




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Trinity Baptist to host Bible schools

Editorial

"Openness" means just that

that "close only counts accept the position?" in horseshoes and atom bombs."

What it means is that no matter what your intent, or how hard you try, if you miss the mark... you miss the mark.

Such has been the case with the Muleshoe Area Hospital District, and more specifically it's board of directors. While the board members have expressed a desire for more openness with the public, along with building support for current and future projects, there has been a continuing series of "problems" that have been troubling to say the least.

Case in point... the hiring of the new administrator for Park View Nursing Care Center. At Thursday's meeting, the board closed its doors for "contract situations - must be discussion" with a candidate conducted in public. for the position. Both the candidate and the hospital district's CEO were invited into the closed session with the board.

After returning to open session, a motion to hire this "candidate" was made, seconded and approved by a quick show of hands which means if you glance away for a second you don't know who voted for what. But that's a separate issue.

With the motion's passage, the board president announced that the candidate had "accepted the position."

miss something? Motion made, seconded, vote... but serves.

There's an old saying no "Ms. Candidate, will you

When did the candidate accept the position... in executive session?

The state's open meetings law is very clear that not even a "straw poll" or consensus can be taken while in closed session. Sure, the board members may express their opinions in closed session, but we don't see how the board members can go from that to "Will you accept the position?" without a decision being reached and state law being violated.

While some may suggest it's just a case of the board "placing the cart before the horse," the truth is Texas law says this horse shouldn't have been harnessed in the first place.

State law is clear that public business - except for under certain defined Closed session polls, secret ballots and even carrying documents from board member to board member, whether by hand or email, for either signatures or revision is expressly forbidden. State law says "rubber stamping" an action taken out of open session isn't allowed.

While it undoubtedly wasn't the board member's intent to violate the law, it appears that a violation occurred none the less.

We applaud the hospital board's stated interest in open government, but preventing such problems in the future would go a Wait a minute... did we long way toward building trust with the community it

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

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Now walk your walk

Many years ago the apostle Paul wrote the Church at Ephesus: "I therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you that ye walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are

One meaning of the word "vocation" is "occupation." So this speaks of the occupation in which they were employed. It is also a good lesson for us. Even though we often feel unworthy he says walk "worthy."

The next verse speaks of attitude: "with all lowliness, with long suffering, forbearing one another in love." It is difficult, nay, it is impossible to walk worthy unless we maintain a proper attitude. Attitude is a state of mind. Elsewhere Paul wrote; "With my mind I serve the law of God."

I read of an elderly man that liked to go walking with his evening's hospital district grandson. He was a tall man. Consequently he used a long walking stick. The grandson admired his grandfather and wanted to be like him. That is as natural asp breathing. Children and grandchildren want to admire and imitate their elders. So the child found one of grandfather's walking sticks and tried to walk with it. But it was so tall he couldn't do much good with it.

Then grandfather cut a shorter one, gave it to the child and said:"Now take this, and 'walk your walk'." That's the way it is in real life. We must teach our children to start at their level... at something they can handle. Then as they grow they can use a longer walking stick. They will in time be able to walk like grandpa. That, again, is real life. And we can assure them that the journey will be more pleasant than the destination. That too is a fact of life.

Whatever vocation the young ones choose, and that goes for us too, we must start at a level we can manage, then learn the trade, build a solid foundation and move forward-grow upward. It is dangerous to start too big, whether a business, job or profession. The large companies, Coca Cola, Wal-Mart, McDonald's and others had very humble beginnings. Delta Airlines began as a crop spraying service. The great athletes, the large investors, advanced as they learned the vocation and developed their talents. With ministers, doctors, lawyers, whatever be the calling, it is the same. For that's the process.

Paul also wrote; "Let every man abide in the same calling wherein he was called." This is a must, if we are to expect success. We cannot succeed by trying to function in vocations for which we do not have the native or God given abilities. Sometimes it takes a while to determine what nothing had ever been our talents and desires really are, but when we do learn it, then we should, as Paul said, "Abide therein," and devote an enormous amount of ourselves to it. Some are teachers, some are preachers, doctors, lawyers, farmers, athletes, scientists, on and on. basically hidden among the It takes all to make up the whole.

IRS backs down on claims against hospital

and I'm here to help."

Words that make private citizens cringe, and can create a similar response in public entities as well when the "helpful" government agent carries identification that says Internal Revenue Service.

On July 17, 2007, a representative of the IRS dropped by the Muleshoe Area Medical Center in what was reported at that board meeting as the first such visit to a West Texas medical facility.

According to hospital administrator Ray Mason, the agent was particularly interested in how the hospital employed its physicians, to which Mason pointed out that under Texas law hospitals could contract with a physician, but couldn't "employ" a physician.

While Mason said he felt good about the IRS visit a year ago, the agent's

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

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Water for Your Soul by Max Lucado

Where do you find water for the soul? Jesus gave an answer one October day in Jerusalem. People had packed the streets for the annual reenactment of the rockgiving-water miracle of Moses. Each morning a priest filled a golden pitcher with water from the Gihon spring and carried it down a people-lined path to the temple. He did this every day, once a day, for seven days. "On the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried out, saying, 'If anyone thirsts, let him come to Me and drink. He who believes in Me, as the Scripture has said, out of his heart will flow rivers of living water'" (John 7:37-38).

He "stood and shouted" (NLT). The traditional rabbinic teaching posture was sitting and speaking. But Jesus stood up and shouted out. Forget a kind clearing of the throat. God was pounding his gavel on heaven's bench. Christ demanded attention.

He shouted because his time was short. The sand in the neck of his hourglass was down to measurable grains. In six months he'd be dragging a cross through these streets. And the people? The people thirsted. They needed water, not for their throats, but for their hearts. So Jesus invited: Are your insides starting to shrivel? Drink me.

Internalize him. Ingest him. Welcome him into the inner workings of your life. Let Christ be the water of your soul.

Toward this end, I give you this tool: a prayer for the thirsty heart. Carry it just as a cyclist carries a water bottle. The prayer outlines four essential fluids for soul hydration: God's work, God's energy, his lordship, and his love. You'll find the prayer easy to remember. Just think of the word W-E-L-L.

Lord, I come thirsty. I come to drink, to receive. I receive your work on the cross and in your resurrection. My sins are pardoned, and my death is defeated. I receive your energy. Empowered by your Holy Spirit, I can do all things through Christ, who gives me strength. I receive your lordship. I belong to you. Nothing comes to me that hasn't passed through you. And I receive your love. Nothing can separate me from your love.

Don't you need regular sips from God's reservoir? I do. I've offered this prayer in countless situations: stressful meetings, dull days, long drives, demanding trips, character-testing decisions. Many times a day I step to the underground spring of God and receive anew his work for my sin and death, the energy of his Spirit, his lordship, and his love.

Drink with me from his bottomless well. You don't have to live with a dehydrated

2007-08 Texas Minimum State Vaccine Requirements for Students Grades K-12

This chart summarizes the vaccine requirements incorporated in Title 25 Health Services, §§97.61-97.72 of the Texas Administrative Code (TAC).



This chart is not intended as a substitute for consulting the TAC, which has other provisions and details. The Department of State Health Services is granted authority to set immunization requirements by the Education Code, Chapter 38, Health & Safety, Subchapter A, General Provisions.

IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS

A student shall show acceptable evidence of vaccination prior to entry, attendance, or transfer to a child-care facility or public or private elementary or secondary school in Texas.

VACCINE

Diphtheria, Tetanus, and Pertussis

This smmer, we will complete construction on the first phase of the \$25 million Bond Program passed in 2006. We have added 17 new classrooms, kitchen, cafeteria, restrooms, offices, and new playground equipment at Dillman Elementary. At DeShazo Elementary, we will add five new classrooms, as well as a set of restrooms to the west side of DeShazo . This is an exciting time in the history of Muleshoe ISD! The High School and DeShazo additions will take a little over two years to complete.





I keep wondering: What does it take for human beings to truly know God's grace as something much more than theoretical?

I know. Most Christians talk a lot about God's grace. We dissect it in Bible studies. We say we believe in it. We claim to know it as our only hope. We may even admit intellectu-

ally that we need it just as **Focus**

badly as anyone else. I wonder if we really believe that? What has to occur before

we really do? Or really can? What does it take for us to quit talking as if our problem was only with sins and not with Sin? If sins are my biggest problem, then I can catalog them, come up with an improvement plan, and get to work—at least until I realize

how strong is their grip. But, alas, my problem is not "sins" as much as it is Sin, not the symptoms but the taproot. My problem is the sinful nature that is mankind's curse and which no one, apart from the blood of Christ, can ever defeat, no matter how strict his resolve, how seriously devoted

much penance she undertakes. What has to happen before we realize that the most "respectable" of us has in attitude if not action transgressed in ways that twist our souls every bit as badly as any overt crime committed by any criminal ever locked away in any prison?

What does it take for us to really put our weight down on God's grace? I really wonder. It's one thing to talk about

grace in theory. But I suspect that grace remains largely theoretical until . . . Until we've been almost

crushed by pain or tragedy. Until we've failed at a marriage or a business.

Until our tears have watered in the soil of a grave where we have buried our own hearts along with one dearer than life. Until we've lived through

the death of a dream we loved almost as dearly as a child. Until we've wept bitterly at the self-inflicted ruin we see rampaging through the life of a

son or daughter. Until we're dazed by the depth of our own depravity and weakness and been deeply ashamed and out of excuses.

Until the grace of God has been our only hope and we have had more than a few moments when we wondered if even God's grace is strong enough to pull us out of the pit—and his love deep enough for him to want to.

Until we've been so crushed that we quit reaching down for our own bootstraps and instead

in tears reach up to our Father. Until then, grace—the grace of God we receive and the grace we extend to others—is largely a theoretical concept.

I wonder if it can be any other way? I wonder if it is even possible for people who haven't yet been broken to truly trust in God's grace?

Oysters can't produce pearls until they deal with the pain of grains of sand intruding into their shells. And people? Is it possible for us to truly accept God's grace and pass it on until we've been broken and cried out in pain? I wonder.



This allowed us to take the debt rate off the top for the bonds and allocate the balance of the tax base to the operating of both facilities. This was accomplished through budgeting for each facility. With that said, it is then up to each administrator to function on their allocated operating tax base.
