## TELEGRAPHIC

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS.  
 WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 27.  
 Porter announced his approval of the  
 Virginia bill.  
 Platt, Ridgeway and Milner were seated.  
 The House voted to seat Porter, but he,  
 with Hays and Gibson were not present,  
 but will be seated upon appearance at the  
 Bar of the House.

Senate—The resolution nullifying the  
 decisions of Revenue officers, regarding  
 whiskey seizures, was indefinitely post-  
 poned. This action releases one million  
 dollars worth of California whiskey.  
 No action yet regarding Virginia Sena-  
 tors.  
 Revenue to-day \$679,600.

The President nominated John Estlin,  
 formerly editor of the Memphis Post, Com-  
 missioner of education vice Bernard.  
 Lewis, Senator from Virginia, was seat-  
 ed. Porter, after a hard struggle was  
 seated.

There is no probability of the Senate  
 passing the bill abolishing the franking  
 privilege.  
 The Speaker announced as a special com-  
 mission on postal telegraph, Washburne,  
 of Wisconsin, Lawrence, Daves, DAVIS,  
 Palmer, Woodward and Beck.

The bill abolishing the Franking privi-  
 lege, was passed by 174 to 14.  
 It repeals all laws and parts of laws  
 giving to any officer or department of the  
 Government, or other persons, the right  
 either to send or receive, through the  
 mails, free of postage, any letter, docu-  
 ment or other mailable matter.

Terry officially communicates to the War  
 department the organization of the Geor-  
 gia House of Representatives. After a  
 careful examination of the law, Terry says  
 he is convinced that no authority exists  
 for giving seats of ineligible members to  
 those receiving the next highest vote.  
 Members from the newly restored States  
 get no back documents, they having  
 heretofore been distributed.  
 Senator Lewis, from Virginia qualified.  
 The currency bill was resumed and dis-  
 cussed to adjournment.

**ENNU.**  
 "Ennu" is enumerated by Dr. Noi-  
 rat among things eminently destruc-  
 tive of life. We have scarcely its  
 equivalent in the English language;  
 but it is idleness in youth, sorrow in  
 the adult, and weariness and despair  
 in old age. Whatever induces moral  
 depression is as baneful to exist-  
 ence as that which induces physical  
 depression. Firmness of will is,  
 therefore, one of the most salutary  
 means. The seven cardinal virtues  
 were faith, hope, charity, temper-  
 ance, justice, and force. The seven  
 mortal sins, pride, avarice, idleness,  
 luxury, and gluttony. The one is fa-  
 vorable to long life, the other fatal to it.  
 The force of will, by giving a high  
 tone to the more noble faculties of  
 the soul, strengthens the principle of  
 life, and enables both mind and body  
 to resist all that is pernicious and  
 hurtful to it. Fear or indecision, on  
 the other hand, delivers it up to the  
 enemy. Energy in doing good is still  
 more sustaining than even strength  
 of will devoted to mere selfish ends.  
 It is the feeling which enables a medi-  
 cal man to perform his duties with  
 cheerfulness and impunity in time of  
 pestilence and plague. Fabrizio, afflicted  
 by a fatal complaint withdrew to  
 the country to die. A family of  
 peasants supplicated his aid in the  
 case of a disastrous accident, and  
 their gratitude was so lively and

sinister for the cure effected, that the  
 physician felt that if his life was uter-  
 ly useless, he had no right to ab-  
 stract it from that of others. He re-  
 sumed his labors, recovered his  
 health, and lived to a good old age.  
 Barthes, Foderé, and Hufeland, all  
 believed that great power of will  
 could induce prolongation of life.  
 It is certainly powerful to relieve.  
 Kant used to say that most nervous  
 disorders are due to idleness and  
 mental inertia. Many conditions of  
 debility, discomfort, distress, and  
 sickness, arise, indeed, from mere  
 fretful and cowardly giving way to  
 corporeal sensations. The great  
 French Revolution roused many  
 poor, sickly, and languishing per-  
 sons to health and activity.

The Berwick's Bay and Texas Railroad Charter.

The new charter recently granted by the Legislature of Louisiana to the Berwick's Bay and Texas Railroad Company...

Policy of the New Administration.

Governor Davis has been installed as Provisional Governor, and cannot be considered fairly in possession of all the prerogatives of the chief Executive of the State...

Berwick's Bay and Texas Railroad.

An Act relative to the Berwick's Bay and Texas Railroad Company, and to expedite, facilitate and aid the construction and maintenance of a Railroad between the city of New Orleans and the State of Texas...

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana in General Assembly convened, That the rights, privileges and immunities conferred by and granted to the Berwick's Bay and Texas Railroad Company by their act of incorporation under the general incorporation laws of the State of Louisiana are hereby confirmed, and made perpetual...

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, That the said Berwick's Bay and Texas Railroad Company is hereby granted the right of way through all lands belonging to the State of Louisiana to the width of seventy five (75) yards for the construction and maintenance of its railroad and branch or branches, and also such State lands as may be required, on which to construct turnouts, depot buildings, machine shops and other necessary buildings...

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, That the Berwick's Bay and Texas Railroad Company, upon the location of its railroad over and across Berwick's Bay, shall have a well constructed and suitable draw thereon, which, when open, shall give a clear space of not less than eighty (80) feet for the passage of vessels...

Sec. 4. Be it further enacted, etc., That no distinction shall be made on account of race, color or previous condition between the persons employed in the construction and maintenance of the railroad and branches of the Berwick's Bay and Texas Railroad Company...

Sec. 5. Be it further enacted, etc., That the Legislature hereby authorizes and directs the Secretary of State to extend the boundaries of the State of Louisiana to the Mississippi River, and in consideration of the large expenditure to be made by the said company for the construction and maintenance of its line of railroad, and the great benefits to be derived by this State and citizens therefrom...

Sec. 6. Be it further enacted, That the bonds to be issued under the provisions of this act shall be dated on the first day of January, 1870, and shall be of the denomination of one thousand dollars each...

Sec. 7. Be it further enacted, That in order to meet the interest and principal, as the same may become due, of the bonds issued under the provisions of this act, the State Auditor shall, as soon as he has received the assessment rolls of any year, and before he issues his orders for the collection thereof, add to the assessment upon the taxable property of the State an amount exceeding by twenty per cent the amount of the interest accruing annually on said bonds...

Sec. 8. Be it further enacted, That all laws or parts of laws conflicting with this act are hereby repealed, and that this act shall take effect on and after its passage.

European Guides. Mark Twain, in his most interesting, instructive and luminous book, lately published, entitled "The Innocents Abroad, or, the New Pilgrim's Progress," gives the following as a specimen of the treatment accorded by his party to the bores and nuisances, yclept guides...

"What I tell you gentleman! Is it not so? See! handwriting Christopher Columbus—write it himself!" We looked indifferent, unconcerned. The doctor examined the document very deliberately, during a painful pause, then he said, without any show of interest: "Ah! Ferguson—what—what did you say was the name of the party who wrote this?"

"Christopher Columbus!—great Christopher Columbus!" "Another deliberate examination. "Ah! did he write it himself, or—or how?" "He wrote it himself! "But sis is so great Christo—" "I don't care who it is! It is the worst writing I ever saw. Now you must not think you can impose upon us because we are strangers. We are not fools by a good deal. If you have got any specimens of penmanship of real merit, bring them out!—and if you haven't drive on!"

We drove on. The guide was considerably shaken up, but he made one more venture. He had something which he thought would overcome us. He said: "A gentleman, you come wis me! I show you beautiful, O! magnificent bust Christopher Columbus!—splendid, grand, magnificent!"

He brought us before the beautiful bust—for it was beautiful—and sprang back and struck an attitude: "Ah, look, gentlemen!—beautiful, grand,—bust Christopher Columbus! Beautiful bust, beautiful pedestal!" The doctor put up his eye-glasses—pronounced for such occasions: "Ah!—what did you say this gentleman's name was?"

"Christopher Columbus!—great Christopher Columbus!" "Christopher Columbus—the great Christopher Columbus. Well, what did he do?" "Discover America! Discover America. Oh, so driv!" "Discover America. No. That statement will hardly wash. We are just from America ourselves. Christopher Columbus—pleasant name—is he dead?"

"Oh, corpse di Baccho!—three hundred years!" "What did he die of?" "I do not know—I cannot tell." "Small-pox, think?" "I do not know, gentlemen! I do not know what he die of!" "May—may be—I do not know—I think he die of something." "Parents living?" "Im-possible!" "Ah—which is the bust and which is the pedestal?" "Santa Maria!—sic se bust!—sic se pedestal!" "Ah, I see—happy combination—very happy combination, indeed. Is—is this the first time this gentleman was ever on a bust?"

The Corinne (Utah) Reporter says of an item from the New York Evening Post, relating to the mortality among the Mormons: "We are sorry to say that the Post's information is too true in regard to the mortality among Mormon children. It is not, however, very well informed or else wishes to draw it very mild, for instead of the bones of very large barytes, like Heber Kimball's, burying only 48 children, we can show the Post polygamous graveyards of one family, as they call them here, that will tot up nearer 148. As this is certainly the healthiest climate known to explorers, equidized and modified as it is, the year round, by the military influences of the Great Salt Lake, it is an easy matter to point to this mortality evil—it is ploygamy, and nothing else."

Professor Whitney recently informed the Academy of Sciences of San Francisco that explorations conducted by him and others in 1869, in the South Park of the Colorado and the adjacent region, showed that there were several mountains over fourteen thousand feet in height, but probably none over fourteen thousand five hundred feet. They did not determine which mountain was the highest. One of them is called Mount Lincoln; another they named Mount Harvard, and another Mount Yale.

I. With regret, the Colonel Commanding announces to the Regiment, the death of Captain James J. Birney, 9th United States Cavalry, on Sunday, January 16th 1870, at twenty minutes past 7 A. M., after a brief illness.

Captain Birney entered the service, among the first to answer the call for volunteers September 1861, as a private in the 7th Michigan Cavalry.

He was promoted Second Lieutenant, January 26th, 1863, and as a reward for his noble and gallant conduct, in defending the Regiment's colors at the battle of Gettysburg, where he was captured, and afterwards, by his daring, escaped, he was promoted First Lieutenant, August 1st, 1868.

In March, 1864, he was promoted Captain, which rank he held till the close of the war; when he was appointed a Second Lieutenant in the Ninth U. S. Cavalry. He was promoted First Lieutenant, April 14th, 1867; Captain, December 1st, 1869; and was brevetted First Lieutenant and Captain U. S. A., for gallant conduct at the battle of Gettysburg.

As a brave officer, worthy gentleman, and esteemed friend, he will long be remembered and mourned by all who knew him.


