The Board of Supervisors of San Francisco California have passed to print the first stage of favorable action in order to submit to the vote of the people the proposition to grant a subsidy of \$2,500,000 to the Central Pacific railroad company; of \$10,000,000 to the San Francisco and Colorado railroad company, and smaller subsidies to the North Pacific and Santa Cruz railroads. The Board indefinitely postponed the consideration of the order of allowing the people to vote a subscription of \$10,000,000 to the Atlantic and Pacific railroad in return for preferred stock, not withstanding a majority had petitioned for it in the petition with the Colorado scheme.

Messrs. Moore, Coke, Devine, West and Walton have decided upon the tenure of office of the State Executive officers. This decision is of no consequence in the world to anybody but these distinguished revolutionists, except so far as it shows their designs, should they obtain control of the next legislature which they are now counting upon.

If our people wish to prepare themselves for a clear understanding of the programme, let them read the proceedings of the Convention of 1861.

The office of Lt. Governor is declared vacant, Mr. Shelley is the man who is to be chosen to fill it, then impeachments follow, Shelly Governor, etc., etc., too numerous to mention. It is a genuine Communist scheme, it won't work. It won't work because there are other people in this State beside Moore, Coke & Co., and because the people of Texas are tired of revolutions gotten up for the benefit of a few Eobespierres, Marats and men of that ilk.

Something about "Dying Hard."

Our neighbor the Herald evidently thinks it an unpardonable sin to die hard; but, whether sinful or not, we are quite sure the sensation is more pleasurable than to die soft—as the Herald does in any discussion concerning the public school system, or the laws relating thereto. It starts out vigorously, softens rapidly, spits harmless and fruitless venom, and then gasps, "you just wait till next time, and you'll see what I can do!"

Witness yesterday's issue. Our neighbor erects himself on his Horatian ear, opens his newly purchased india-rubber Greeley mouth, goes gyrating around the circle, and upon the whole, charges us with "whole-cloth lying," which whole-cloth he wishes to "brand as it deserves." Now, we fear that H. G.'s example is having a bad effect upon our venerable contemporaries—(which in a fine word.) We shall expect to be called a horse-thief next, and to receive a variety of other-polite appellations, indicative of peculiar aptness to learn of his new master H. G. That is all right—we can stand it if the readers of the Herald can. Depraved tastes demand a depraved literature.

But let us examine the facts of the case wherein we are charged with falsehood. In the first place, we gave the facts just as they were narrated to us by the Counsel for the State. We are now assured by them that the only error in our statement was, (and even for that we were not at fault,) in asserting that the Judge issued a positive order to the Sheriff to proceed with the collection of the tax against those who were not parties to the suit by being named in the record. Such order was asked by the Counsel, but finally withdrawn, because it was the opinion of not only the Judge, but the State's Counsel, that no such order was necessary.

Upon this question of law the opinions of the bar seem to be divided. Mr. Berend's Counsel maintain that the appeal holds good for every tax-payer in the city; the Counsel on the other side insist that it can effect only those who have actually appealed by signing the appeal bond.

It is not our design to enter into any legal argument, nor to decide the question; it will be decided by the Supreme Court in good time; but we wish our readers to know, that, in what we stated, we gave what we were told the judge himself believed to be the effect of his decision, and what the attorneys who drew the decree still believe it to be.

We believe we stated the exact truth, and that it is the duty of the Sheriff to proceed with the collection of the tax against every person who is not by name a party to the suit appealed.

If the Herald knew anything at all of the matter, and is capable of comprehending it, it must have known that what we have stated is true. Judge Everett, it might be said, did "positively decline to instruct the Sheriff, etc."—but there is a malicious perversion of truth in the statement, in this: that he stated upon the bench, that inasmuch as the Sheriff was a party to the suit, he was bound to take cognizance of the order of the Judge, therefore no procedendo, nor special order, was necessary.

We, therefore, submit, that we are in no need of funeral ceremonies yet. If there are any bad odors requiring burial they linger around the sofa of the Herald corps.

The following communication from Hon. F. E. Grothaus to the Republican Convention of the 24th Senatorial District, has been transmitted to us from Indianapolis, with the request to publish the same.

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS, Sept. 8, 1872.
Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Convention:
I would not have the honor of placing myself before you as a candidate to-day, if it were not for many requests of Republican friends to do so; because I believe in the doctrine that "the office should seek the man, not the man the office."

Besides this, I am sorry to say that I am deprived of the pleasure and honor to appear before you in person, since private affairs have detained me in this city for some time, and will for a few weeks more.

Allow me, gentlemen of the Convention, to say right here, that if you can find one among the candidates for the Senatorial office who appears to you more available, more likely to be successful in the ensuing campaign than myself, I sincerely trust you will nominate him; and rest assured that I will use all my influence to secure his election, without feeling any disappointment on my part.

Another point, which I beg you gentlemen to take into consideration before you make your choice, is that I am poor, have no means, at least, to enable me to canvass the whole district, as I would like, and as every candidate ought to do. It is true, I was a member of our last Legislature, might have sold my votes and be better off to-day, like others; but as I never had any connection with railroad men, and even did not know how to control a sheriff—I remained poor. A friend of mine, a Democrat, who cries aloud against the corruption of public men in office, candidly said that I was a fool that I did not make my pile.

I was a member of the last legislature; this, gentlemen, consider well. The simple fact that a man is a member of a legislative body, it, appears, sufficient nowadays to prove him corrupt, and a thief, and no matter how honest a man may have been—he is judged and condemned with the rest. It is true this is a bad policy on the part of the people, but still, it exists. What good and honest man will care to spend his time and money as a public servant, if, instead of a recognition at least of his endeavors to serve the people, he will be so judged, and must be, as a matter of course, a swindler and a public thief? We elect a Senator for the long term for six long years, and the question now is to secure by our united efforts a good man for that position; a man who will subserve the interests of the people of our district and the State, faithfully and honestly for this time.

The sad experience we have had should teach us to secure at this time a representative of the people, and not one of a monopoly.

A friend writes me that we have a majority of six hundred to overcome. Mr. President, I do not believe the assertion; there are a good many Democrats, even, who approve of such measures as the six-shooter law which I introduced, or the school law for which I voted, and who knew that, while a democratic representative would either voluntarily, or compelled by party dictation, vote to repeal these laws—a Republican will amend and improve them; correcting abuses where they exist.

As to the platform, I was and will be guided by the one adopted by the General Convention, alone, and will endorse no Governor or any other official, and no State administration.

This will be my line of policy, and if you are satisfied with my former record—if you candidly believe that I will serve the people of my district as faithfully as before, in case I am elected, I will accept the nomination—again repeating, that I do not expect nor ask the preference, since I well know that we have other men in our midst, as honest, and undoubtedly more able than myself.
