The Legislature.

It will be remembered that it was the wish of almost the entire population, that the Legislature should not meet at all, or if that were a lost hope, that they adjourn as early as possible, after they had ordered a recess.

Those, however, who took more interest in a session, seemed to be convinced, that there was a large quantity of unfinished business, that should be disposed of; but even these did not have the hardihood to propose an extended session.

The Legislature met on the 12th of September, and will probably continue in session until late in November.

But, what has been accomplished, that will benefit the people?

Now, it is no secret, that the financial affairs of our State are not managed in a satisfactory manner, and that the expenses exceed the annual income and the idea cannot be entertained for a moment, that this deficiency is to be covered by an increased rate of taxation.

Temporary relief may be obtained by issuing bonds, but the only sensible way to wipe out this deficiency is by a reduction of the expenses.

Let the Legislature set the example and pay its members \$5 a day instead of \$8, which will be sufficient for their valuable services.

The numbers and salaries of the myriads of clerks might also be reduced to more reasonable figures.

Likewise, district judges and attorneys. There are other and still greater leaks that should be stopped, and this is what we have a right to demand of the Legislature.

But instead of earning their salaries by making laws of a beneficial character, we have the pitiful spectacle of a Texas Legislature frittering away its time in passing bills forbidding the sale of intoxicating liquors within certain limits, making donations to individuals, chartering little towns and other unimportant affairs, that might be regulated by the citizens themselves, and thus wasting precious time, which should be expended in legislating upon matters connected with the vital interests of the country.

How shameful was the debate in reference to the martial law proclamation of the Governor. Then gentlemen first make laws, and then are weak enough to hesitate in backing up the Governor in the enforcement of them.

Another pitiful spectacle is the abortive attempt to impeach and remove the Comptroller, whose incapacity is well understood by all who have any dealings with him, and whose place should be occupied by some more fitting person; but the House should know, that the present composition of the Senate is a bar to the successful enforcement of this measure.

The Democracy would defend him, and prevent his impeachment, as they did in the case of Judge Russell.

Wherefore, then, this waste of time? Let the Legislature devote itself to reforming the financial affairs of the State, and they may yet earn the good will of their constituents.

RAILROADS are variously appreciated in different portions of the United States. We remember one objection, made in our hearing, recently, in Eastern Texas, which was quite amusing. A farmer had been applied to for his influence in securing the right of way for a certain road, when he responded, that he was opposed to railroads, because they would raise the price of land, so that his sons could not buy farms. Although that man owned a thousand acres right on the projected line. But the last thing in this we have heard of, came from a section of Virginia, where a new road is being built, and from which the people are emigrating, because the men complain that the women have to dress too much, say that the railroad men move about the country.

The New York Journal of Commerce, of the 15th inst., in its weekly cattle report, gives the stock of Texas and Cherokee cattle at 100,000. The decline of the previous week in the general market was maintained. Texas stock selling at 6-7-1/2c per lb. At St. Louis, on the 15th, sales of Texas cattle, good to extra wintered, \$2.75-\$3 per 100 lbs. dressed in skin, \$2.50-\$3.00, fresh, fair stock, \$2-2 1/2c, "scalaway" to common, \$1.50-\$2.00.

Additional clearing of the vote, at the recent election, was, at last, advised, progressing at Austin, and the prospect seems to be good for Mr. Whitmers, while it is certain, now, that Mr. Clark is elected by almost two thousand majority. The election of Mr. Connor, was of course a surprise, and a surprise to all.

REPUBLICAN STATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Harmonious Meeting—Thorough Organization Advised.

The following are the resolutions adopted by the State Executive Committee at its meeting, in Austin, on the 26th inst., and addressed to the Legislature:

Resolved, That this committee deem it of the highest importance that the present Legislature should enact an efficient law of registration, providing for the appointment of a superior and assistant supervisor of registration and elections, by which every citizen of the State shall be protected in the exercise of the inalienable right of suffrage guaranteed by a wise and liberal general government, and to this end we beg the support of every member of the Legislature who appreciates, and has a proper regard for the rights of his loyal constituency and the purity of the ballot box.

Resolved, That a proper regard for the interests of all parties and classes of citizens throughout the State of Texas demands a new apportionment, both for State and Federal purposes, especially as we are entitled under the late United States census returns, to an increase of two members in the lower branch of the National Legislature.

Resolved, That inasmuch as the number of judicial districts, as now organized, was intended to meet an emergency which arose from the long cessation of the legitimate operation of the courts and the consequent accumulation of causes upon the docket, and has now passed away, we therefore, with a due regard to economy in the disbursements from the treasury, recommend that the number of judicial districts be reduced to twenty.

Resolved, That inasmuch as Congress has passed laws to enforce the fourteenth and fifteenth Amendments to the constitution of the United States, the Committee recommend the appointment, under the previous of the Ku-Klux bill, of efficient number of United States commissioners, deputy marshals and special district attorneys by virtue of said law in each judicial district of the State, urging upon the members of the Legislature the practicability of selection, from the most reliable citizens of their respective districts, conscientious and loyal men, to exercise the functions imposed upon them. This committee are led to believe, from the recent encouragement given to the loyal people of North and South Carolina, Mississippi and Texas by the President of the United States, that arrests can be made and trial and conviction had, of any man, or set of men, whatever his or their social status, who have in the past, or who may in the future, set at defiance the just provisions of the laws of Congress, or of this State enacted to preserve inviolate the rights and privileges of suffrage to its citizens.

Resolved, That the policy of the present State administration upon the question of encouragement to internal improvement in the subsidizing of grand trunk lines of railway, having met the cordial endorsement of the leading financiers and statesmen of Europe and America, we respectfully recommend a continuance in the same enlightened and progressive policy to judiciously selected main trunk lines, and insist that the public faith pledged by the representatives of the people shall never be violated. That all the rights, privileges and franchises granted under their various acts should remain intact, and we do hereby denounce any attempt to curtail or repudiate in any manner, form or shape, any obligation incurred by the State for any measure whatever.

Resolved, That this committee regret that the liberal and wise policy pursued by the States of the great West, which has covered her broad prairies with teeming and industrious population, drawn from the ever crowded regions of the old world, has not been imitated by us. While Texas has been so liberal in its subsidies to railroads and its splendid endowment of free schools, we have made no proper provision for the encouragement of that which should go hand in hand therewith, a large, healthy and industrious immigration. So we earnestly urge that most liberal appropriations, according to the idea embodied in the constitution of the State, article XI, be made toward that end.

Resolved, That this committee recognize the fact that Texas, with her already immense resources, and her constantly increasing taxable wealth, has been thus far financially an aggressive failure. This Committee believe that, with a properly organized system of finance, the State can stand, for all time, at the very head of the list of potentates for value in all the great money centers of the world. We therefore recommend:

1. The immediate payment of every just and equitable outstanding claim against the State.

2. We recommend the funding of the entire debt of the State in bonds of sufficient interest value to command the confidence of the great capitalists, who seek a safe and safe investment. There is no reason why the bonds of this State should not be as eagerly sought by this class as those of the United States.

3. We recommend the appointment of a competent financial agent, whose duty shall be to negotiate the bonds of the State, under the instructions of the Governor, and with such compensation as may be deemed advisable.

The Texas Advocate commenting on the plainness of the report of Governor Connor who voted for Hancock, says, they are "near grasps."

We confess that the "day of help" as they said in 1856, has not yet come, and we do not see how it is to come. What do you say "ole constetocobras"?

THE STATE OF TEXAS,

County of Bexar,

Be it remembered, that a special meeting of the Honorable State Court held in and for the County of Bexar, on the 25th day of October, A. D. 1871, the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

That the petition of one hundred and fifty (150) freeholders of the County of Bexar, having been presented to the State Court of said county, asking for an order to take the opinion of the electors of said county, on the proposition that said county shall aid in the construction and extension of the Gulf, Western Texas and Pacific Railway, from the town of Indianola, Texas, to the city of San Antonio, Texas, by making a subscription to the stock of the said Gulf, Western Texas and Pacific Railway Company, in the amount of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars, in the Bonds of said County, in the manner and upon the conditions set forth in said petition, and which conditions are hereinafter more fully set forth.

And the Court, after reading and considering the said petition, and being satisfied of the right of the petitioners to make and have an Order for such election, by virtue of the Act of the Legislature entitled "An Act to authorize the petitioners to make and have an Order for such election, which is as follows, to-wit: The Gulf, Western Texas and Pacific Railway Company, will extend its Railway so as to have an uninterrupted line of railroads from the town of Indianola, Texas, to the City of San Antonio, Texas, said railway to be located and constructed as follows: In the southern and eastern angle by the line of the Gulf, Western Texas and Pacific Railway, from the mouth of Sandies Creek, in De Witt county, and thence to follow as straight a direction as practicable, to San Antonio, to commence simultaneously with the existing line, within two years from the 1st day of October, 1871; and the Depot to be established at a point with the city limits, not more than one mile East or West of the San Antonio river, nor more than one mile North or South of the line of Almeida and Main streets, the grading on the section between Cuero and San Antonio, to commence simultaneously with those two places. Upon the condition that the County of Bexar shall, pursuant to law, vote to aid said work by a subscription of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars of the stock of the Company, which stock is to be paid for when the work is completed, within the time aforesaid, in an equal amount of the Coupon Bonds of Bexar County, of One Thousand Dollars each, principal due in thirty years, and bearing eight per centum interest, per annum, payable annually; and provided, that the said Railway Company shall execute and deliver to the said county of Bexar, within sixty days after said election, their Bonds in the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars, conditioned for the faithful completion and equipment of said Railway, within the time and to the place aforesaid.

The vote on the proposition shall be by ballot, "For the Proposition," or "Against the Proposition," as prescribed by the Act aforesaid. It is further ordered that J. W. Van Slyke, C. L. Wurzbach and H. P. Primm, are hereby appointed managers to conduct said election in accordance with said Act, and to make a return thereof to this Court on Tuesday, the 11th day of December, 1871.

It is further ordered, that this order shall be published for three weeks, previous to said election, in the "San Antonio Express," a newspaper published in the City of San Antonio, in said county of Bexar, and it is also ordered, that a special meeting of this Court be held on Monday, the 18th day of December, 1871, that being the first Monday after the return day of said election, for the purpose of ascertaining and recording the result of the election herein and hereby ordered.

I hereby certify that the foregoing is a true and correct copy of the original order, as entered upon the minutes of the State Court of Bexar County, at a special session held at the Courthouse in the city of San Antonio, on the 25th day of October, A. D. 1871.
