TELEGRAPHIC
PARIS, June 26.—The Figaro says that the Orleans Princes will proceed to Froedorf, where they will await the decision of the country in silence.
The Constitutionnel urges electors, to ratify the policy of M. Thiers without conditions or amendments.
Vervil, late member of the Commune has been arrested.

PARIS, June 26.—Gambetta has arrived in Paris, but leaves to-morrow. He has accepted the candidacy for the Assembly from one of the districts in Paris.
There has been suffering from cold, but is now better.

PARIS, June 27.—The Central Republican Committee has prepared lists of its candidates to be supported at the election on the 2d of July. The list is known to be headed, by permission, with the name of Gambetta.

LONDON, June 27.—The Prussian army corps system has been adopted by France. It is said Long Champs review is fixed for Thursday next.
Great efforts are being made in Belgium to obtain subscriptions to the French loan. The Republican Committee will publish to-morrow their lists of candidates for the Assembly.

Thiers has issued a decree providing for the establishment of a legion of mobilized gendarmes to maintain order in Versailles. The legion is to be composed of a squadron of cavalry and eight companies of infantry.
LONDON, June 27.—The Fenian convict, Burrell, has been released from imprisonment upon the condition that he reports yearly to a magistrate.
WASHINGTON, June 26.—The authenticated Alabama claims aggregate \$13,000,000.

McCutloch's Letter and the Donation to the Columbus Road.

The city has been filled with flying rumors in relation to a proposition which Morgan & McComb were to make to the county in reference to the completion of the Gulf road.

It has been asserted with considerable assurance that Gen. McCulloch would make his appearance during the week and announce the city of San Antonio by the sudden liberality of Morgan, and crush to earth all other railroad companies who dare oppose him, by the sheer weight of his proposition. The friends of the donation to the Columbus road held their breath, and the opponents, on principle, foretold wonderful things.

The laboring mountain has at last brought forth, and the mine is of most insignificant proportions.

In the last number of the Free Press we communicated the letter, which arrived instead of McCulloch, and which contains all that we have reason to expect from Morgan & Co.

In order to have a complete view of the whole field we call attention to the fact that at the time the proposition was being discussed with Mr. Pierce, Morgan was applied to, and he was asked if he had any propositions to make to the people of Bexar county in reference to the completion of his road, and to define distinctly what they were. The only answer received was a telegram, to the effect that he had no proposition to make, and that he did not intend to make any, but expected the counties on his line to make propositions to him.

It is clear that those who are interesting themselves in the speedy completion of a road to this place did not take a one-sided view of the case, and that they endeavored to force competition; but at that time Mr. Morgan did not propose to treat with the people of Bexar county, and it is readily understood that the proposition of Morgan's telegram was nothing but an evasion of the real questions at issue.

This evasiveness is shown even more clearly in the letter of Mr. McCulloch. It was generally expected that, at last, Morgan would make a definite proposition, and enter into obligations for its fulfillment. We cast no reflections on the honesty and candor of Mr. McCulloch, but we cannot share his hopeful confidence in the fulfillment of Morgan's promise. As far as we are concerned, we are unable to discover any reasonable ground upon which to base confidence in either Morgan or McComb.

When they desired our support, about a year ago, to assist them in obtaining the charter through the legislature, they made liberal promises, and we had then reason to believe that they would comply with them. We were then given to understand that the road would be completed to San Antonio this fall without our help. We knew what Morgan and McComb's promises are worth, and do not propose to be bamboozled a second time. We contend, therefore, that so far as we are concerned, the letter of Mr. McCulloch is absolutely of no importance whatever. Our dealings are not with him, but with the Mexican Gulf company, of which Morgan and McComb are the head and front. He may speak for or in behalf of the company, but the company is not bound in any manner or form by the utterances, written or otherwise, of McCulloch, unless he is recognized by the company through a legally constituted power of attorney.

As far as the contents of the letter itself are concerned, we have reasonable ground for astonishment at the recklessness and impudence with which Morgan & McComb speculate upon the credulity of the citizens of Western Texas.

The company, so the letter says, asks for no donation, and no subscriber is expected or required to execute any deed, bond or note until the obligations upon which the subscription is based shall have been complied with on the part of the company.

The sentence "The company will require no donation," it is true, is underscored in the original letter, and consequently is printed in italics in the translation. The meaning, however, of the first part of the sentence, taken in connection with the conclusion, can be no other than that "the company requires no donations until the obligations of the company have been punctually carried out."

From no part of the letter can any other conclusion be drawn, that anything else is meant; and we are sustained by the bitter experience we have already undergone in taking it for granted that the construction most unfavorable to ourselves will be the one adopted by the company.

We have, therefore, nothing else to expect but that some fine day Messrs. Morgan & McComb will do exactly what Mr. Pierce has already done, call upon us "to shell out," and as to the liberality of the terms which will be dictated to us by these gentlemen, should they succeed in driving Mr. Pierce off the field, we have a tolerable acquaintance already.

In the latter part of the letter we read, "that demand will be made shortly to the counties, cities and people along the line of the road, and that assistance according to the full extent of their ability is expected," and further on that, "if the road is not built in the prescribed time, that it will be as much the fault of the company as of the population."

Here we see that "the dagger is held at our breast." The first great point in Morgan & Co., carrying out their plans, is to defeat the donation to the Columbus road, and thus prevent its completion. That is the reason that McCulloch's letter does not make its appearance until the eleventh hour; in order to prevent a thorough investigation of the proposition, if so it may be termed, before the day of election.

They are very shrewd in feeding the people with general and indefinite promises; the company is not bound by them and they do not even attempt to outline or define the proposition they intend making. The term our road, when applied to their road, is simply a bait. We are invited to build the road with our money, in return for which we take stock, which we may dispose of, at some future date, at a discount of 30 or 40 per cent. Any one who desires to invest his money in that manner, can do the same thing every day in the Columbus road.

Should Morgan, McComb & Co., succeed in voting down the donation to the Columbus road, and thereby have an open field for their operations, we would be thrown entirely upon their mercy.

Then the usual highway demand of "your money or your life," will be made upon us.

Fruits in Western Texas.

Our city is at present enjoying an unusual abundance of the only fruit that is extensively cultivated in Western Texas, viz: peaches. Generally we can raise as fine peaches as in any State in the Union, but on account of the drought, and perhaps the severe late frost, this particular year, they are much below the average size, and not of so good quality as usual.

The cultivation of fruit in Western Texas is as yet in its infancy, and it is impossible to determine at present what degree of success will attend the efforts of our amateur fruit raisers. The severity of our northern winters deprives us of the climatic advantages we have in the production of tropical fruits. We see in other sections of a higher degree of latitude, and colder temperatures than our own, but not subject to the piercing northern, that pine apples, bananas, oranges, coconuts, &c., are raised to perfection, as in Louisiana and Florida, and these fruits will thrive in this section until they are nipped by the north. Until the result of the efforts of our citizens at raising apples, pears, grapes, &c., has been more satisfactorily ascertained, and more extensively carried out, should such efforts be successful, and no railroad communication is obtained, Western Texas is deemed to be destitute, comparatively speaking, of the products of both climates.

Even our peach crop is very uncertain, and the trees do not bear a full yield, on an average, more than once in three years, and the fig trees share the fate of the banana, we killed to the roots almost every winter. We have, however, been shown specimens of apples raised in this city, that were as fine in appearance and flavor as the average production of the Northern States.

Dr. Shook, for instance has a tree that bears an extremely well flavored apple, but whether the fruit will bear every year, and the fruit will retain its flavor, are questions which have not yet been solved. We believe the above remarks apply equally to pears, plums and grapes.

The completion of the railroad to New Orleans will, however, fill our markets, not only with oranges, bananas, coconuts, &c., but apples, pears, plums, &c., will be within the reach of everybody.

Indian News and Items.

From data very kindly furnished us by the courteous Post-commander, GENERAL CARLETON, we learn of a scout sent out in search of some of the prowling redskins who have been reported in the neighborhood of Gallagher's rancho on the San Gerónimo, trying to lynch their little honest penny in stealing horses, and returning now and then to take a stray scalp or two, or carry off a child, in hopes of ultimate ransom.

It is a source of regret to us that the efforts of the army—and they are energetic and well directed—are not more fully understood and appreciated by the people. The idleness that many of our people imagine to pervade the rank and file is a myth, easily proved by a glance at the monthly reports of scouts, marches and hardships undertaken by the boys in blue in their anxiety to give protection to the people amongst whom they are stationed. Time, perhaps, will serve to give the people a more just appreciation of the army, that does all its limited instructions allow.

The General has also very kindly placed in our possession a letter from Fort Stockton, which, after announcing the arrival of Company C, Ninth cavalry, and ten infantry companies from Fort Bliss and Quitman, says:

"The company from Fort Bliss (Spradall's) while encamped at Barrella Springs, last Sunday, was attacked by about sixty Indians, with the soldiers were wounding their herd of forty-one mules and three private horses, and were driven off by the Indians. A large American horse of Major Merriam was killed, the remainder captured. As soon as the news reached Fort Stockton, forty cavalry were sent to join Col. Shafter, with twenty additional cavalry at Barrella Springs who started in pursuit; with what success remains to be seen.

The mules lost were those belonging to the Q. M. D. of San Antonio.

We are also indebted to the General for the following extracts from a letter from Fort Richardson, received by him, in relation to General McKenzie and his Fort Sill prisoners:

"Gen. McKenzie and command arrived four days ago. He brought two of his prisoners, one having been killed as you see, about half a mile from Fort Sill. He stabbed a corporal, seized a Spencer carbine, and would have sent each of the eight cartridges in its magazine through as many soldiers had he been familiar with the weapon. Fortunately, there was no charge in the chamber, and the gun would not charge itself. He continued his endeavors to fire the piece until he was shot through the brain, though he was filled with balls before that. It is said that he would be killed there, that his body might be carried away by his family. The two Indians here are very placid looking individuals. The people of Jackboro', it is said, will not hang them for fear of revenge. It would be better to have them tried at a more interior place."

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
