SECTION 1. That the ordinance passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1806, and hereafter published, in reference to payments made in so called Confederate currency, &c., be re-enacted with the following modifications and amendments thereof,

That all persons interested, their agents or assignees, are hereby required to settle with Messrs. Davis & Murphy within ninety days, from and after the publication of this Ordinance, the entire amount due to the City of San Antonio, on principal and interest on lands purchased from said city on fifty years credit, the payment of which having been made in so-called Confederate currency, since the 1st day of April, a. D. 1861, with whom, said Davis & Murphy, the claims as above stated are placed for settlement, and upon the presentation of their receipts for the payment of said principal and interest, in U.S. currency, the city will execute the final title to said parties.

SEC. That all persons who owe interest for lands purchased from the city of San Antonio, on fifty years credit, and have failed to pay the same, are hereby notified that the aforesaid firm has been employed by the city of San Antonio to institute legal proceedings against all delinquents, on said interest, from and after the lat day of May, a. D. 1870, in case such interest have not been paid in U.S. currency, to said city, up to said date.




