

To Begistrars and Boards of Appeal and Revision.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. AUSTIN, Sept. 21, 1872. Attention of Registrars and Boards of Appeals and Revision is directed to the following suggestions:

The failure in many counties on the part of Registrars and Boards of Revision, to comply strictly with the provisions of the Registration are, has caused much confusion. tration Act, has coused much con-

Persons have been allowed to register and receive duplicate certificates; and the lack of proper tweision shows in most of the counties that the flat of registered voters have become encumbered with the names of many persons who have counted to be residents of the counties in which they have registered. It being incompatible with the law to have new registerium, the Registerer and flowers of Revision are as I d upon to correct the present unreliable condition of the list of registered voten in their respective counties.

To do this, strict attention must be paid to the law, and the week parformed with great scirciny and paides of registration is given, as provided by section 11 of the registration is given.

They must register any person who, though not entitled at the time to registration, will become so on or before the day of election. (See sec. 14 of registra-

tion law.)
They must make two fair copies of all They must make two fair copies of all the registered voters in their respective counties, and said one to the office of the Secretary of State, and deliver the other to the Board of Appeal and Revision. (See section 16 of said negistration, law.)

They must note the names of all persons who have died or removed from the county; all persons who are believed to be registered more than once; and all persons

istered more than once; and all persons not entitled to register.

They must mark opposite such names objected to, in accordance with directions in section 15 of said registration law,

The lists mentioned in section 16 are the

require of such person the precial registration law.

Foreigners should show proof of citizenship, or make declaration of intention to become citizens, is accordance with section 13 of the registration law.

Papers showing declaration of intention, but taken out simply before a district clerk, and not in open court before a judge, do not entitle a foreigner to register; and all persons heretefore registered upon such papers must be stricken from the lists, the Registrats noting the words "objected to," opposite their names, and the Boards of Appeal will strike them off the registry.

In counties where municipal or town elections are held, the Registrats may conduct the tegistration for such elections at the same time of county registration—to be judges of the municipal election.

Boards of Appeal and Revision must make a careful revision of the list of voters formable them by the Registrats.
