The Plain Peril. It is a little more than a month since the Democratic nominations were made. For necessary extenses in carrying into effect the several acts of Congress authoriz ing loans and the issue of treasury notes, on million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars: Provided. That none of the said sum shall be used to pay commissions for the pur chase, sale, or conversion of the bonds of notes of the United States: And provided further. That all necessary letter press prin-And provided ing and book binding, in all the departments and bureaus, shall be done and executed at the Government Printing Office, and not elsewhere, except registered bonds and writ ten records, which may be bound as heretofore at the department
