Be if resolved by the Senate and House of laprocentatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the act of Representatives of the Uside States of Americal in Congress assembled. That the act of February nineteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, entitled "An act to declare the sense of an act coulted. An act to restrict the jurisdiction of the Court of Claims," and so forth, shall not apply to nor be construed to debar the settlement of claims for steamboats or other vessels taken without consent of the owner, or impressed into the military service of the United States, during the late war, in States or parts of States declared in insurrection: Provided, That the claimants were loyal at the time their claims originated, and remained loyal states, and such steamboats or other vessels were in the insurrectionary districts by proper authority, ris: charter, contract, impressment, or in conformity with rules or regulations established by the Secretary of the Treasury and approved by the President of the United States.


