Re-enacting and amending an ordinance concerning payments made in Cemfederate money, or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio, to divers persons, &c., passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1866. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio:

Section 1. That the ordinance passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1866, and hereafter published, in reference to payments made in so called Confederate currency, &c., be re-enacted with the following modifications and amendments thereof, to wit:

to wit: That all persons interested, their agents or assignees, are hereby required to settle with Messrs. Davis & Murphy within ninety days, from and after the publicauinety days, from and after the publica-tion of this Ordinance, the entire amount

Treasury Notes or durrency of the late Confederate Government, worthless paper, purporting to be city scriped said city, saxed during that lime in payment of the principal and interest, or either of them, due to the said city upon lands sold by said city, or in assuming to act is the name of said city in signing or executing instruments of writing parporting to be releases or conveynnces from said city for such lands, or receipts for such pretended releases, conveyances and receipts, are bereby declared to be null and void.

Sec. 2. That to avoid any seeming injustice to those persons who have acted innocently and in good faith in making any such payments since the 1st day of April, a. D. 1961. All such persons a have paid to any person or persons acting as officers of said city, any such bonds, treasury notes, currency or scrip on account of the principal and interest, or either, due upon the lands heretofore sold by this city, shall, upon presentation and delivery to the Mayor of his or their receipts, for such


