Legislative Proceedings.
THIRTEENTH DAY.
SENATE.

(Continued from Sunday's paper.)
Senate met at 12 o'clock M. Appointed
time. Roll called.

Call of the Senate. Taken and Sergeant-
at-Arms ordered to bring in messages.
The Chair announced that nominations
were in order, for U. S. Senate.
Senator Hall nominated Morgan C Ham-
ilton for the term commencing March 4th
1871, and ending March 4th 1877.
Senator Douglas nominated Horace
Broughton for the same term.
Votes as follows:
M C Hamilton received (17) seventeen
votes.
Horace Broughton received (11) eleven
votes.

Senator Fountain nominated Lieut. Gov.
J W Flaungan for the term commencing
March 4th 1870, and ending March 4th
1875.
Whereupon Lieut. Gov. J W Flaungan
vacated his chair as presiding officer, ap-
pointing Senator Fountain to the chair.
Senator Broughton nominated Hon. Nelson
Plato, for the same term.
Senator Dahoney nominated L D Evans
for the same term.
Lieut. Gov. Flaungan received 18 votes.
Nelson Plato received 9 votes.
L D Evans received 1 vote.

Senator Baker nominated M C Ham-
ilton for the term ending March 4th 1871.
Senator Bowers nominated Hon. A H
Lattimer for the same term.
Hon. M C Hamilton received 17 votes.
Hon. A H Lattimer received 11 votes.

Senator Bowers moved to reconsider; the
motion of Senator Campbell's amendment
allowing mileage to the officers of the Sen-
ate. Carried.

Senator Bowers offered the following
amendment:
To amend by striking out the words
"Further that all elected officers be allowed
mileage in addition to per diem."
Senator Parsons moved to amend the
amendment as follows:
Resolved, That the subordinate officers of
the senate be allowed mileage going
from this adjourned session, and coming
to the regular session.

The Chair ruled the whole subject out
of order.
Senator Dahoney moved the Senate ad-
journ until to-morrow morning at 10
o'clock. Carried.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
STATE OF TEXAS,
Austin, Feb. 22, 1870.

House met pursuant to adjournment.
Roll called. Quorum present.
Journal of yesterday read, amended,
and adopted.

Mr. Sinclair offered the following resolu-
tion:
Whereas, Brevet Major-General J J
Reynolds, Commander of the Fifth
Military District, has exercised the duties
of his position with ability, honesty and
patriotism; and
Whereas, by his persistent refusal to ac-
cept of civil position as the hands of the
Legislature of Texas, he has deprived us
of any opportunity of giving his distin-
guished services to the country a substan-
tial and honorable recognition, and of
evincing by such promotion our confidence
in his statesmanlike patriotism and in-
tegrity, therefore,

Resolved, That we, the members of the
House of Representatives of Texas, for
ourselves and in behalf of our constitu-
ents, do hereby tender to Brevet Major-
General Reynolds our sincere thanks for
the ability, honesty and patriotism with
which he has discharged the laborious and
important, but delicate duties of Comman-
der of this Military District.

Resolved, That in Major-General (Reyn-
olds) the United States Government and
Army have an able, honest and faithful
public servant and officer; and that by his
just and faithful administration in this
District of the vast powers conferred on
him by the laws of Congress, he has added
laurels to those so justly earned by him
in the active military service of the coun-
try.

Resolved, That a copy of this preamble
and Resolutions be forwarded by the
Speaker of this House to Gen. Reynolds
and to His Excellency Gov. Davis, and
that Gov. Davis be requested to forward a
copy to His Excellency President Grant,
and the General of the Army, Gen. W T
Sherman.

On motion of Mr. Morrison, the resolu-
tions were adopted.
Resolved, That this House proceed to
the election of United States Senators at 12
o'clock M., this day, in the following or-
der, to-wit: first for the term ending fourth
March, 1870; second, for the term ending
fourth March, 1875; and third, for the term
ending fourth of March, 1871.

Mr. Tegner moved the adoption of the
resolution.
Mr. Adams offered the following amend-
ment:
Resolved, That this House will proceed to
elect U S senators to fill the two unex-
pired terms now existing, and none other-
wise to wit for the one expiring on the 4th
day of March, 1871, and one for the term
expiring March 4th, 1875.

Mr. Slaughter moved that the amend-
ment be laid on the table.
Yeas—48. Nays—31.
The resolution was then passed.
Mr. Robinson offered the following resolu-
tion:
Resolved, That the Senate is invited to
meet the House in this hall at twelve M
to-morrow, for the purpose of announcing
the votes of both Houses for Senators, or
the election of Senators, if such action be
necessary.

On motion of Mr. Morris the resolution
was adopted.
Mr. Spencer then came forward, qual-
ified and took his seat.
Mr. Abney moved a reconsideration of
the vote, removing Mr J Webster from the
position of 2d Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms
and electing E Crery in his place. Lost
Mr Tegner offered the following resolu-
tion:
Resolved, That the contestants of seats

of this House who have been declared en-
titled to their seat and who have accord-
ingly qualified and taken their seats in
this body, be and they are hereby declared
to be entitled to mileage and per diem as
other members.

On motion of Mr Zoeller the resolution
was adopted.
Mr Butler offered the following resolu-
tion:
Resolved, That the Commanding General
be requested to order the Comptroller
to pay the mileage of the members of this
Legislature by the nearest traveled route.
Mr Sinclair moved the adoption of the
resolution.

Mc Slaughter offered the following
amendment:
"Strike out public traveled route" and
insert stage route.
Mr. Sinclair moved the previous ques-
tion, which was acceded.
Main question ordered.

The question recurring upon the adop-
tion of the resolution, was carried in the
affirmative.
Mr Butler offered the following resolu-
tion:
Resolved, That this resolution be for-
warded immediately to the Commanding
General through his Excellency, E J Davis.

On motion of Mr Adams, the resolution
was adopted.
Mr. Lane offered the following resolu-
tion:
WHEREAS, Under the provisions of the
new constitution of the State of Texas, the
business of the District, Probate and
County Courts is consolidated, and the
whole to be transacted in the District
Court, the labors of the Court being thus
greatly augmented, will render it neces-
sary that the State be redistricted, and
with a view to an equal division of labor.

Be it Resolved, That the clerks of the
District and County Courts throughout
the State be requested to make out and
transmit to the Secretary of State imme-
diately a correct statement, under the
seal of their respective courts, of the
number of cases and their character, now
pending in their respective dockets, and of the
number of successions in the Probate Court
now unclosed.

Resolved, That the Secretary of State
be requested to address a copy of these
resolutions to the Clerks of the State.
Mr. Franks moved to lay the resolution
on the table. Lost.

Mr. Chambers moved the adoption of
the resolution. Carried.
Mr. Slaughter offered a resolution rela-
tive to the sending of a committee of three
for the purpose of presenting the Constitu-
tion of the United States.
Mr. McLean moved that the considera-
tion of the resolution be indefinitely post-
poned.
Motion ruled out of order.

Mr. Morrison moved to lay the resolu-
tion on the table.
Motion ruled out of order.
On motion of Mr. Morrison, the resolu-
tion was rejected.

Mr. Burns offered the following joint res-
olution:
Resolved, (The Senate concurring.) That
when this Legislature adjourns, it adjourn
to reconvene on the call by proclamation
of His Excellency Provisional Governor
Davis, on the admission of this State into
the Union of the United States.
Mr. Slaughter moved the rejection of the
resolution. Lost.

Resolution read the first time.
Mr. Pfaff offered the following resolu-
tion:
Resolved, That the officers of this House
are entitled to mileage homeward, and the
Commanding General is respectfully re-
quested to order the payment of the same.

On motion of Mr. Allen the resolution
was adopted.
Mr. Sinclair moved that the House pro-
ceed to the transaction of the business on
the Speaker's table. Carried.

In answer to Maj. Plumley's late resolution, introduced in the house of Representatives, declaring it the policy of the Republican party to make land grants to railroads, and for that purpose abrogate the obnoxious features of the Constitution, his constituents, the Republicans of Galveston, have held a public meeting and passed a resolution, disapproving of any such action, and instructing their representatives to use all legitimate means in power to defeat the proposed measure.

Letter From Austin.

AUSTIN, Feb. 17th 1870. The Exodus. - Gen. Buell. - All quiet on the Colorado.

The election of U. S. Senators over the Legislature assumed a common place aspect. On the 23rd the two houses met and declared the result, and at night held another joint session in the way of a jubilee to hear speeches from the two Senators, and any other man, as it turned out.

The galleries and lobby were crowded with spectators and the evening session was truly a lively spectacle. After the meeting was called to order by Speaker Evans, a committee accompanied Messrs. Hamilton and Flanagan, to stand amidst the cheers of the assemblage. Senator Hamilton was first introduced and made a short but impressive address, proving clearly that Texas has selected in him a first class statesman to represent him in the U. S. Senate.

Senator Flanagan was somewhat more lengthy, but his speech was very interesting, and I hope it will be printed for the benefit of the public.

After the Senators were through, calls were made upon Gen. Parsons, who came forth and made an eloquent speech.

At Gen. Parsons, Mr. Plumley of Galveston being called, spoke.

The Legislature then adjourned.

This morning both houses adjourned subject to call of the Military Commander.

The exodus has been very lively, there seems no disposition to loiter about Austin, the members are like a lot of school boys let out for vacation.

Gov. Davis leaves tomorrow for Corpus Christi, and will be in San Antonio on his return twelve days hence.

The gallant Gen. Baell is here, and it is reported has been offered \$10,000 per annum to serve as chief Engineer of the Memphis, El Paso and Pacific Railroad.

Speech of Hon. J. W. Flanagan Before the Legislature in Joint Session.

Hon. J. W. Flanagan being introduced spoke as follows:

SENATORS AND REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF TEXAS. I have been invited by your kindness to address you upon this occasion, and permit me to say in candor that if I said I was not excited, I should state that which was untrue. I have often addressed audiences of all grades and upon all matters that have been common to our State. Yet this to me, is the proudest moment of my life.

To whom am I addressing myself on this occasion? I already observed at the outset that it was to you, Senators and Representatives. Who are they, and what are they? I feel proud, I could not but feel so, from the first moment I made your acquaintance. Many of you I have known for many years; a great number however I never saw, or perhaps heard of before, save from the names published as elected Representatives of the State. I love to study man. It has been a fond study of mine from my youth. I love to look at the faces of humanity. I observe the walk of an individual. I draw conclusions from these observations. Permit me to say, gentlemen, that I have long participated in your legislations; I say it not with egotism, but simply to make the point I will arrive at very shortly. In doing so, I have necessarily mingled with many legislations from year to year, I am grateful that I was enabled to do so, and if I live, and I expect to say it again, I declare that this is the most sober and best behaved representation that Texas has ever sent to the city of Austin. (Applause.) I have seen intoxication on the part of members of either the one or the other branch of the Legislature in years gone by,

though I say it in no disparagement to former colleagues with whom I have spent many pleasant hours.

It is known to every individual who is familiar with the history of the State and its legislation, that I have ever been liberal upon the subject of internal improvements. I do not know any reason why I should retrace my steps or act differently in my future course. (Applause.) Nothing administers to the comforts of civilized man, or tends to develop the interests of any country so readily as internal improvements. Permit me to remark just in this connection that I was raised as an advocate of internal improvements. I was in that convention of 1836, and the constitution was then presented had a prohibition depriving the State from giving aid in any way, - manner or shape, towards internal improvements. I struggled hard in that convention to strike it out. I did not succeed. In the convention I held the constitution was reported with the same prohibition, and were it not for that Texas would blossom like a rose (applause) I might differ with distinguished gentlemen upon some parts of our constitution. This is no time to do it, nor is it necessary. I have no hesitations in saying that my honorable friend and myself will go along hand-in-hand - harmoniously - together - like brothers. (Applause.) I can say this to you; excuse me if you please, if I do so now in advance.

I have spoken of the sobriety which has characterized the session of this Legislature. What would you have done in the election of your representatives, who are destined to take at an early period their seats in the proudest body of this Union, that falls to the lot of man? Are they boys that you have selected? The reason is, they are not. They are citizens of the State of Texas whose interests are identified with it in every case, and have been for more than a quarter of a century; and I am told by my respected friend that notwithstanding he has been in Texas nearly thirty years he has never taken the first drop of intoxicating spirits. (Applause.) Your humble servant can tell you that he too has not taken the first drop in the State. (Applause and laughter.) We never chew tobacco nor smoke cigars. (Applause and laughter.) I hope these coincidences will be evidence that we have at least acted with sobriety so far, and that you have made your selections properly. We trust that we shall not prove remiss or disappoint your fond expectations in the future. I further wish to declare that, upon all occasions in the courts of the country where it has been my fortune to mingle with the young men of the bar, I have always been extremely anxious that they should succeed.

I have always been anxious to buoy them up. I do not undertake improperly to lecture my young friends. It is not my wish to do so to your disadvantage. But the lesson I give you is: You see to-night the position in which myself and my friend are placed. You know by whom we are placed in that position. You have our lives before you. We have been steady men. Will you accept the idea? You have conferred upon us the highest position known to an American citizen. If we had been intemperate and had been marching along the road which leads to a maelstrom, perhaps the honored name we now possess would have been possessed by others than ourselves. Young men, let me tell you - stand firm. First know that you are right and then, Crockett like, go ahead. (Applause.)

Upon the subject of our frontier, I have to say, it will be one of the fittest subjects of my life that I have ever participated in, to aid the helpless woman and tender babe - say, but to see unmistakably that ample force is placed upon our frontiers to protect the last individual's life that exists there. It must and shall be done. (Applause.) The residents of our frontiers must and shall be protected by the laws of the land. (Applause.) Now as to the Republican party, the Republican party of which I have the pleasure of being a member, as I hope, a party of progress. It is a party of liberty, power and mercy. In this State by its influence the Reconstruction laws of Congress have been ratified, and I feel upon this occasion that as the liberty of the colored man has been secured that I for one will never go back on him. Ours is a Republican Government. It was thus inaugurated by our forefathers in the first days of our Government. Arguments are not necessary to be adduced upon this occasion to go into this branch of the subject. Sufficient it is to say the 15th Amendment ratified in this Legislature contemplates what our views are, and it expresses to the civilized world what our actions have been and I declare for one that I am not the individual that contemplates at an early day to dodge the question.

I would like to talk to you longer, but there are no subjects to discuss now. I expect to give myself to the utmost of my humble ability in advocating the interests of the broad State of Texas. (Applause.) I have a request to make. I desire that every Representative here in both branches of the Legislature should, at a convenient period give me their photographs - let him be a colored member, or be who he may I want them all. (Applause.) I wish your names and I want to know you, what I am for away. I want to frame them and I want them in my den, and I want my young family, so that they may know who elected me to the U. S. Senate. (Applause and laughter.)

Senators, I can only add that a thousand times, gratified at the high compliment paid me in this election, and I saw simply invoke the blessing of the Almighty that prosperity may ever attend you all, and hope that when you march down the road of time and come to the best that waits you from time to eternity, that your pilot may be Him who upon the Red Sea delivered the children of Israel, and that he may land you safely upon the shores of the blissful eternities. (Applause.)

COLORED men in office are no longer a novelty. Mr. Revels in the Senate is followed by Justice Wright in the Supreme Court of S. Carolina. Mr. Wright, like Mr. Lynch, just chosen Secretary of State in Mississippi, is by birth or education a Pennsylvanian. He is a full-blooded black man, with no visible admixture of Caucasian tincture in his veins, although his features and form are of Caucasian type. He was at the time of his election a State Senator, and a practicing attorney. He bears the reputation of a pleasing and forcible writer. The certificate on which he was admitted to practice in the courts of South Carolina bears the seal of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania. A recent letter from a prominent Pennsylvania lawyer,

written before the election, speaks of him in the following complimentary terms: "He is eminent for his integrity, and devotes himself intelligently and earnestly to the advancement of his race and State." His opponent for the seat, J. J. Whipper, also a colored man, was from Michigan.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 26. The Southern bound passenger train fell through the Buckner trestle on the Mississippi Central railroad, about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon; smashing five cars, killing 15 passengers and wounding thirty.

W. Mire of Covington Ills.; Thomas Watson, emigrant, Mrs. Turner, unknown woman, two children, two colored brickmen and Lee Merchouse of Elkton, La.

The wounded are: Col. Sam. Tate, Chas. McConico, E. M. Hunnoldy, M. Tsalferro of Water Valley, Miss.; Sam. Frazer, Nashville, R. C. Boyd of La.; A. C. Geacarter, route agent, Jackson Tenn.; L. Lehman, Jackson, J. H. McDowell, Texas, Chas. Young, C. Hildebrand, Ills.; Richard Busted, Ala.; lady unknown. Capt. A. B. Spiel, Louisville, James Moore, colored, and an emigrant family, ten or twelve in number, all more or less injured; also W. J. Beeryman, wife and child, from Glasgow, Scott and many others were hurt, whose names could not be obtained, mostly emigrants.

HALIFAX, Feb. 26. The missing steamer City of Boston had 52 cabin and 55 steerage passengers, her officers were Capt. J. J. Hallow, Chief officer W. Mortimer, 4d officer John Crapin, 3d officer Henry K. Ames, 4th officer J. Stevens, purser W. M. Short, Engineer Alexander, 2d Engineer Hawky.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 26. The Picayune says H. Luckett shot and mortally wounded Capt. Hove on the steamboat Kate Kinney, at Alexandria, on Thursday.

The Central Republican Club elected a number of honorary members last night, among them Grant, Colfax, Boutwell, Sheldon and Durant of Louisiana. The names of Senators Kellogg and Harris, were proposed, but not accepted.

The Legislature passed a bill incorporating the Louisiana and Texas railroad company. They ask nothing but the right of way.

MEMPHIS, Feb. 26. Seventeen persons were killed by the railroad accident; they were mostly immigrants for Texas.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 26. Public meeting at Tepleo declared in favor of the independence of the northwestern States. General Lazado and Vega led the movement. The governments of Sonora, Chihuahua and Lower California favor the movement. The Governors of Coloma and Durango adhere to Juarez.

Local Intelligence.

From special Orders No. 41, published in this paper, it will be seen that the sale of the San Antonio and Mexican Gulf railroad company is prohibited by orders from the War Department. It is said the Government has a claim of \$40,000 on said road.

PERSONAL.—Hon. James P. Newcomb, Secretary of State, arrived in town Monday morning. He will remain in San Antonio for several days.

THEFT.—The residence of Capt. Starkweather was entered on Sunday night by a thief, who succeeded in stealing a gold watch and chain, a silver watch, a gold locket and a gold Masonic watch, value \$150 in all.

A FIRE was discovered yesterday morning, (Monday) at one o'clock, in the small wooden building opposite the Masonic Hall. One corner of the building was in full blaze when a policeman saw it and put it out in a few minutes. This prompt action of the policeman has very probably saved that portion of the city from a great calamity, as the neighborhood of the place abounds with buildings of combustible material.

THERE has been some excitement in town in consequence of the conflagration in Galveston, destroying the building of the Mutual Insurance company, and otherwise damaging the company, through loss of insured property. Fears were expressed that the company might not be able to sustain these losses. To ascertain the truth, we have endeavored to obtain the best information, and can assure our readers and the public at large, interested in the Mutual Insurance company of Galveston, that the loss of said company does not exceed \$40,000, and that the company is not at all affected by it, as far as its business reputation is concerned. The insurances will be promptly paid as heretofore.

THE CONCERT.—The Tyrolean Alpine singers have given two concerts in the Casino Hall, both of which were pronounced decided successes. The Hall was crowded on Saturday, as well as on Sunday nights, with a select audience, and the beauty of the town was fairly represented.

As we remarked on a former occasion, we did not go to the concert in expectation of hearing classical music; but we knew we would hear something just as good, and more palatable to the public in general. In this we have not been deceived. Although we do not approve of all the songs, the majority of them were decidedly to our taste; there are no sweeter melodies than the Tyrolean mountain songs; they were sang with a freshness and clearness of voice, seldom practised in this city.

The Bow Zithern is an extraordinary instrument, producing strange, but sweet tones to the ear; the performer seems to be perfectly at home on it, and handles it with artistic skill. His fugal tunes are charming in the highest degree.

The Wood and Straw Harmonica found great favor with the audience, it is a curiosity, and as such appreciated. The player was perfect master of the instrument. In general, we can well say that both concerts gave full satisfaction to the public.

We understand the singers started Monday for Boerne and Fredericksburg, where they intend to give concerts, on their return they will probably favor us by one or more of their public performances.

III. The resignation of J. R. Simmons as Justice of the Peace, Precinct No. 3, Austin county, is accepted, to take effect this date. He will, however, retain in his possession all books and papers pertaining to his office, until his successor shall qualify.

An Ordinance.

Re-enacting and amending an ordinance concerning payments made in Confederate money, or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio, to divers persons, &c., passed on the 10th day of January, A. D. 1869. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio:

SECTION 1. That the ordinance passed on the 10th day of January, A. D. 1866, and hereafter published, in reference to payments made in so called Confederate currency, &c., be re-enacted with the following modifications and amendments thereof, to-wit:

That all persons interested, their agents or assignees, are hereby required to settle with Messrs. Davis & Murphy within sixty days, from and after the publication of this Ordinance, the entire amount due to the City of San Antonio, on principal and interest on lands purchased from said city on fifty years credit, the payment of which having been made in so-called Confederate currency, since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861, with whom, said Davis & Murphy, the claims as above stated are placed for settlement, and upon the presentation of their receipts for the payment of said principal and interest, in U. S. currency, the city will execute the final title to said parties.

SEC. 2. That all persons who owe interest for lands purchased from the city of San Antonio, on fifty years credit, and have failed to pay the same, are hereby notified that the aforesaid firm has been employed by the city of San Antonio to institute legal proceedings against all delinquents on said interest, from and after the 1st day of May, A. D. 1870, in case such interest have not been paid in U. S. currency, to said city, up to said date.

SEC. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage. Passed, January 31st, A. D. 1870. Published February 2, A. D. 1870. WM. C. A. THIELEPAPE, Mayor of the City of San Antonio.

The ordinance above referred to and passed on January 10th, 1866, reads as follows:

AN ORDINANCE. Concerning payments made in Confederate money or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio to divers persons, declaring the instrument of writing purporting to be deeds from the city of San Antonio for said lands, to be null and void, and allowing credits on account of said principal and interest for the market value of the amounts paid at the time of payment.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of San Antonio:

SECTION 1. That the city of San Antonio does not recognize the act or acts of any person or persons, claiming to act as officers of said city, from the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861, until the ninth day of October, 1865, in receiving in the name of said city, the Bonds, Treasury Notes or Surrender of the late Confederate Government, worthless paper, purporting to be city scrip of said city, issued during that time in payment of the principal and interest, or either of them, due to the said city upon lands sold by said city, or in assuming to act in the name of said city in signing or executing instruments of writing purporting to be releases or conveyances from said city for such lands, or receipts for such pretended payments, and that all such pretended releases, conveyances and receipts, are hereby declared to be null and void.

SEC. 2. That to avoid any seeming injustice to those persons who have acted innocently and in good faith in making any such payments since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861. All such persons as have paid to any person or persons acting as officers of said city, any such bonds, treasury notes, currency or scrip on account of the principal and interest, or either, due upon the lands heretofore sold by this city, shall, upon presentation of the original receipts, or copies thereof, to the Mayor of this city, receive the amount of credit allowed him on them by the Mayor thereof, and shall refuse to receive from the Mayor a receipt for such amount, and to cancel such instruments of writing then in that case the Mayor shall deliver back to such person, or persons, the original receipts, and instruments of writing so delivered by him, or them, as aforesaid, and that therefor such receipts and instruments of writing shall be null and void.

SEC. 3. That in case any person or persons having delivered his, or their, receipts, and instruments of writing as mentioned in the 2d section of this ordinance, shall be dissatisfied with the amount of credit allowed him on them by the Mayor thereof, and shall refuse to receive from the Mayor a receipt for such amount, and to cancel such instruments of writing then in that case the Mayor shall deliver back to such person, or persons, the original receipts, and instruments of writing so delivered by him, or them, as aforesaid, and that therefor such receipts and instruments of writing shall be null and void.

SEC. 4. That it shall be the duty of the City Attorney, after the expiration of three months from the passage hereof to commence all necessary suits in the proper courts, for the cancellation of such instruments of writing as have not been surrendered up and cancelled according to the provision hereof, and for the recovery the principal, and interest, due to this city upon such bonds.

SEC. 5. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage. Passed Jan. 16th 1866. Mayor's Office San Antonio Jan. 16th 1866. (Signed) D. CLEVELAND, Mayor.

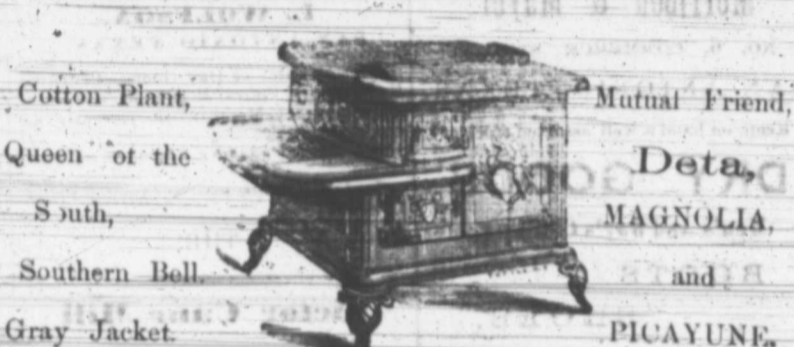

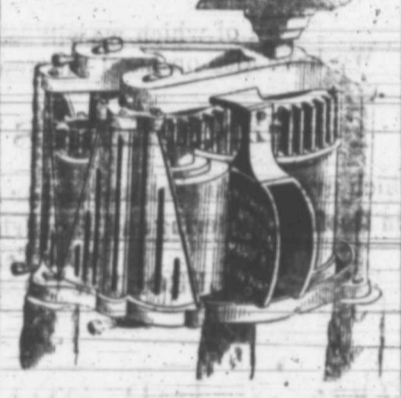
