A PROCLAMATION. > RULES.

A neutral government is bound— First, to use due diligence to prevent the fitting out, arming, or equipping, within its jurisdiction of any yearel which it has reasonable ground to believe in fu-tended to cruise or carry on war against a power with which it is at peace; and sel intended to cruise or carry on war as above, such vessel having been specially

adapted, in whole or in part, within such jurisdiction, to warlike use. belligerent to make use of its ports or waters of the base of naval operations against the other, or for the purpose of the renewal or augmentation of military supplies of arms, or the recruitment of mon.
Thirdly, to exercise due diligence in its own ports and waters, and as to all persons within its jurisdiction, to prevent any violation of this foregoing chigations

Her Britannie Majesty has commanded ernment cannot assent to the foregoing rules as a statement of principles of inter-national law which were in force at the time when the claims mentioned in Article I. arose, but that her Majesty's govern strengthening the friendly relations be Simplest, cheapest, and most practicable tween the two countries and of the making satisfactory provision for the future, agrees that in deciding the questions between the two countries arising out of those claims, the arbitrators should assume that her Majesty's government had undertaken to set upon the principles set

Convention between the United States and the German Empire. Respecting Con-suls and Trade-marks. Signed Decem ber 11, 1871; Exchanged April 29, 1872; Proclaimed June 1, 1872. BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STARES
