The Tencher's Influence.

Every person in the world exerts an influence, sensibly or insensibly, and by others it is perceptable or inperceptable. Not even an involuntary metion or glance but hamith effect, upon ourselves, if alone, dpon others if in company; for involuntary actions become so by practice, the muscles had first to be trained, though we may not remember when that training took place, Wa judge people by their actions.

The manner in which a person walks across a room, tells us whether he be gentle or boisterous, strong or weak, slew and vacillating or energetic and desided. The manner in which oue stands tells un whather he have self-possession and self-control or whether consciousness of self makes him besitating and weak. The manner in which the head is carried gives us an impression of studionaness. reverence, uchleness of mind, thoughtfulness, dignity, firmness, sweetness of dispesition, modesty, or on the other hand of supercilionsuces, faine pride, meanness. alyness, or cunning, impudence, &c. The very manner of opening and shutting the eyes, even though all other parts of the face may be at rest, informs ne whether there is in the mind quiet thought or agitation, whether the attention is given to us, or to something else in the reom, "or to something far away; whether anger er offended dignity is roused, or whether happinezs sits within. All these movements are temperary and continually changing-but let us consider the permanent features. The lines of the eye-brows and mouth show us smallness or weskness of mind, or on the other hand grandour and nebility of soul, able to grapple with the mightiest thoughts. Whether the prevailing disposition is one of pervishness, fretfulness, discontent, or one loving, supehiny; whether self and self-opinion and soorn of others, is uppermost always; or consideration for others feelings, which makes spoken words to be chespn carefully. 
