The Democratic Party.

In the history of the politics of this country, there has never been a time requiring sagacity or acuteness in the politician or statesman, amore than the present, because we have the unusual and startling fact, that there exists a large and powerful party, without any well-defined. principles or purposes. The only principle of cohesion discoverable among its members is the "damu the nigger anyhow" principle.

In the North, in such States as New York, Ohio and Indiana, where the party have something more than a semblance of strength; its whole effort is to defeat the 15th Amendment, or, as in New York, rescind its ratification. In the South there does not prevail any unanimity of sentiment in the party on the 15th amendment matter, except that it is tyranuous and unconstitutional. Thus, notwithstanding, it is evident, that the amendment will become a part of the fundamental law of the land, we have the spectacle of a political party, unable to rise above a dead issue, and whose only stock in trade consists in stale abuse of each and every branch of the Government, or its civil and army officers, reckless of truth and decency. On questions of finance, the tariff, the foreign policy of the government, and many other grave and earnest issues of the hour, this party has no ascertainable, opinion, and only wastes its time in whining over, criticising and villifying what the party in power does.

They called the Republican party "radical," hoping to destroy it by a word. It only gave it renewed strength, resolution and imesistability-because there was a principle in radicalism. This principle is, 'all government derives its just powers from the consent or the governed." The ballot is the best protection of the rights of freemen in a free country. The party insists that impartial suffrage is not secure under State constitutions, which are subject to repeal or modification any day, for by laws of apprenticeship and labor, the colored race would be sunk again to a state of serfdom and ignorance. Cannot these men see that this retrogration is a sure and straight road to another civil war! On this subject the American people cannot be induced to reverse the verdict already pronounced.

If the democratic party were wise particularly in the South, they would accept, without complaint, that which is inevitable, and advance to new and nobler issues.

There is need of a healthy and intelligent opposition party. A vigorous and honest opposition restrains party excesses, but a blind hurling of abuse and billingsgate only exasperates and strengthens the other side. In our own State we have need of wisdom and moderation, and the democratic party here may help decency and reason.

THE NUMBER OF BOGUS DEALERS.

We have in this city 75 genuine thunder against everything decent importers and wholesale traders, be sides a large army of retail dealers and others, who are every year beaten in their business by the bogus watch importer, backed by about 50 dealers in goods. Not less than 100,000 of these bogus and oroide watches were sold in this country last year, and as the demand is continually increasing, the number disposed of this current year will probably exceed this. Their shops are usually stowed away in little hall-ways, in dark basements, or up two or three each client can afford, or thinks he flights of stairs in some large buildcan afford, to pay roundly for jus ling where there is likely to be a great deal of traffic on other accounts. Indeed, so extensive is the business transacted by some of the boon Broadway boldly proclaims the character of his trade, and yet, we anderstand, sells from \$30,000 to \$40,000 worth a month. Poor humanity loves to be duped and swindled, and like gambling or drinking or any other passion, when this desite to gain a million by investing a thousand in a lottery, or which is the same thing differently applied the passion to get a \$250 gold rendering a full equivolent, can never be deceived by such flimsey shows. And yet some well-mean ing men are very often deceived by these sharp and shrewd ones.

HOW IT IS DONE. Every watchmaker understands full well that to insure a serviceable article, every plate, pirs cog, and wheel in those timekeepers must be made and finished with the utmost mathematical accuracy. A failure or a flaw in any particular is fatal to the whole. And every man who has carried a watch for any length of time, is also aware of the trouble and vexation which a loose screw or dictire and partial legislation which a tightened spring may give him: was enacted from 1861 to 1864 in. To make the fraud more complete and the better to deceive the too gullible public, the oroide dealers adopt the trade marks of respectable manufacturers, and advertise in the same style and as far as possible in the same papers throughout the country as the legitimate manufacturers and dealers. For instance, these dealers know that the watch es made at Waltham are known by their different trade marks, and numbered in proper order, and that the gold cases are everywhere stamped, indicating whether it is 14, 16, or 18 caret fine; and that the silver cases are all marked coin silver, and American Watch Co." stamped on the case. Thus the American Watch Company makes a watch bearing the well-known trade mark of P. S. Bartlett, Waltham, Mass. On the imitation watch Bartlett is marked Bartley, Waldham, indica-ting clearly a purpose to deceive, and is sold by bogus dealers, with the private marks, numbers, and everything, except that "Waltham' is spelled Waldam. 


