We are informed, by probably the best posted man in this city, that San Antonio and Austin will be connected by railroad within a year, provided an early adjustment of the bond question can be had.

The refusal to give the bonds has been made by one man, connected with the State Government, the Comptroller. He has assumed the responsibility of withholding his signature, which has the effect of stopping the bonds.

Not least significant and successful have been the financial achievements of the Government. The credit of the Nation abroad has been raised an equality with that of the strongest powers in Europe, and our securities are now in demand for permanent investment at lower rates of interest than are paid by some of the largest and wealthiest nations of the old world.

And, finally, it was the Republican party, to which the honor of lessening the hours of toil of the laboring men, by the passage of the eight hour law, is due.

In no country has the laboring man so much influence in directing the affairs of the government as he has in these United States.

Nowhere has been made such rapid progress pecuniarily, morally, and intellectually as in this country. In fact the United States is the workingman's paradise, and the Republican party has made it what it is.

The record of substantial progress made by the American Nation during the last twelve years, or since the inauguration of the Republican party, is well calculated to command the most sublime admiration of every friend of civilization and personal property.

Examines their record and note the results. Our foreign relations have received peculiar and most successful attention. Great international questions have been so adjusted as to command the admiration and call for the congratulations of the Great Powers in a manner never manifested.

International arbitration has superseded the sword, and a precedent has been established for the amicable adjustment of all international problems, however intricate, without the shedding of human blood.

whereas required. Appropriations for harbor and river improvements have been liberal and judicious. The coast survey has continued and uniformly extended every bay, harbor, lake and river, and by its charts, buoys, beacons lights and printed instructions, has made navigation comparatively safe in every portion of American waters.

The war and navy departments, by their valiant armies and fleets, raised as if by magic, have decided the result of one of the greatest battles the world has ever known, and which has settled the question of human slavery, and forever from the face of our otherwise fair country.

This done, the army and navy have been reduced to a peace footing with an abundant and unbroken, leaving a remnant of new employed only as a police force upon our own borders and in foreign seas, to secure safety to life from Indian raids at home, and protection to foreign commerce and respect for the American flag abroad.

As an important offset of the war department, a signal office has been called into existence and made practically useful in guiding the interests of commerce and agriculture, by its watchful vigilance and warning notes on the approach of destructive winds and weather.

Under the auspices of the Interior Department, the Public Land System has been developed into a humane and beneficent auxiliary in ameliorating the condition of the needy of all lands. All new within our borders, who wish and all from other nationalities who wish to seek a home in America, are offered a farm of 160 acres on the mere condition of personal occupancy and improvement.

National education has secured peculiar and special attention; and through the wise and efficient operations of the Educational Bureau—this creation of the Republican party—has been systematized and stimulated, and rendered so efficient as to hold out the prospect of soon securing the means of providing for each child within the domain, through co-operation, a free education fitted to its calling on arriving at the age of maturity.

For the invalid soldiers of the war, and the widows, orphans and other dependents of deceased soldiers, liberal provision has been made; and those heroic defenders of their country in its days of peril, whose names are inscribed on the "Roll of Honor," will ever be held as precious wards of, or in grateful remembrance by the Government.

The Indian policy has been successfully changed from that of cruelty to a spirit of humanity; and civilization, education and Christianity are superseding robbery, persecution and warfare.

The operations of the Patent Office under latter patent laws and encouragement to the useful arts, have increased fourfold since 1861. The Office has been rendered correspondingly efficient in all its divisions and details.

In the Postal Department of the Government, since 1861, there have been added 1,450 new post offices, and 79,900 miles of post roads; while, through a better system and greater economy, the annual revenue of \$9,049,396.40, in 1861, has increased to \$20,087,046.40, in 1871, thus more than doubling in ten years under the Administration of the Republican party!

At the same time, international postal rates on letters to and from almost all parts of the world have, on an average, been reduced fully one third. A money order system at home, and with prominent nations abroad, has been established. A free delivery system in cities has been adopted. The cost of transporting Ocean mails has been reduced and the service largely increased. And the general management of the Department has been placed under a system of economy by which a very considerable saving is secured to the Government.

An Agricultural Department has been established—the former apology for one being merely a paltry and inefficient appendage to the Patent Office. The Agricultural Department is now distinct from the Interior and is achieving a great work for our immense and rapidly expanding Agricultural interests, with indubitable evidence of still greater results in the near future.

In reviewing the wonderful progress thus made during the last twelve years, let it be remembered that every achievement is of a solid and permanent nature and not merely temporary and for to-day only, to be undone at the next session of the Legislature. The standing evidence upon the industry of the country, resulting from these important achievements, will form the topic of a subsequent paper.

In token of respect to his memory, the City Office will be closed and all labor will cease on the public works at 12 M., for the day. The City Officers will attend his funeral when announced.

MR. NAT LEWIS, another old resident of this City has gone to his grave. He was one of those men whose positive characteristics made him known to every one in Western Texas. He died at his residence during the night of Monday at an advanced age after a tedious illness. He was, we believe, a native of Massachusetts, born near Nantucket. Without any extended literary education he went to sea at an early age in a whaling vessel. His strong natural sense, quickness of observation, and firmness of character, soon induced him to go into business "on his own hook," as the Yankees would say. He came at an early day to the coast of Texas, about 1838, we are told, and engaged in a coast-wise trade which by his shrewdness, and otherwise, he made very lucrative. Visiting San Antonio he took a fancy to the country and invested his money here. By the increase in value of real-estate, and the natural increase of live stock, investment in which he always had an inclination for, he became, and died, very wealthy. He was never what is called a public spirited man, and yet was always exercised more or less of influence over public affairs. At the time of his death he was a member, by appointment of the Governor, of the City Council of this City, in the exercise of which office he was usually conservative never progressive. He was one of those who believed that all legislation should be made in the interest of capital in the hands of the wealthy and not in the hands of the large property as we are told.

FAIRBANK'S SCALES.

Great inventions come in groups as the stars troop over our heads in constellations. The same age beheld the steam engine, the telegraph, the power loom, the sewing machine, the reaper and the platform-scale introduced or developed. 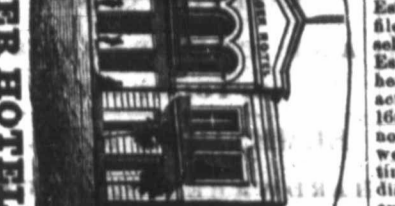
