The Removal of the Sent of Government.

It appears, from recent dispatches, that a bill has been introduced into Congress providing for the removal of the seat of government to some point, not designated, in the Mississippi valley. The newspapers of the northwest have been agitating this subject a good deal during the past six months, and are generally favorable to the project. A number of members, of Congress have, also, been enlisted in its support, and it is not improbable that the question will soon become a serious one to the whole country.

The arguments in favor of removal are, in the main, that the Capitol should be located near the geo graphical center of the country for convenience of access; that the present site is dangerously exposed, and difficult and coatly to protect, not only against invasion by a foreign enemy, but also against any formidable insurrection; and that is present proximity to the great commercial and manufacturing cities of the Atlantic sea-board, give those cities an indue and unhealthy influence over the government, in their peculiar interests. There are other minor arguments given, but these are the principle ones.,

In reply, it is arged, that the facilities for rapid journeying in these times, and the ease of communication by telegraph with the remotest nooks and corners of the Republic, do away with the grounds for the first argument; that no foreign country would entertain the audacious idea of invading the soil of this great and thickly populated Repub-lic, and that, if they did undertake to do so, in these days of monitors, fronclads and other modern contrivances for defense as well as destruction, no army, however formidable, could ever ascend the Potomic, or reach Washington City by any other route. It is needless to say, that this is the weakest objection made, sounding a good deal more like buncome than common sense.

As to insurrection, it is said, none is ever again possible, and if it were it would make no difference, where the seat of government might be, it would be the objective point, thus transferring the struggle to its vi cinity. The last number of the New York Tribune which has reached us asks the question which stands at the head of this article. It concludes that "many subjects will be press-ed upon the attention of Congress forthwith; yet none of them, more important, or more urgent, than the restoration of Virginia to her proper place in the councils of the Repub.






