Mad Stone.

From the Memphis Avalanche.

For the first time in our life we saw yesterday, a genuine mad stone, and heard its history from the owner, who inherited it from his father. The fortunate possessor is Colonel R. Lee Milan, of Waterford, Marshall county, Mississippi. Col. Milan is a prominent citizen of his county, and his statements set at rest any doubts that we may have had about the efficacy of mad stone in curing the bites of mad dogs, cats, snakes, spiders, or other venomous animals or insects. Col. Milan is a native of Madison county, North Alabama, whence he removed in 1835. The family came from Virginia, and the Colonel also inherits his middle name, being a second cousin of General R. E. Lee.

The mad stone in his possession is about the size of a hen egg, as heavy as a smooth brick and rather more porous, and is of a light clayish color. One end is flat as if it had been sawed off, and a grain runs through the stone from end to end as if it had, in some former age, been so much wood or bone. About fifty years ago, this stone was split in three or four pieces, but was carefully fastened together with a wire, which still performs its office. The stone was brought from China, in the year 1820, by a Dr. Barber. The Doctor died in a few years, and the stone was sold at public sale among his other property. Mr. Jarvis Milan, the Colonel's father, was the purchaser, and at his death he willed the stone to the present owner, with the condition that all his family should have the use of it as often as necessary, free of any charge.

As to its virtues, Col. Lee Milan states that it has been applied with success in over one thousand cases, and has only failed in two, and in those the parts affected could not be successfully reached. He has used it himself over two hundred and fifty times. When applied it adheres as if by suction, and usually remains on ten or twelve hours. When the poison is all extracted the stone falls off. During the process a very offensive stench fills the room, making the air sickening in the extreme. The stone is then washed in warm water from twenty-four to thirty-six hours, when it becomes clean and is again ready for use. Col. Milan asserts that he can cure any case of dog, snake or other bite, if he has mad stone on hand, and actually set in. Cases have been observed even as long as two weeks after the bite. Each week the stone was used successfully in several cases. It is known for many miles around, and the people come from far and near to be healed.

Col. Milan has been offered five thousand dollars for this wonderful stone, but always refused to entertain the proposition. He said playfully yesterday that he might sell it for ten thousand dollars if the buyer would promise to always allow him the use of it.

We have always been inclined in our ignorance, to suppose that the use of the mad-stone was a silly superstition. But of late several apparently veracious accounts of its efficacy have constrained our attention.

Near the town of Sherman, Grayson county, resides a gentleman possessing one of these strange stones, which has been tested with entire success in scores of cases of bites from snakes and rabid dogs. We understand the son of the present possessor at Sherman was thus cured with others in 1867.

It is to be hoped that those of our readers who may have practical knowledge of the power and virtue of the mad-stone, will communicate their experience upon a theme so fraught with interest, and which is dismissed by medical books and medical men with contempt.

The Constitutional Convention.

It seems to be the fate of legislative bodies in these times to suffer abuse. The disposition to malign and misrepresent such assemblies appears to be chronic.

When the Convention first assembled, its friends, perhaps, expected too much, and its enemies expected too little of it.

That there were some able minds in the body cannot be denied; but that intellect did not control its deliberations is equally without question.

The prolonged discussion of the ab initio question was doubtless the cause of this strange denouement.

The division of the State, politically speaking, was subordinate, advocated by many as a remedy for existing divisions.

Up to this time, the Convention was in bad repute with Conservatives generally. It had done nothing to gratify them.

In the first place, the suffrage clause in the proposed constitution bestows the right to vote upon the colored man inalienably.

The courts may have to settle the question. A very decided majority of the Convention meant, as was tested by a vote, that no person shall enjoy the elective franchise who is disqualified from holding

Gen. Canby on Texas.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Gen. Canby writing to the Secretary of War from Austin, Feb. 4, says, the convention has completed the constitution for Texas, and it will be submitted to the people some time in July.

The present Commanding General of this District in his report to the Secretary of War, gives a description of the anarchical and disorderly condition of affairs here.
