SIX-AND-A-HALF, POUNDS OF BOOTS .- At Worcester, Mass., several manufacturing firms make a specialty of boots for the itms make a specialty of boots for the mining regions. A long-legged boot made for the Pannsylvania coal nurses, by S. R. lies wood, is the most durable piece of furniture over constructed of leather and iron. The soice are about three-quarters of an inch thick, projecting like the guards of a minch thick, projecting like the guards of a Mississippi steamer. The petition of more than fifty (132) free-holders of the country of Bexar, having been presented to the Police Court of said country, asking for an election to take the opinion of the electors of said country on the proposition that said country shall aid in the construction or extension of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway from the town of Columbus on Eagle Lake, in Colorado country, to the city of San Antonio, in Bexar country, by making a donation to the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company of the sum of Five hundred thousand dollars in the bonds of said Bexar country, in the manner and upon the conditions set, forth in said-

of Five hundred thousand dollars in the bonds of said Bexar county, in the manner and upon the conditions set, forth in said petition, and which conditions are hereinafter more fully set forth.

And the court finving duly considered the said petition, and being satisfied of the right of the petitioners to ask for and have an order for such election, by virtue of the act of the Legislature, entitled "An act to authorize counties, cities and towns to aid in the construction of Railroads and other works of Internal Improvements," approved April 12th, 1871.


