TELEGRAPHIC

VERSAILLES, June 17.—A court martial sittings next week for the trial of Roeb, Assay and Rossel.

The grand review of one hundred thousand men, which was announced to take place at Champs de Mars on Sunday, will be held at Long Champs.

BERLIN, June 16.—The triumphant entry of the army and the inauguration of the equestrian statue of Frederick William took place to-day.

The display was grand, and the city is thronged with people. The procession was the most magnificent ever made in the present times. It was headed by the eagle standards captured from the French.

After the address of welcome and congratulation, the Emperor, at the head of a brilliant cortege, rode down the Via Triumphant road, which was strewn with flowers, as he advanced, by hundreds of young girls dressed in white. The procession was mainly composed of detachments representing every regiment which was engaged in the war.

LONDON, June 17.—The insurrectionary placards posted in Paris disavow all connection with the incendiaries, and proclaim to be engaged in a struggle against cowardice and war against despotism and monarchy.

LIBANON, Ohio, June 17.—Mr. Vallandigham, while illustrating to a fellow counsel in a murder case how the dead man might have shot himself, accidentally discharged a pistol wounding himself in the bowels. At 2 o'clock this morning he was still conscious, but in great pain—internal hemorrhage probable. The physicians pronounce his condition very serious and think it hardly possible for him to recover.

LATER—Mr. Vallandigham is dead.

SIX-AND-A-HALF POUNDS OF BOOTS.—At Worcester, Mass., several manufacturing firms make a specialty of boots for the tubing regions. A long-legged boot made for the Pennsylvania coal mines, by S. H. Heywood, is the most durable piece of furniture ever constructed of leather and iron. The soles are about three-quarters of an inch thick, projecting like the quarter of a Mississippi steamer. The heels also project nearly a quarter of an inch, forming quite a shelf near the counter, and are flared at the bottom. Nails with a flat top, a size smaller than a silver three-cent piece, are driven in as closely as they can be set over the sole, shank, and heel, forming, as it were, a solid iron bottom.

A miner provided with such a pair of boots, whether blown up, or falling down a shaft, ought, like a cat, to alight on his feet, if not so safely; as the boots in question weigh six-and-a-half pounds, the iron nail contributing one and a half pounds to the weight. So carefully are these boots made to answer the requirements of the miner, that long units of sweetfish iron are driven through the heel and shank, clinging to the inner sole; three to the heel and six to the shank. The sides are closed by hand with a six stranded thread that would hold a two hundred pound weight.

Proceedings of the City Council.

Called meeting.
SAN ANTONIO, June 16, 1871.

Present, his honor, Mayor Thielepape.
Councilmen—Messrs. Durior, Bell, Mozer, Groos, Norton and Penterrieder.

A communication from Dr. Patterson, city Physician, concerning the health and sanitary measures of the city, was read and an Ordinance regulating the sale of fruits and vegetables within the city limits, passed.

The report of the city Attorney on the communication of city Collector, on right of G. Freisleben to a deed for a certain strip of land bought of the city, and recommending a certain accompanying Ordinance for passage, was read, and the following action taken in accordance with it:

On motion, the Mayor was authorized to sign the deed to G. Freisleben, recommended by the city attorney's report.

On motion, an Ordinance providing for giving notice to those who are delinquent in rendering their assessments, was read and adopted.

On motion, the Mayor was authorized to fine policemen for neglect of duty, and to deduct the amount of said fine from their salaries, at the end of the month.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Be it resolved by the City Council of the city of San Antonio, that the bottom line of the right hand side, of the form adopted for the assessment of property, shall read as follows, to wit: Capital used to invested in any business, except merchandising.

The report of the Finance Committee, on bills of A. Nettie and A. Siemering & Co., was read and adopted.

Councilmen adjourned.

Judge Lynch in Dakota.

EXECUTION OF A FRENCH PRISONER DETERMINED WITH 'FORMAL CEREMONIES.'

In our dispatches recently from Yankton, Dakota Territory, there was a brief reference to the hanging of an old and well-known outlaw. Yesterday the *Yankton and Dakotan* came to hand with a full report of the occurrence, from which we make some copious extracts.

The real name of the desperado was John McBeth, although he is placed in such notices as Joe Duval, Jack Lee, James Dawson, &c., &c. He was taken forthwith to St. Helena, nine miles from Yankton.

Here he was interviewed by the editor of the *Dakota and Dakotan*, to whom he confessed murdering John Coffey a United States soldier, and seven half dozen others. As our editor came out of the jail the following scene presented itself:

"We met quite a crowd coming up, and prevailed on them to go back, we went down, and for the crowd drawn up in front, taking a vote as to the disposition of the prisoner. A vote was taken to hang him. It was determined the matter. The crowd were very orderly, but fearfully determined. One man wanted to cut him to pieces day after day. A committee was appointed to erect a gallows, another to seize the sheriff and another to manage the hanging of the prisoner. The entire plan was carried out without excitement. The people worked as if engaged in a business transaction. At about half past three o'clock the prisoner learned what his fate would soon be, and he would make a public confession to his people. He was brought down stairs in a chair, and the crowd collected in front of the boiler. As he appeared in front of the people, silence immediately succeeded and the culprit spoke in a low, clear, and remarkably cool tone of voice as follows:

"Gentlemen and fellow citizens, I am now in my last hour. I come before you to speak to you. I am guilty of committing one of the horriest of crimes. I am ready to meet my death. I confess all. Hang me, definitely. I am ready to die. Do not hesitate or hurry me."

"We don't," came from the mouth of the crowd. "Kill me, damn it." "We will," from the crowd again. [A court-crowd would hardly say—Ed. DUNN.]

A priest was then obtained for the verdict, who went through all the usual observances incident to such occasions. "A clean white shirt," as generous as well as courageous crowd, was also put upon the prisoner, who then acknowledged himself "ready." Upon this the wages containing the convicted, drove up with the prisoner sitting on a box. He pulled off his shoes, asked Dr. Van Velsor for a stick and then mounted the hot, and spoke again as follows:

"I am now about to be launched into eternity. I have no grudge against any one. I forgive all my enemies. I have been a bad man. I go to God with a clear conscience. I often thought I would come to this. I want to be buried in the Catholic burying ground." "You shall," (by the crowd.) "I, want my face here. If I had only time to give my life it would make an interesting novel. "How long would it take?" says one. "Go on," says another. "I don't want a cap over my face." "Let him have his way," (by several voices.)

Confusion followed, in the midst of which the prisoner made a frantic jump. The rope broke. Another was procured. Another jump. And this time the business was concluded as our Dakota cotemporary observes, "in a most creditable and satisfactory manner."

An observing individual in a very healthy village, seeing the sexton at work on a hole in the ground, inquired what he was about. "Digging a grave, sir." "Digging a grave! Why, I thought people didn't die often here—do they?" "Oh no, sir, they never die but once."

Railroad Election Notice.
 THE STATE OF TEXAS,
 County of Bexar.

Do it remembered that at a regular session of the Hon. Police Court, held in and for the county of Bexar, on the 1st day of June, A. D. 1871, the following proceedings were had, to wit:

The petition of more than fifty (52) freeholders of the county of Bexar, having been presented to the Police Court of said county, asking for an election to take the opinion of the electors of said county on the proposition that said county shall aid in the construction or extension of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway from the town of Columbus on Eagle Lake in Colorado county, to the city of San Antonio, in Bexar county, by making a donation to the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company of the sum of Five hundred thousand dollars in the bonds of said Bexar county, in the manner and upon the conditions set forth in said petition, and which conditions are hereinafter more fully set forth.

And the court having duly considered the said petition, and being satisfied of the right of the petitioners to ask for and have an order for such election, by virtue of the act of the Legislature, entitled "An act to authorize counties, cities and towns to aid in the construction of Railroads and other works of Internal Improvements," approved April 19th, 1871.

It is therefore, hereby ordered by the Court that an election be held in accordance with said Act, at the Court-house of the county of Bexar, to commence on the fifth day of July, 1871, and continue for four consecutive days, to wit: the 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th days of July, 1871, to take the opinion of the electors of said county of Bexar, upon the proposition above mentioned, which is as follows, to wit:

That the County of Bexar shall aid in the construction or extension of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway from the town of Columbus on Eagle Lake in the county of Colorado, to the city of San Antonio, in the county of Bexar, by making a donation to the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company of the sum of five hundred thousand dollars in the bonds of said county of Bexar; each bond to be for the sum of one thousand dollars, payable thirty years after its delivery, and bearing interest at the rate of eight per centum per annum, payable annually upon interest coupons to be attached to each of said bonds, upon condition nevertheless, that the said Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company fully complete and equip their said Railway to the city of San Antonio within two years from the time when the qualified voters of said Bexar county shall have voted affirmatively on the said proposition; and that the bonds aforesaid shall be delivered to the said Railway Company when the said Railway shall be fully completed and equipped to the city of San Antonio and not before, and that the said bonds shall bear interest only from the date of their delivery. And further provided, that the said Railway Company shall execute and deliver to the said county of Bexar, within sixty days after said election, their bond in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, conditioned for the faithful completion and equipment of said Railway within the time and to the place aforesaid.

The vote on the proposition aforesaid shall be by ballot "for the proposition" or "against the proposition," as prescribed by the act aforesaid.

It is further ordered that J. W. Van Slyke, C. Wurzbach and H. P. Small are hereby appointed managers to conduct said election in accordance with said Act, and to make a return thereof to this Court, on Wednesday, the 12th day of July, 1871.

It is further ordered that this order shall be published for three weeks previous to said election, in the "San Antonio Express," a newspaper published in the city of San Antonio, in the county of Bexar; and it is also ordered that a special meeting of this Court be held on Monday, the 17th day of July, 1871, that being the first Monday after the return day of said election, for the purpose of ascertaining and recording the result of the election herein and hereby ordered.

I certify that the foregoing is a true and correct copy of the original order, as entered upon the Minutes of the Police Court of Bexar county, at its May term, A. D. 1871.
