NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—A special to the Tribune from the city of Mexico, dated Oct. 14, received this afternoon, states that the United States and cavalry men, revolted and attempted to take possession of the city. The garrison rallied under the command of Gen. Rios and others, and attacked and defeated the insurgents.

CHICAGO, Oct. 13.—It is rumored and believed by some that Parker Union was negotiated. Unpleasantness exists between the Mayor and Common Council regarding management.

CHICAGO, Oct. 13.—The organization effected for the management of the relief, consists of an old established institution, assisted by prominent citizens. Bills will be audited by a committee. Funds collected should be remitted direct to or held subject to the order of the Chicago relief and not committee, and signed by H. B. Mason.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 12.—The alleged K. K. K. against whom Gov. Brown proclaims, is composed of a band of horse thieves, robbers and murderers, mostly fugitives from justice of the neighboring States. the Orient powder company exploded, killing one. LONDON, Oct. 12.—Losses of Liverpool Insurance Companies in Chicago aggregate £400,000. The strike at Newcastle continues. Several boats in a riot, which the police easily suppressed.

On last Sunday night, a week, the Indians made a raid on the head of Mary's creek, twelve miles northeast of Waxahatchie, killing and capturing a number of horses. On Monday morning they were seen a mile from town, going out, when a party of citizens gave pursuit, but so far behind that none of them but Captain Wofolk came in sight. He saw two that he supposed were the rear guard and fired at them twice. Some horses are reported missing in the suburbs of the town.

The Superintendent of Public Instruction, Col. DeWitt, in his late educational tour, met with courteous reception everywhere, and found on all sides an unlooked for preparedness on the subject of free public schools. The enemies of popular instruction had declared, in all quarters, that the schools were to be mixed, and thus had generated much prejudice and hostility, which the Superintendent was enabled to allay by the simple truth. As one illustration of his success we may state that over eighty school houses were freely preferred to him for public school purposes.—State Journal.

The committee of citizens at Valveston appointed to raise funds in aid of the sufferers of Chicago, obtained the first day \$2,500. The McKinny Messenger says, ten or a dozen free-schools are in successful operation in Collin county. The Court House in Boone county was burned recently. It is said to be the work of an incendiary. The records are mostly saved.
