The Election.

Although the election returns are by no means complete, it is conceded that Hancock is elected by a majority of several thousand and the republican party in Texas has suffered a defeat. It is possible that Clark is elected in the 31st District, but in Eastern Texas the Democracy has elected their candidate, as was to be expected. That Mr. Rogers should be defeated in this District, is simply shameful. It is true that the white element is in the ascendancy in this section, but unlike in the greater portion of the state, wide spread intelligence prevails, and it was to be expected that the people would take the future prosperity of the country into consideration and not be deceived by false ideas.

It is of vital importance to the people, that the conservative policy that dominated our country but a few years ago should not be permitted to prevail, but many otherwise sensible people have given aid to the cause of treason and retrogression, by allowing themselves to be deceived by the false cry of tyranny, taxes, &c. Many of those who entered the day when they gave heed to the man that howled about tyranny in 1861 have been again deluded by the same party and the identical same man.

Let us not imagine that we have been painting a too highly colored picture of the probable condition of affairs in Texas, in case the rebel element should remain in the ascendency.

If that event should come in pass, our predictions will be verified even to the most minute details. Those who honestly think differently are simply unacquainted with the history of the Democracy in the South, and the cowardly, blood thirsty nature of a great portion of the "best" white strain.

Instead of being represented in Congress by an honorable man like Mr. Dagnauy, we will be disgraced by that traitor par excellence, Hancock.

It is fortunate for San Antonio in particular, that the influence of this medical democrat will amount to almost nothing. When his infamous record is more generally understood at Washington, and the fact that he has publicly denounced Congress as a band of thieves and the President as a villain is published, he will be put aside by himself, like a scabby sheep.

What reason has Congress to waste the treasure of the nation on a State that refuses to assist the government in the great work of reconstruction?

It has cost the United States government more to maintain the Post Office Department in Texas than the State has ever paid from the national coffers, in the way of taxes. Nearly half the army has been always stationed in Texas, and this has brought untold millions into circulation.

In return for all this the same impish animosity is displayed by the people of Texas toward the Government as was exhibited in 1861, when the arsenals and posts, which protected the people from the Indians, were plundered to furnish the democracy with material to destroy the national authority.

What return has been made by those counties that literally live off the government, who owe not only their wealth but their very existence to the protection afforded them under the stars and stripes? What has been the conduct of Comal County, formerly a staunch Union county and representative of the German element? It gave a majority for the champion of a second rebellion, for the most bitterness of the most blundering administration the country has ever had, for an unmitigated know-nothing.

Those Comal county democrats and turn-out republicans abound in excuses and reasons, for having thus disgraced themselves, which, as Shakespeare says, are thicker than blackberries. But what do they all amount to, when met with the one simple fact, that Comal county has supported the cause of rebellion, retrogression, slavery and despotism.

In order to hasten the downfall of the State, it now only remains to elect a Democratic legislature and place the management of public affairs into the hands of such men as Shelly, Knox, Devine and others of that stripe. When this shall have been accomplished, the innumerable benefits derived from a five years bloody war will be swept away and the disgrace-

ful humiliating condition of society as it existed before the war, will be reinstated. If the republicans of Texas can stand this we certainly can - If a second pilgrimage through the valley and shadow of death is necessary, the sooner it is commenced, the better.

In 1860 North Carolina took this very step. They had prospered for four years under republican management; but they suddenly became imbued with the delusion that the democracy was the party that would advance their interests in a more satisfactory manner. The same howl was raised about taxes.

A democratic administration came into power and with it, of course, robbery, murder, official corruption, the Ku-Klux ruled supreme, trade and enterprise languished, and the renegade republicans were hated by their newly acquired friends, until human nature could stand it no longer. This condition of things lasted until the election last spring, when the democracy was actually hurled from power by a majority of 30,000 votes, and the country turned over to the party of law and order. North Carolina will not elect a democratic administration again.

Texas can go through the mill again, if it is the wish of the people, but let no one lay the flattering unction to his soul, that republicanism is defeated, because Texas is to be put under martial law again.

In THE EXHIBITION OF "SHOWS" and "England" seems at last to have outdone our New World, in the uniqueness of the object of exhibition. As a matter of moving interest to the sterner sex, the "fat men" and "prize babies" shows, are thrown into the shade by a competitive exhibition at the North Woolwich Gardens of a considerable number of the *ancilla Brissotica*, or ordinary bar maid. The prize, or queen of these fascinating dispensers of cakes and ale was to be decided by the ballots of the patrons of the exhibition.

What a terrible temptation, to resort to every art and wile within the legitimacy of woman, to be crowned with the coronet of "queen of cakes and ale"!

New York, the American centre of wonders, has recently fringed Paris in the production of a "Jean Valjean" No. 3, in the person of Louis Bonard, who, a criminal convict and outcast in early life, reformed his wicked ways, came to the United States, devoted himself to business and amassed an immense fortune, which by his will he donated to the "Society for the prevention of cruelty to Animals" to the great disappointment and rage of his surviving relatives, who are now contesting his will on the ground of insanity, notwithstanding they drove him from their doors in the days of his disgrace and degradation.
