### Origin of Names of States.

There is much that is interesting in the study of the origin of the names of the States of the Union, as they are derived from a variety of sources. To begin in the geographical order, we first have Maine, which takes its name from the Province of Maine, in France, and was so called in compliment to the Queen of Christ I, Henrietta, its owner.

New Hampshire—first called Laconia—from Hampshire, England. Vermont, from the Green Mountains (French *vert* means).

Massachusetts, from the Indian language, signifying "The country about the great hill."

Rhode Island gets its name from the fancied resemblance of the island to that of Rhodes, in the ancient Levant.

Connecticut's name was Mohegan, spelled originally, *Quon-hut-tuc*, signifying "A long river."

New York was so named as a compliment to the Duke of York, whose brother, Charles II., granted him that territory.

New Jersey was named by one of its original proprietors, Sir George Carteret, after the island of Jersey, in the British Channel, of which he was governor.

Pennsylvania, as is generally known, takes its name from Wm. Penn, the word "sylvania," meaning woods.

Delaware derived its name from Thomas West, Lord De la Ware, Governor of Virginia.

Maryland received its name from the queen of Charles I., Henrietta Maria.

Virginia got its name from Queen Elizabeth, the unmarried Virgin Queen.

The Carolinas were named in honor of Charles I., and Georgia in honor of George II.

Florida gets its name from Paganus de Florida, or "Feast of the flowers."

Alabama comes from a Greek word signifying "The land of rest."

Mississippi derives its name from that of the great river, which is in the Natchez tongue, "The father of Waters."

Louisiana was so named in honor of Louis XIV.

Arkansas derived from the Indian word Kansas, "Smoky water," with the French prefix of *arc*, "a bow."

Kentucky also is an Indian name, "Heart-land," signifying "At the head of the river."

Ohio is the Shawnee name for "The Beautiful River."

Michigan's name was derived from the lake, the Indian name for a fish-ward, or trap, which the shape of the lake suggested.

Indiana's name came from that of the Indians.

Illinois' name is derived from the Indian word, "Illini," men, and the French affix, "ois," making it "The people of men."

Wisconsin's name is said to be the Indian one for a wild, rushing channel.

Missouri's is also an Indian name for muddy, having reference to the mudiness of the Missouri River.

Kansas is the Indian name for smoky water.

The derivation of the name of Nebraska and Nevada is not known.

Iowa signifies, in the Indian language, "The drowsy ones," and Minnesota "Cloudy water."

The origin of the name of California is uncertain.

Oregon, according to some, comes from Organa, the Indian name of a wild marjoram, which grows abundantly on the Pacific coast; and, according to others, from Oregon, "The river of the West," in allusion to the Columbia River.

West Virginia gets its name from having been formed from the western part of old Virginia.

### The Sewing Machine Lobby.

We called attention a few days ago to the fact that the sewing machine interest is at the present time represented by a powerful lobby, which is endeavoring to obtain from Congress a renewal of their patents which are on the eve of expiration. The Cincinnati *Gazette*, in an article upon the subject, says: "A thing more penny for Congressional corruption than the credit mobilities, and whose success means a vastly greater robbery of the public, is now laying its plans

to capture Congress. It is now a time when the stable can be rocked before the horse is stolen. We mean the combination of sewing machine manufacturers, whose principal patents are about to expire, which is now laying its plans to lobby their renewal through Congress.

Vast fortunes have been realized in these patents, and they have been used to make the American people pay twice as much for machines as the same companies sell their machines for in England. But not satisfied with this, the enormous profits they have made is now combined to work through Congress their extension. The extension of these patents, or of any one of the numerous patents of auxiliary parts, with which they are combined, would be so unjust an extension of a rich monopoly that it should be taken as evidence of the corruption of any member that votes for it, or becomes an attorney for it, and of any officer of the Government who countenances it."

An Italian chemist named Cropp, a resident of Forli, has discovered a process by which castor oil is rendered tasteless and odorless, while its efficacy and value are enhanced by the distillation of that emetic quality which makes this best of cathartics repugnant to so many. Sig. Cropp's invention will prove a great blessing to consumers of castor oil, and its introduction into American medical practice will undoubtedly follow.
