Bastrop, Travis, Williamson, Bell, Hamilton, Comanche, Brown, San Saba, Lampasas, Burnet, Llano, Hays, Caldwell Guadalupe.

That the San Antonio Express publish 5,000 copies for distribution in the counties of Jackson, Mason, Menard, Landa, Edwards, Kerr, Gillespie, Blanco, Borden, Bexar, Comal, Wilson, Gillespie, Kendall, Karnes, Goliad.

36. That the Galveston Republican publish 5,000 copies for distribution in the counties of Burleson, Milam, Robertson, Madison, Leon, Freestone, Limestone, Falls, McLennan, Matagorda, Wharton, Bill, Bosque, and Navarro.

37. That the McKinney Messenger publish 5,000 copies for distribution in the counties of Hunt, Collin, Dallas, Tarrant, Cooke, Denton, Montague, Wise, Parker, Palo Pinto, Jack, Tarrant, Young, Johnson; Ellis, Erath, Wood, Hood, and Taylor.

38. That the Paris Vindicator publish 5,000 copies for distribution in the counties of Davis, Bowie, Titus, Red River, Lamar, Hopkins, Kaufman, Fannin and Grayson.

39. That the Tyler Index publish 5,000 copies for distribution in the counties of Anderson, Cherokee, Harrison, Henderson, Houston, Cook, Sabine, San Augustine, Shelby, and Smith.

**San Patricio, Nueces, Live Oak, Bee, Atascosa, Medina, Uvalde, Zavala, Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Kinney, Presidio, Maverick, Coryell, and El Paso.**  
That the Free Press for Texas publish 5,000 copies for distribution among the general population in the State wherever located.

40. That the Galveston Republican publish 5,000 copies for distribution in the counties of Burleson, Milam, Robertson, Madison, Leon, Freestone, Limestone, Falls, McLennan, Matagorda, Wharton, Bill, Bosque, and Navarro.

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43. That the Tyler Index publish 5,000 copies for distribution in the counties of Anderson, Cherokee, Harrison, Henderson, Houston, Cook, Sabine, San Augustine, Shelby, and Smith.

44. That the Union Republican, at Houstonville, publish 5,000 copies for distribution in the counties of Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Polk, Gillespie, Newton, Orange, Panola, Palo Pinto, Tyler, Hardin, Chambers, Van Zandt and Wood.

45. That said several newspapers distribute these extras published by them, and present their respective accounts of liquidation and settlement at the re-assembling of this convention, in December next.

A resolution was adopted authorizing the widow of Capt. Oakes to draw all pay due him, and providing \$300 for the payment of funeral expenses.

Degenert raised a question of privilege, because of the omission to print in the published minutes, the declaration granting lands to the Pacific Railway.

Fleming called up a string of new counties, some were passed, and some were defeated.

Foster called up a declaration in relation to the lands on the Memphis and El Paso R. R.

Degenert moved to strike out "subject to genuine land certificates."

Flanigan moved the previous question. Previous question seconded.

Degenert moved a call of the house. Call sustained.

On motion, the Convention adjourned until 9 o'clock tomorrow morning.

**Frank Blair's Fenian Speech.**  
In the Summer of 1856, Frank P. Blair, now Democratic candidate for Vice-President, made a speech at St. Louis, in response to a serenade by a Fenian procession. The Boston Traveller has fished up a full report of the speech, which was as follows:

GENTLEMEN: I am with your heart and soul, and heartily say, "God bless the Fenians!" [A voice—"Fenians, General."] I know what I am talking about, and I say Fenians. [Laughter and confusion.] And I say that I hope to see the cause flourish and prosper, and shall bless the day when Ireland is governed by Irishmen. In accomplishing this laudable undertaking, I will do all I can to assist you. I will place myself, if needs be, at your head, march with you to Staten Island, oversee your embarkation, will stand on the most elevated bluff of the coast, and as you raise the green emblem over the Stars and Stripes, while your steamers under full headway are turning their bows to the east, I will say, good-by, God bless you, and may you be successful in your undertaking. May you lift the British lion out of his boots, and wrest from his grasp the emerald gem of the sea; but whether or not you shall succeed in this endeavor, may you each and all remain in Ireland or elsewhere, and never again set foot upon these shores! You are wanted there, and we can get along without you!"

Here Frank was choked off, and hoisted from the stand.

The Plain Peril.

It is a little more than a month since the Democratic nominations were made. The Convention declared for repudiation, and asserted that the Reconstruction acts were revolutionary and void.

Mr. Seymour and his supporters struggle in vain to hide the issue. His orators and his papers attempt to make the financial question paramount, and to frighten and disgust the country by the grossest misrepresentation of the expenses of the Government, and by magnifying corruption.

are inevitably postponed. The public burden can be lightened—that is, taxation can be diminished—only as the wealth of the country increases.

The Democratic policy is necessarily one of civil war. It does not propose a peaceful solution of any difficulty. And that this is distinctly understood is evident.

But the party was riper for a more decided revolution and anarchical policy. Mr. Langdon proposed that the President should act in deference to a judgment of the Supreme Court overruling the reconstruction acts.

"There is but one way," wrote General Blair, and for saying so he was nominated—there is but one way to restore the Government and the Constitution, and that is for the President to declare these acts null and void, compel the army to undo its usurpations at the South, disperse the carpet-bag State governments, allow the white people to reorganize their own governments, and elect Senators and Representatives.

This is the acknowledged and accepted policy of the party. That portion which, just before the nomination of General Blair upon this declaration, admitted that the new State governments had been recognized by Congress, and that consequently, according to the decision of the Supreme Court, there was no other lawful method of changing them than that provided by their constitutions, now assert that the election will decide whether those governments are to stand or to be overthrown, as General Blair says, by force.

The Way the Rebels "Accept the Situation."

"If I am forced into collision, I tell you that every man shall be compelled to do his duty. They have got to take sides with us or the other party. We will have no neutrals; all must show what they are. If they are not for us then they will be against us. We must be a unit on this very grave question. The militia will be a unit, and we must be in the same position."—[Forrest, at Brownsville.]

"The reconstruction acts are null and void, and shall not stand." The grinning skeletons which have been set up in our midst as legislators shall be ousted by FRANK BLAIR, whom our party has expressly appointed for that purpose. Young men, in whose veins the red blood of youth runs so quickly, let the ardor of your temperaments, the pulsations of your hearts, all beat for Georgia! **OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES, Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress.**

[Public Law No. 70.]  
An Act making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the government for the year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and sixty nine, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby, appropriated, for the objects herein after expressed, for the fiscal year ending the thirtieth June, eighteen hundred and sixty nine viz:

**Miscellaneous.**  
For necessary expenses in carrying into effect the several acts of Congress authorizing loans and the issue of treasury notes, one million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars: Provided, That none of the said sum shall be used to pay commissions for the purchase, sale, or conversion of the bonds or notes of the United States: And provided further, That all necessary letter press printing and book binding, in all the departments and bureaus, shall be done and executed at the Government Printing Office, and not elsewhere, except registered bonds and written records, which may be bound as heretofore at the department.  
For carrying out the provisions of the acts of the thirtieth of August, eighteen hundred and fifty two, for the better protection of the lives of passengers on vessels propelled in whole or in part by steam, and of the persons on board of the same, and for the salaries of the superintending and local inspectors, eighty thousand four hundred dollars; for the travelling expenses of the superintending inspectors, ten thousand dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary: Provided, That no superintending inspector shall be allowed for travel in his district in any one year a greater sum than one thousand dollars; for the travelling expenses of the local inspectors, twelve thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary: Provided further, That no local inspector shall be allowed for travel in any one year a greater sum than five hundred dollars. For the travelling expenses of a special agent of the department one thousand five hundred dollars; for the expenses of the meeting of the board of superintending inspectors, including travel, printing of manual and report, three thousand five hundred dollars, and there shall be but one meeting annually of the said board, which shall be at the city of Washington on the second Wednesday of January in each year, for stationery, for furniture of offices and repair thereof, for repair and transportation of instruments, and for fuel and lights, fifteen thousand dollars.  
For facilitating communication between the Atlantic and Pacific States by electrical telegraph, forty thousand dollars.  
For expenses in detecting and bringing to trial and punishment persons engaged in counterfeiting treasury notes, bonds, and other securities of the United States, as well as the coins of the United States, and other frauds upon the government, one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.  
To meet expenses incurred in the prosecution and collection of claims due the United States, fifteen thousand dollars, to be disbursed under the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury.  
For supplying deficiency in the fund for the relief of sick and disabled seamen, one hundred and fifty thousand dollars: Provided, That hereafter the Secretary of the Treasury shall communicate at each annual session of Congress a full and complete statement in detail of the amounts collected from seamen, and also the amount expended for sick and disabled seamen, in accordance with the provisions of the act of May third, eighteen hundred and two.  
For salaries of commissioners under "An act to provide for the revision and consolidation of the statute laws of the United States," approved June twenty seventh, eighteen hundred and sixty six, and for clerical services and other incidental expenses, the printing to be done by the Government Printing Office, seventeen thousand dollars.  
For payment of the messengers of the respective States for conveying to the seat of government the votes of the electors of said States for President and Vice President of the United States, twenty five thousand dollars.  
Towards rebuilding the United States Military Asylum for disabled soldiers at Togus, near Augusta, Maine, destroyed by accidental fire, twenty five thousand dollars; Provided, That the building shall be completed without any further appropriation by the government.  
For the payment for the Congressional Globe and Appendix, for the fiscal year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and sixty eight, twenty thousand dollars; to be taken from the appropriation heretofore made and unexpended for the purchase of one complete set of the Congressional Globe and Appendix for each senator and representative who has not already received them.  
**Survey of the Coast.**  
For the survey of the Atlantic and Gulf coasts of the United States, including compensation of civilians engaged in the work, and excluding pay and emoluments of officers of the army and navy, and petty officers and men of the navy employed in the work, two hundred and seventy five thousand dollars.  
For continuing the survey of the western coast of the United States, including compensation of civilians engaged in the work, one hundred and thirty thousand dollars.  
For publishing the observations made in the progress of the coast survey of the United States, including compensation of civilians employed in the work, five thousand dollars.  
For pay and rations for engineers for steamers used in the hydrography of the coast survey, no longer supplied by the Navy Department, per act of June twelfth, eighteen hundred and fifty eight, ten thousand dollars.  
For repairs and maintenance of the complement of vessels used in the coast survey, thirty thousand dollars.  
**Northern and North-western Lakes.**  
For the survey of northern and northwestern lakes seventy five thousand dollars.

**Surveys of the Coast.**  
For the survey of the Atlantic and Gulf coasts of the United States, including compensation of civilians engaged in the work, and excluding pay and emoluments of officers of the army and navy, and petty officers and men of the navy employed in the work, two hundred and seventy five thousand dollars.  
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For repairs and maintenance of the complement of vessels used in the coast survey, thirty thousand dollars.  
**Northern and North-western Lakes.**  
For the survey of northern and northwestern lakes seventy five thousand dollars.
