port or general depot, to carry
heavy minerals measuring 5 to 12
cubic inches to the ton, and with
the entire load of eight tons con-
tained in 80 cubic feet of wagon
space, could not be loaded and
possession unquestionably advan-
taged. But these advantages by no
means applied to a railroad through
agricultural and cotton districts,
where the cars must be broad and
wide, and adapted for the transpor-
tation of more bulky commodities.
The plea of economy urged on be-
half of the narrow gauge system is
alleged to be wholly illusory. The
government estimates of the cost of
constructing a railroad on the three
foot three and three eighth stand-
ard English gauge from Kotree to
Mooltan (Indus Valley Line) is
placed at \$15,000,000; third rail on
the Seine and Penryn Lines,
\$2,600,000; total \$17,600,000. While
the cost of the standard gauge for
the same line is estimated at \$6,700,-
000, a difference of \$9,000,000 in
favor of the broad or standard gauge.
The actual difference of \$1,700,000
in favor of the narrow gauge line,
without the third rail, was found to
be more than neutralized by the in-
creased cost of equipment, or rolling
stock, rendered necessary in
order to render its actual working
capacity equal to that of the broad
gauge line. Mr. Molesworth, the
Consulting Engineer of the British
government on State railways, gives
another estimate of the compara-
tive expenses of constructing
the three lines, which would increase
the difference against the narrow
gauge system to a sum of \$2,700,000.

The government engineers also
found that to perform the same
standard gauge, work with the nar-
row gauge rolling stock it would re-
quire 1-4-8 the number of cars, with
a corresponding increase of engine
power. In the estimates of the In-
dus Valley Railroad the cost of
rolling stock is estimated at \$7,215
a mile for standard (5 feet 6 inches)
gauge, and at \$4,510 for an equal
number of narrow gauge cars and
locomotives. Adding four-fifths to
the narrow gauge estimates in order
to make the transportation facili-
ties equal to the standard gauge,
will bring the cost of rolling stock
up to \$6,060, making a difference of
\$2,445 against the narrow gauge
system. Private contractors of ad-
mitted responsibility actually offer-
ed to construct the proposed Indus
Valley and Pashaur Railway on the
standard-gauge plan for less
money than the government was
prepared to spend on the narrow
gauge line for the same distance, the
gradients, curves, bridges, &c., to
be in all respects equally substan-
tial, and the broad gauge road to
be completed in less time than it
was proposed to construct the nar-
row gauge line.

AT Bangkok, Siam, quite recent-
ly, the Minister of Foreign Affairs
gave an evening party at his resi-
dence in honor of the King's birth-
day, to which most of the European
residents were invited. The attend-
ance was large, and dancing kept
up till early in the morning. A
dinner was given in the palace to
some of the Princes, and a dinner
was also given to prominent Siam-
ese officials and to some of the Euro-
pean in Siamese employ. This
dinner was served in a new and
beautiful hall in the palace. His
Majesty honored his guests with
his presence and dined in the same
hall at a separate table. These
demonstrations indicate the good will
of the young King to foreigners and
the opening of the era of knife and
fork diplomacy in Siam.

**ABOLITION OF THE ELECTORAL
COLLEGE.**— In view of the annoying
complications that might have oc-
curred had Horace Greeley had been
elected by the people and died be-
fore the Presidential electors had
cast their votes, the Cincinnati En-
quirer asserts that "this whole Elec-
toral College machinery should be
abolished and the people vote di-
rectly through the several States
for President and Vice President.
Then, if the popular choice should
happen to die before his inaugura-
tion, the office would fall where it
constitutionally devolves,—upon the
Vice President, who is elected with
a view to such a result." We are
certain to make this change sooner
or later, and Congress at its present
session should take the initiative
steps necessary to alter the pro-
visions of the constitution regard-
ing the mode of electing the Presi-
dent and Vice President.

Re-assembling of Congress.—The President's Message—Reports of Heads of Departments—Proceedings in Congress—Sunner and Banks.—The President at Mr. Greeley's Funeral—Resignation of the President's Secretary—Current Events, &c., &c.

After the President's message was read in the Senate and the House, members expressed their views very freely upon its tenor and recommendations. And it must be a gratification to the President and to the country generally, to know that a general approval of the entire contents of the message was freely expressed by members of the Senate and the House of every shade of politics...

There is much interest felt in Senator Sumner and Mr. P. Banks. They are both victims of their own folly. Sumner is not an object of sympathy, for he was one of the pioneers in the silly opposition raised against Grant and his administration, with the view mainly of defeating his re-election. But as indicated by his action today in the Senate, he is not disposed to retire from active participation in the proceedings of the session...

THE PRESIDENT AT MR. GREELEY'S FUNERAL. The sad intelligence of the death of Mr. Greeley was never announced than the President declared his purpose to follow the remains of the great journalist to the grave. As many of the members of the Cabinet as can absent themselves from their official duties, will also attend the funeral...

RESIGNATION OF GENERAL PORTER. General Horatio Porter, the President's Secretary has tendered his resignation to accept the Vice Presidency of the Pullman Car Company, at a salary of \$60,000 a year. WOMEN IN THE GOVERNMENT SERVICE. There are 1200 female clerks in the U. S. Treasury. Under the rules of the Civil Service females are placed upon an exact equality with the males in the competitive examinations and in the amount of salary received. There are about 500 women in charge of post offices throughout the country, and about 100 women employed in the postal service in Washington and elsewhere...

JUDGE NELSON RESIGNED. Judge Nelson of the U. S. Supreme Court has resigned. B. H. Bristol, late Solicitor General will probably be his successor. WASHINGTON SOCIETY. This week inaugurates the regular round of parties, balls, receptions and state societies. The winter promises to be even more than usually gay.

THE DIPLOMATIC CORPS AND THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE. The members of the Diplomatic Corps are speaking in terms of approbation of the foreign policy of the Government, as intimated in the President's Message. Thornton is however somewhat reserved in his remarks.
