OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.
Passed at the Third Session of the Forty-First Congress.
CHAP. CXL—An Act relating to Records of the Courts of the United States.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That whenever the record of any judgment, or decree, or other proceeding of any judicial court of the United States shall have been or shall hereafter be lost or destroyed, any party or person interested therein may, on application to such court, and on showing to the satisfaction of such court that the same has been lost or destroyed without fault or neglect of the party or person making such application, obtain an order from such court authorizing such defect to be supplied by a duly certified copy of such original record, where the same can be obtained, which certified copy shall thereafter have the same effect as such original record would have had in all respects.
Sec. 2. That whenever there is loss or destruction of any such record shall have happened, or shall hereafter happen, and such defect cannot be supplied as provided in the next preceding section, any party or person interested therein may make a written application to the court to which such record belonged, verified by affidavit or affidavits, showing the loss or destruction thereof, and that certified copies thereof cannot be obtained by the party or person making such application, and the substance of the records so lost or destroyed, and that such loss or destruction occurred without the fault or neglect of the party or person making such application, and that the loss or destruction of such record, unless supplied, will or may result in damage to the party or person making such application, said court shall cause said application to be entered of record in said court, and due notice thereof shall be given by personal service of a copy thereof upon each and every person interested therein, other than the party or person making such application, together with written notice that on a day certain, not less than sixty days after such service, said application will be heard by said court; and if upon such hearing said court shall be satisfied that the statements contained in said written application are true, said court shall make an order directing what was the substance and effect of said lost or destroyed record; which order shall be entered of record in said court, and shall have the same effect as the original record, provided the order would have had not been lost or destroyed, so far as concerns the party or person making such application and the persons who shall have been personally served as provided for in this section.
Sec. 3. That in all cases which have been removed, or shall hereafter be removed, to the Supreme Court of the United States, a duly certified copy of the record of such cause remaining in the said Supreme Court may be filed in the court from which said cause was removed, on motion of any party or person claiming to be interested therein, and the copy so filed shall have the same effect as the original record would have had if the same had not been lost or destroyed.
Approved, March 3, 1871.

CHAP. CXXII—An Act to extend the Benefits of the Donation Law of September twenty-seven, eighteen hundred and fifty, to certain Frontiers.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all persons who at the time of settlement, possessed the qualifications prescribed in the fourth and fifth sections of "An Act to create the office of surveyor-general of the public lands in Oregon, and to provide for the survey, and to make donations to settlers of the said public lands," approved September twenty-seven, eighteen hundred and fifty, and who made bona fide settlement upon the lands claimed by the Pughs Sound Agricultural Company, in Washington Territory, within the time limited for settlement by said act and the amendments thereto, shall be and are hereby declared to be, entitled to all the privileges and benefits of said act and amendments.
Sec. 2. That the rights and privileges of heirs and assigns under the said donation law, and the amendments thereto, shall be, and are hereby, extended to the heirs and assigns of the settlers named in the first section of this act.
Approved, March 3, 1871.
CHAP. CXXXII—An Act to amend an Act to revise, consolidate, and amend the Statutes relating to Patents and Copyrights.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That that part of section thirty-three of an act entitled "An act to revise, consolidate, and amend the statutes relating to patents and copyrights," approved July eight, eighteen hundred and seventy, which requires that, in case of application by assignee or assignees for a patent, the application shall be made and the specification sworn to by the inventor or discoverer, if living, shall not be construed to apply to patents issued and assigned prior to July eight, eighteen hundred and seventy.
Approved, March 3, 1871.
CHAP. CXXXIII—An Act to authorize the Reorganization of James Delger to the Rank of Major and Quartermaster in the Army.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the President be, and he is hereby, authorized to restore James Delger to the rank of major and quartermaster in the army, to date from the day of his restoration to his said rank under this act.
Approved, March 3, 1871.
CHAP. CXXXIV—An Act to authorize Robert Boyd, junior, to the active list of the Navy of the United States.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the President of the United States be authorized to nominate, and, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint Robert Boyd, junior, now on the retired list, as a commander on the active list of the navy.
Approved, March 3, 1871.
CHAP. CXXXV—An Act to restore Robert Boyd, junior, to the active list of the Navy of the United States.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the President of the United States be authorized to nominate, and, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint Robert Boyd, junior, now on the retired list, as a commander on the active list of the navy.
Approved, March 3, 1871.

CHAP. CXXXVII—An Act supplementary to "An Act to authorize the Extension, Continuation, and Use of a National Branch of the Baltimore and Potomac R. R. Co., in, and within the District of Columbia," approved February 6th, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Baltimore and Potomac Railroad Company be, and they are hereby, authorized to erect over their tracks or Virginia Avenue, between west Sixth Street and west Seventh Street, in the city of Washington, a passenger depot building, covering the following described area, to wit, commencing at the intersection of the building line of south side of north Seventh Street and the building line of east side of west Seventh Street, produced, thence along the building line southward to a point, thence by line parallel with and forty feet distant northward from building line of southerly side of Virginia Avenue to a point in building line of west side of west Sixth Street produced, thence by last-mentioned line northward to a point, thence by line parallel with and forty feet distant southward from building line of northerly side of Virginia Avenue to a point, thence northward by line parallel with and eighty feet distant eastward from the building line of east side of west Seventh Street produced to a point in building line of south C Street produced, thence by last-mentioned line westward to the place of beginning; which shall be of the same style of architecture as the depot of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, at the city of Lancaster, in the State of Pennsylvania; provided, That the assent of the municipal authorities of the city of Washington of the District of Columbia be first obtained, to the erection of said depot.
Approved, March 3, 1871.

Captain Richards.

This excellent gentleman and fine executive officer has returned from his long and arduous duties on the frontier, and has the satisfaction of knowing that he has faithfully performed his duties as protector of the suffering frontier, the records of the district he commands showing at every line some marks of his efficiency and worth. Not only have the Indians felt the power of his arm, and the strength of his energies, but that internal element of disorder, horse-thieving, has received a quietus in his section that speaks volumes for his watchfulness and thorough carrying out of the principles of law and justice.

It is with the greatest regret that we hear of his going out of service, for the country in the section in which he has served can ill afford to dispense with his services. The people there have every confidence in him, and have felt that night or day he was ready to serve them. One of the last acts of service he performed was the overthrowing of a predatory band of Indians and the recapture of thirty-head of stock which the devils had gathered together from the stock regions bordering upon his section. The horses were duly returned to their grateful owners, and the captain then took up his line of march for Austin, whether he was ordered to be mustered out, the State lacking the wherewith to farther support an organized, armed force in the field. We sincerely hope that Captain Richards may be called to duty in the State police. With ten or twenty good State police under his command, we are satisfied he could be of valuable service in the Uvalde district. We have our doubts about the captain accepting the service, but it should be the aim of the administration to retain him if possible. Captain Richards has sacrificed his personal interests in accepting the arduous services as a ranger. He has suffered severely in the loss of those dear and dear to him in that service. While we half hesitate to ask of him further services and sacrifices, we feel that the welfare of the frontier and the internal safety demand it. We hope soon to see him in service at the head of the State police for Western Texas.

A New York writer on "the decadence of masculine manners toward women" declares that it is the women who are degenerating from that modesty and refinement of bearing which characterized the woman in "our grandmothers' time." He cannot respect the majority of women yet nowadays.

Jeff. Davis on the War Path.

The great Confederate chief, after an unbroken silence of five years, has been obliged to remove the tissue of his accumulated feelings and beliefs in a series of speeches. Ostensibly he is travelling throughout the country in the interests of the Memphis Life Insurance Company, but in reality and truth he is attempting, incredible as it may seem, to revive the exploded doctrine of secession, while, without knowing it, he is advancing the cause of the Republican party; and, therefore, we say, "Hail to the chief that in triumph advances," and we sincerely hope that "the discreet politician" who has been sent South by the Tammany ring of New York for the purpose of prevailing on Jeff. Davis to stop his damaging utterances, may return to the bosom of the New York Democracy "with a flea in his ear." He informed a large crowd of his dupes at Atlanta not long since that a new era of constitutional liberty was about to dawn on the South, not long hence. He furthermore declared that those who accepted the situation were cowards, and that the rights of the South were not overcome by the decision of the sword, as for himself he accepted nothing; that he had never sinned politically, and that as a politician he had done no wrong. It is to be expected—we came near saying it is to be hoped—that he will continue making these harangues in all the larger cities of the South, and that they will be received as they were in Atlanta and Augusta, with tremendous cheering. If the Southern people are still of the opinion that the war has settled nothing, and that time can roll backward in his course, the sooner it is understood by the people of the United States the better. If the Democrats have learned nothing the sooner it is made plain to them that the Republican party has learned something, in regard to the treatment of rebels, the better.

But there is one important fact that Jeff overlooked, that nothing was ever accomplished by "tremendous cheering," and another is, that ex-Confederate soldiers have done some substantial thinking since his peevish affair. If President Grant were a man given to political trickery, we would be obliged to come to no other conclusion than that he had hired Jeff to pursue his present course, for the purpose of ensuring his election to a second term, but as it is, it is evident that this is nothing more nor less than a new phase of the ex-President's extraordinary self-conceit and arrogance, of which we had so many examples during the days of the departed so-called.

It is with feelings more akin to pity than resentment that we feel ourselves called upon to pay some little attention to the Herald. Among its aimless and stupid ramblings, are noticed lately several characteristic effusions at the expense of General Davidson and the State Police, and as the EXPRESS has always been the advocate of law and order, we propose to say a few words in their behalf. The State Police system of Texas has not only the hearty approval of all men in Texas, who do not sympathize with rowdiness, but it has excited admiration and official commendation in the Ku Klux ridden State of Kentucky. Now for its remedy: Can't we have a post office on wheels, and get our mail as we get our horses, or we could have it loaded for a week over the San Pedro, and the next week on the Plaza, and so on. Now that lumber is getting cheap, we believe a house could be built of plow, on a frame, resting on wheels. Our citizens in order to save time and money, will contribute to hire the motive power (six miles) and then we will have a big thing on wheels.

A Startling Phenomenon.

DESTRUCTIVE CYCLONE IN ILLINOIS—ITS PATHWAY ONLY EIGHT FEET WIDE—NOT A BLADE OF GRASS LEFT IN ITS TRACK. CHICAGO, June 5.—A terrible cyclone devastated a narrow strip of country near Mason City, Ill., last Friday evening. The storm cloud was first observed "rolling" on an open prairie, six miles from Mason City, and from this cloud soon shot out three narrower and spire-like clouds, which continued to ascend rapidly, until they reached and seemed to amalgamate with a passing cloud above. This startling phenomenon then moved slowly back toward Mason City, but finally changed its course, much to the relief of the people of that place. A mile its track, or color, much like that of burning sulfur, was inhaled by several persons. A gentleman who were within a hundred yards of the cyclone when it passed, says that small flashes of electricity were constantly visible in the storm column, passing from the earth to the clouds above, and that rapid crackling report were heard, reminding him most forcibly of "relays of machinery." The pathway of the cyclone was nearly three miles in length, and from 20 to 30 feet in width, and in that pathway not a spear of grass, not a stalk of corn or wheat, not a shrub, and not a particle of vegetation, was left alive. For some distance the earth was literally plowed up to the depth of six inches. The column of whirling air must have been intensely hot, as every grain dried to a crisp. Another feature of the cyclone was that, while its rotary motion must have been of inconceivably great velocity, its forward motion was only about six miles an hour. The outlines of its pathway were so well defined that, five feet from the outer line of total destruction of vegetation of every kind, not a vestige of its effects could be seen. Fortunately, no house stood in the line of the tornado. —N. Y. Tribune.

ARMED OUTRAGE.—Complaints, meetings or advice seem to have no effect upon the police, and our city marshal takes no steps to prevent the outrages that are daily perpetrated under shadow of the law, by an abuse of the law regarding the carrying of deadly weapons.

The latest case is that of a gentleman from the Nueces, who had been thither to purchase stock cattle. Returning to Indiaola via San Antonio, he had hardly struck the edge of the corporate limits before he was arrested on account of carrying a six-shooter. Politely, for he is a gentleman in every respect, he told the policeman there was no need of arresting him, for he would put up his arms at the stable where he intended leaving his horse until he again left. Any sensible officer would have at once seen the justice of his remarks; but with an eye only to costs, the gentleman was dragged off to the court, though tired and hungry, and a charge duly entered of violating the law. Now, in the name of an outraged people, how long is this state of things to continue! Does Mr. Gregory ever think how demerely unpopular his carelessness in these matters is making him? A dozen times a day we are accosted by merchants and citizens whose friends have been subjected to arrest, when there was neither justice nor reason to warrant it. Let strangers in our city be warned or advised on their entry here regarding weapons, but stop this wholesale arraignment of men as criminals, who, from the nature of their duties in traveling over an Indian country, are obliged to go armed.

Railroad Election Notice.
THE STATE OF TEXAS,
County of Bexar.

Be it remembered that at a regular session of the Hon. Police Court, held in and for the county of Bexar, on the 1st day of June, A. D. 1871, the following proceedings were had, to-wit:
The petition of more than fifty (52) freeholders of the county of Bexar, having been presented to the Police Court of said county, asking for an election to take the opinion of the electors of said county on the proposition that said county shall aid in the construction or extension of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway from the town of Columbus on Eagle Lake, in Colorado county, to the city of San Antonio, in Bexar county, by making a donation to the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company of the sum of Five Hundred thousand dollars in the bonds of said Bexar county, in the manner and upon the conditions set forth in said petition, and which conditions are hereinafter more fully set forth.

And this court having duly considered the said petition, and being satisfied of the right of the petitioners to ask for and have an order for such election, by virtue of the act of the Legislature, entitled "An act to authorize counties, cities and towns to aid in the construction of Railroads and other works of Internal Improvements," approved April 12th, 1871.
It is therefore, hereby ordered by the Court that an election be held in accordance with said Act, at the Court-house of the county of Bexar, to commence on the 5th day of July, 1871, and continue for four consecutive days, to-wit: the 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th days of July, 1871, to take the opinion of the electors of said county of Bexar, upon the proposition above mentioned, which is as follows, to-wit:
That the County of Bexar shall aid in the construction or extension of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway from the town of Columbus on Eagle Lake in the county of Colorado, to the city of San Antonio, in the county of Bexar, by making a donation to the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company of the sum of five hundred thousand dollars in the bonds of said county of Bexar; each bond to be for the sum of one thousand dollars, payable thirty years after its delivery, and bearing interest at the rate of eight per centum per annum, payable annually upon interest coupons to be attached to each of said bonds; upon condition nevertheless, that the said Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company fully complete and equip their said Railway to the city of San Antonio within two years from the time when the qualified voters of said Bexar county shall have voted affirmatively on the said proposition; and that the bonds aforesaid shall be delivered to the said Railway Company when the said Railway shall be fully completed and equipped to the city of San Antonio and not before, and that the said bonds shall bear interest only from the date of their delivery. And further provided, that the said Railway Company shall execute and deliver to the said county of Bexar, within sixty days after said election, their bond in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, conditioned for the faithful completion and equipment of said Railway within the time and to the place aforesaid.

The vote on the proposition aforesaid shall be by ballot for the proposition, or against the proposition, as prescribed by the act aforesaid.
It is further ordered that J. W. Van Blyck, C. Wurzbach and H. P. Russell are hereby appointed managers to conduct said election in accordance with said Act, and to make returns thereof to this Court, on Wednesday, the 19th day of July, 1871.

It is further ordered that this order shall be published for three weeks previous to said election, in the "San Antonio Express," a newspaper published in the city of San Antonio, in said county of Bexar, and it is also ordered that a special meeting of this Court be held on Monday, the 19th day of July, 1871, that being the first Monday after the closing day of said election, for the purpose of ascertaining and recording the result of the election herein and hereby ordered.
Certify hereby that the foregoing is a true and correct copy of the original order, entered upon the minutes of the Police Court of Bexar county, at its May term, A. D. 1871.

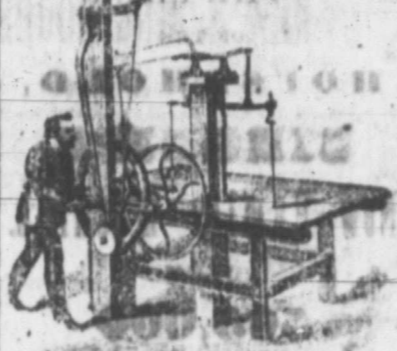
