TELEGRAPHIC
The Senate and House debated all day
on Sumner's resolution.
Sherman's Ku Klux resolution's come up
to-morrow.
Judge Carter refused to honor the re-
quisition of the Governor of North Carolina,
for Fergon and Kirk. There is also a
requisition here for Holden.
The vote tabling Sumner's resolution
was 39 to 16.
Robertson, Schurz and Sumner voted no.
VERMONT, March 29.—The government
has issued a circular, announcing that
order is restored. The Lyons and Toulous
insurrections failed, and in all the large
towns, save Marselles, Norbonne, and San-
to-Etienne. The government is ready to-
day to meet and crush the insurrection.
Versailles is rapidly becoming a military
camp. Troops are continually arriving
from the departments. Amicable arrange-
ment between the Paris and Versailles
governments are still regarded as possi-
ble.
PARIS, March 29.—The Committee of the
Republic assigned six seats, but were
not elected.
VERMONT, March 29.—The deputies of
the Right in the Assembly demand the re-
moval of the Left. Thiers positively refuses
compliance.
Clemenceau resigned his seat in the As-
sembly.
Reichensow, member of the Left, has
declared himself a turncoat because the
official journal has defended assassination.
A motion was made in the Assembly to-
day to interrupt communication with
Paris.
VERMONT, March 29.—A government
circular says France is rallying to the sup-
port of the government, and it asserts that
the continued occupation of French territory
by the Prussians is due to the insur-
gents.
The government has temporized with
the insurrection to avoid bloodshed.
Menotti and Ricotti Garibaldi, have de-
clined a fight except against a foreign
enemy.
LONDON, March 29.—A special to the
World, dated Berlin, March 29, says there
has been a correspondence between Bis-
marck and the Central Committee at Paris.
The latter represented that the Thiers'
Government was unsupported in any prop-
er way by the country, and the election of
a new Assembly becomes necessary.
The committee offered, meanwhile, to pay,
in a few days, an instalment of the inden-
nity due to Germany.
Bismarck's reply was favorable.
The opinion here is strong that the res-
toration of the Empire, by the aid of the
Imperial army, is inevitable.
LONDON, March 29.—The Germans official-
ly deny having encouraged the insurrec-
tion.
LONDON, March 29.—At the Assembly at
Versailles to-day, there was a turbulent
meeting of the deputies. Large bodies of
cavalry and infantry have arrived from
the west, and a large military camp formed
at St. Germain for protection of the
government.
LONDON, March 29.—The House of Lords
passed funding bills and adjourned.
In the House of Commons the discussion
of the church question occupied the evening.
WASHINGTON, March 29.—Governor Wise
has been impeached.
Governor Holden has joined him here,
and he says he will not return; but the
Chronicle of this morning says he shall
soon return under federal protection.
It has been raining steadily.
Paris, March 29.—Noo. —The city is
quiet.
Daval has submitted a proposition to
disarm the National Guards who withheld
adhesion to the Paris government.
Assay, in a speech, said the Republic had
formed a committee of public safety, and
that opponents were to be shot down if
they attempt inferior measures. All con-
spirators will meet the same fate.
VERMONT, March 30.—The correspond-
ence between the Versailles and Gerwen
governments has resulted in permission to
Thiers to increase the Paris garrison to
20,000.

Another Fraud.
A little fellow on Tuesday in a
Canal street car saw his father hold
up before the admiring eye of the
public the Cincinnati Enquirer,
which was ornamented with an
immense rooster. The fowl was
exulting over the election in New
Hampshire after the old Demo-
cratic style. Said the boy, "What
is that, father?" said the sire, "That
is the sign of a Democratic victory
my boy; that rooster is the Demo-
cratic orator." And then he patted
the youth on the head, but a very
mournful expression crossed his
face as he remarked to his compan-
ion, "That boy of mine knows
nothing of these things; this is the
first victory the Democrats have
gained since he was born, and they
did not win this on their own mer-
its, but because the Republicans
made a mistake." The rooster was
folded away as a fraud.—N. O. Re-
publican.

HORACE GREELY sent to San
Domingo for fifty pea-nut trees to
set out with walnut trees on his
farm in Westchester county. He
has a theory that by grafting the
pea-nut and black-walnut some-
thing out of the ordinary line of
nuts can be produced. On being
told that pea-nuts grew on roots in
the ground, he looked disgusted,
and replied to his informant: "Do
you think I'm a damned fool, and
can be made to believe that nuts
and pertaters are the same thing?"

Major Washburne, with his party
of engineers, passed through Austin
on Monday of last week, on their
survey of the international route.
The road is to cross the Colorado
river a little east of Barton Springs.
The major says there is no grade
over fifty feet between the Brazos
river and the suburbs of Austin.
He also says there are fine beds of
coal on the hip of the road, between
Hearne and Austin. Colonel Gleau
says there are large asphaltum beds
within six miles of Austin, and that
it may be seen cropping out on the
river banks.—N. O. Republican.

The Man-Milliner of Paris.
The "Besieged Resident" in
Paris of the London News gives
these reminiscences of the im-
pendent man-milliner Worth: Am-
bassadors' wives and court ladies
used to go to take tea with the fel-
low, and dispute the honor of filling
his cup or putting sugar into it. I
once went into his shop—a sort of
drawing room hung round with
dresses. I found him looting on a
chair, his legs crossed before a fire.
Around him were a bevy of women,
some pretty, some ugly, listening
to his observations with the wrapt
attention of the disciples of a sage.
He called them up before him like
school girls, and after inspecting
them, praised or blamed their dress-
es. One, a pretty young girl, found
favor in his eyes, and he told her
that he must dream and meditate
several days over her, in order to
find the inspiration to make a gown
worthy of her. "Why do you wear
those ugly gloves?" he said to an-
other; "never let me see you in
gloves of that color again." She
was a very grand lady, but she
slipped off her gloves, and put them
in her pocket with a guilty look.
When there was going to be a
ball at court, ladies used to go down
on their knees to him to make them
beautiful. For some time he de-
clined to dress any longer the wife
of a great imperial dignitary who
had not been sufficiently humble to-
ward him. She came to him in tears
but he was obdurate, and he only
consented at last to make a gown
for her on the condition that she
would put it on for the first time in
his shop. The Empress who dealt
with him, sent to tell him that if he
did not abate his prices he would
leave him. "You cannot," he re-
plied, and in fact she could not, for
she stood by him to the last; a
morning dress by this artist, worth
in reality about £4, cost £30; an
evening dress, tawdry with flounces,
ribbons and bad lace, could not be
had under £70.—Israelite.

The tax-payers of San Antonio are hereby notified that the Assessor will be at the different wards of said city, on the days and places below mentioned, for the purpose of receiving the city assessment for the year of 1871.

Ward No. 1, residence of G. Fensch, market street, on 1st, 3d, 4th, 5th April.

Ward No. 2, Stannburg's building, Alamo, on 6th, 7th, 9th, 10th and 11th April.

Ward No. 3, next door to Mr. Mead's bar-room, Alamo street, on 12th, 13th, and 14th April.

Ward No. 4, a of City Collector, next to Th. Schluening's store, from the 15th day of April to and inclusive, 31st day of May, 1871, where the Assessor will receive all assessments which were not rendered on the places above described.

Office hours from 8 A. M. to 1 o'clock, P. M. and from 3 P. M. to 6 o'clock, P. M.

All persons interested are notified that the assessment will embrace all taxable property within the limits of the city, as defined in the new charter.

Each person will be required to give a full and complete description, No. of lot, block and ward, of the property rendered.

Each male inhabitant over the age of 21 years, who has resided within the city twelve months, will be required to give in his poll tax, provided the assessed amount of his property does not reach the amount of two hundred dollars.

A penalty of ten per cent on the tax assessed will be levied and collected against all persons failing to render their assessments in proper time.
