Our Frontier.

We had the pleasure of a call yes terday from Judge Noonan of Castroville. In common with other settlers on our extended and unguarded frontier, the Judge has been a severe sufferer from the thefts and depredation of the Kickapoos, who have within the last three years stolen from his horse-ranch thousands of dollars worth of valuable animals.

The Judge feels, as do many others, that the frontier now needs, mainly and primarily, ranger companies composed of men accustomed to the rifle, the saddle, and the indian, acquainted with the country, able to travel in the rough and hardy manner of the savage, and to follow a hostile trail wherever it may lead, without the exhibarating accompament of camp equipage and baggage wagons.

New Mexico has already requested Congress to authorize the organization of two -volunteer regiments for this purpose, and the needs of Texas with a frontier of 1000 miles in length, exposed at all points to murderous attack, are surely not less. The regular troops are doing what they can, but the number now stationed on the border is entirely insufficient for the work assigned them, and their efforts should be supplemented forthwith by hardy companies of settlers who understand the Comanche nature, and will make war on Sheridans plan.

We look to the Legislature to devise some plan, by which the frontier of Texas shall cease to bleed, and will never relax our efforts until this object is attained.

THE ARMY BILL.-Senator Wilson has given assurances that the Army Bill will not pass the Senate in its present form. Material modifications and amendments will be made, and a committee and conference of the two houses will probably be called. We hope that at least the Bill as it passed the lower house, will be so changed as to transfer the control of Indian Affairs to the War Bureau, and break up the present Indian ring.

The Governor has been recently petitioned and beseiged by the relatives and friends of the young man, Cotton, sentenced to be hung in Galveston on the 8th of next month. The petitions embrace the names of the most influential citizens in the State, and the supplications of the relatives of the unfortunate man, have been really distressing; but the Governor after a very careful examination of the whole case, felt compelled to withhold his Executive clemency. Cotton killed a Captain Lockman over a year ago in Galveston, he had his trial before the District Court, and was found guilty of murder in the first degree; his case was appealed to the Supreme Court. and the decision of the lower Court was sustained. Although this case cast a momentary gloom over the Executive Department, it has proven that we have a Governor who can say "no," if occasion requires.

Immigration Changes.

For years past a remarkable divercity has been observable in the character and nationality of the vast tide of foreign immigrants, that continues to pour in upon our shores through the channels of New York. Half a generation ago, the Irish contingent far overtopped, nay, almost swamped all the rest. Then, gradually, the German quota began to increase, until it towered, at last, above the Irish. The English eleproper effort for the introduction of ment was very limited, and the settlers, but does not deem it pro- Scandinavian and other nationalities were represented in feeble proportions. Since the close of our civil war, however, the Scandinavian influx has become positively powerful, and the French and Italians make a very fair numerical show, while the English delegation begins to rival the Hibernian.

In the year 1869, as we learn by the latest annual report of our New CASE - ABSENCE OF THE York Commissioners of Emigration, -although why the word 'b'migralion" is used is a query, since they have nothing to do with those who emigrate from the United States,the total number of alien passengers arriving at this port was 258,989, or 45,303 more than in the year, and 75,399 above the average of the reeent past.

From analysis of the register, it appears that, although the Germans still numbered 90,605, or more than 33,000 in excess of tha Irish, they had slightly fallen off, while the latter had gained fully 50 per cent. This discloses the important fact that it required a Hibernian in-crease of one half, to come within two thirds of the Teutonic immigration, even although the latter had declined.

But the pure English immigration amounted to 41,000, having increased 33 per cent. in the one year. quotas, taken together, amount to 8,287-more than twice as much as

the State, and forthwith he sends in a modest little bill of one hundred especially when it is quite evident that the influx from Germany is certain to increase, owing to impending complications and threatened war upon the European Continent. On the other hand, in Ireland, the condition of things is greatly improving. The country is developing; agriculture has advanced; there is no forced millitary conscription; and a son of the soil has some chance to make a good living at home.

ing foremost, of course, with her great port of entry and large interior cities, absorbs 85,810, although it is a question whether at least half of that number do not soon move on to the interior, after recruiting health and pocket here, if such be their good fortune. Illinois is the next recipient, and she finds homes for 38,213 in her beautiful towns and fertile fields. Pennsylvania,the grand old Keystone State. already so tinctured with German and Swedish blood, stands third upon the list, with 32,135. follow Wisconsin, with 17,003; Ohio, 12,180; Massachusetts, 8,384; Iowa, 8,216; New Jersey, 8,101; and Michigan, 7,281. California, owing to its distance, gets only 8,806. Most of the Europeans who go thither make the direct passage by sea from the home-port of embarkation.

It is plain enough that the great flood of German immigration sets steadily toward the West, while the Irish linger chiefly in the cities and large towns. The consequence is that the former more readily become established owners of real estate, and extend their operations into large enterprises. This fact will tell most advantageously upon the future of their race in America. The South, too, begins to attract them, more and more, and as they enter it, in the right direction, and become better acquainted with the climate and resources of the country, they find the bugbear stories that that have been told them melting away from their imaginations, and learn that beautiful homes and almost endless harvests await industry and sobriety there, as well as in the West.

In a word, the great work of settling and tilling our vast national domain goes bravely on, and the supply of hands and brains ready for the task, arguments with the requirements.


