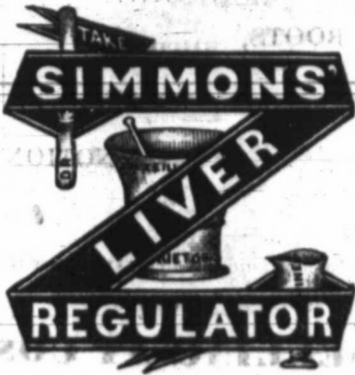

A Sane Man Confined in a Lunatic Asylum for 12 Years

[From the Sioux City Journal, May 2.]

Covington, our trans-Missouri
 neighbor, has had a sensation of
 metropolitan proportions. For six
 years she has numbered among her
 residents a man named Thomas
 Carter and a woman named Mrs.
 Dracott—the twain, as is alleged,
 bearing relations to each other
 which is incumbent upon couples
 in similar circumstances to have
 ratified according to law. Twelve
 years ago they were residents of
 Oregon, the woman being the wife
 of a man named Dracott, who was
 worth at that time the very com-
 fortable sum of \$95,000. By con-
 spiring with a couple of the physi-
 cians connected with the Territorial

Insane Asylum, Carter and his par-
 amour succeeded in kidnapping
 Dracott, and having him wrongfully
 incarcerated in the institution on a
 charge of insanity, thereby gain-
 ing possession of his fortune. For
 twelve long years this villainous
 fraud upon Dracott had been kept
 up, depriving him of his liberty,
 and compelling him to associate
 with idiots and madmen. By
 some means he succeeded in con-
 veying knowledge of his deplorable
 condition to persons outside, and
 an investigation of the matter was
 instituted. So strongly had the job
 been put up, however, that an ex-
 pense of \$40,000 on the part of the
 authorities was required in order to
 break up the tools by which Dracott
 was held. The efforts at ferreting
 out the iniquity finally led to the
 discovery of the prime actor in this
 monstrous imposition. A United
 States detective was instructed to
 proceed to Covington and procure
 the arrest of Carter and Mrs. Dra-
 cott. Upon arriving at Omaha the
 officer learned that Carter had
 started for Salt Lake City. He tele-
 graphed to Ogden, and succeeded
 in securing the arrest of the man: at
 that place, on last Wednesday. He
 then came up to Covington and
 arrested Mrs. Dracott on Thursday.
 Yesterday he went to Dakota City
 to examine the county records, for
 the purpose of discovering what
 property she had, in order that
 proceedings might be instituted for
 transferring the title of it to Mr.
 Dracott, as a partial restitution for
 what he has been deprived of by
 the machinations of the guilty par-
 ties. Carter has invested some mo-
 ney in Covington and Dakota coun-
 ty, and was one of the principal
 capitalists who gave that town the
 impetus it had three or four years
 ago.

We hope that whatever wrong
 has been committed may bring to
 its doors a prompt punishment, but
 it is out of the reach of possibilities
 for the unfortunate Dracott to ever
 realize anything like an adequate
 recompense for the misery and men-
 tal anguish he has endured while
 suffering as the helpless object of
 the cupidity of a faithless wife and
 unscrupulous knave.

HIGHLANDERS have the habit,
 when talking their English, such as
 it is, of interjecting the personal
 pronoun "he" where not required,
 such as "The king he has come,"
 instead of "The king has come."
 Often, in consequence, a sentence
 or an expression is rendered
 sufficiently ludicrous. Thus a clergy-

 first Epistle general of the Apostle

 subject of our text, to-day, into four
 heads. Firstly, We shall endeavor
 to ascertain 'Who the devil he was?'
 Secondly, We shall inquire into his
 geographical position—namely,

 'Where the devil he was going?'
 Thirdly, And this is of a personal
 character—'Who the devil he was
 seeking?' And fourthly and lastly,
 We shall endeavor to solve a
 question which has never been solved
 —'What the devil he was roaring
 about?'

THURSDAY, May 21, is the day
 officially announced for the mar-

 as the wedding will be conducted
 in the English style. Mr. A. T. Ste-
 wart, W. E. Dodge, Judge Pierpont,
 and Mr. and Mrs. Hoey will be
 among the New Yorkers present at
 the ceremony. The bridal party
 will sail in the Cunard steamer on
 the 23d inst., and will be accom-
 panied by Secretary Richardson's wife
 and daughters.

DR. SCHEMANN has at last made
 arrangements with the Turkish
 Government to continue his explo-

Our Future and the Election for Members of Congress.

A few days ago we published the law redistricting the State into congressional districts. Instead of the former four districts we have now six, each of which will elect a member of Congress. Our district reaches from the Rio Grande to the Guadalupe, taking in the counties of Blanco, Caldwell, Gillespie, El Paso, Guadalupe, Hays, Kerr, Pecos, Presidio, Jackson and Calhoun, east of the Guadalupe. The election will take place this fall.

We congratulate the citizens of Western Texas for being cut loose from Austin. The old ring will now have enough work on hand to carry its own district and let us alone. Since Hon. Degener vacated his seat in Congress, Western Texas has had no representatives at all as is evinced by the total neglect of our main harbor, our celebrated depot business and other matters of equal importance.

The Indianapolis Bulletin of May 14th starts a leader, entitled "Our position and inactivity," with the following well-founded complaint:

"Matagorda bay possesses one of the best harbors on the Gulf of Mexico, with an entrance that is susceptible of being improved so as to admit the largest class of ocean steamers. But, owing to circumstances, caused by the want of proper energy on the part of the citizens of Western Texas, the bay remains useless as a harbor for the exports and imports of a section of country that is imperial in the extent of its territory, fertile and productive beyond all comparison in the richness of its soils, and possessing mineral wealth that is known to be inexhaustible. Yet Western Texas remains this day comparatively a wilderness, without population, without influence, and dependent entirely on extraneous influences, not possessing sufficient energy among her people to arouse them to a sense of the splendid advantages they possess over all other portions of the South."

This is plain truth. The people of Western Texas alone are responsible for the present state of things. When Hancock became a candidate for the Western district, we opposed his election not so much on account of his policy, for Hancock was not a democrat in the party sense, and he was a Union man besides, but because he was a member of the Austin ring, because all his interests were concentrated in Austin and because Austin was dependent on Galveston for its development. But party hatred run away with common sense at that time, and we have now to suffer the consequences of our foolish action.

Hancock has exclusively worked for Galveston and Austin. San Antonio was occasionally alienated by an appropriation for a Depot in the air—and all the balance of the West, including our harbors, allowed to take care of itself. Our democratic contemporaries glorified in the victory of the democracy and never thought for a moment of our material wants and the consequences of our suicidal policy. Mr. Degener, who was then a candidate and who by his faithful services to the West deserved to be re-elected, was defeated and thereby our fair country doomed to utter neglect.

And after one years experiment, at the second election of Hancock, the democratic majority was increased and thereby the suicidal policy confirmed and perpetuated.

There is not a place in Western

Texas that does not feel the decline of its prosperity, or that does not witness a stagnation unheard of heretofore. For all this we have the consolation of having brought it about ourselves. We have thrown the welfare of Western Texas into the lap of the Austin ring and there it is on the best way to perdition.

Now we have a district of our own, and it involves upon us to select a man as our representative, who will indeed be a representative, and who will redeem what we have lost by our former impolitic action. And we will state here at once, that the material interest of our district will be the first consideration in our choice of the man that we shall support.

Let others do likewise, and there will be a change for the better.

THE losses to the British army by the Ashantee war are as follows: Of officers, six died from the effects of wounds and eight from disease; seven deaths occurred among the men from wounds, and eighteen from disease. The total number of admissions on board the Victor Emanuel up to the date of her departure from the coast was, we are told, of officers fifty five, seven being wounded; and of men five hundred and sixty-five, of whom fifty-one were from gunshot wounds.

Telegram.

CORPUS CHRISTI, TEX., May 13.—Last Monday, at the Pecos, about 60 miles from Corpus Christi, on the Laguna Madre, a party of men, supposed to be Mexicans, attacked a store kept by four Americans, citizens of Corpus Christi, and murdered all of them. The names of the murdered men are John F. Morton, Michael Morton, Cokely (a nephew of J. B. Murphy, the partner of E. J. Davis), and a German, named Herman Tilgner. Intense excitement exists in the community.

Parties are out in search of the murderers and will be in to-day or to-morrow. Yesterday, at the Cayman Lake, in San Patricio county, about 30 miles northwest of Corpus Christi, three Mexicans were found hanging to a tree. They had been engaged in the robbery of two Americans last Thursday. It is not supposed they hanged themselves.

It is reported here that last night, on the prairie between this place and Rockport, a man, a hide buyer, was found cut to pieces, supposed to have been done by Mexicans. He had in his possession \$1000 which was taken. I could not learn his name. Of all these tragedies, fuller particulars will arrive soon, of which I will send details. It is not improbable that a wholesale vengeance will be enacted upon the perpetrators of these horrible outrages and all aiders and sympathizers. A company of United States cavalry, at Captain King's Rancho, affords no protection, though stationed there for that purpose.

COLUMBUS, TEX., May 13.—A relief train consisting of engine and one car, ran off about three miles west of Weimar this morning, killing engineer Hume and fireman instantly, and bringing the conductors hand. The cause of the accident is unknown.

Weather warm and dry. Crops need rain.

MADRID, May 13.—The new ministry is announced this morning. It is constituted as follows: Sabalo, President of the council and Minister of War; Sagosta, Minister of Interior; Ulloa, Minister of Foreign Affairs; Camacho, Minister of Justice; Alonzo Colemanariz, Minister of Public Works; Romero Ortiz, Minister of Colonies; Rodriguez Ariques, Minister of Marine.

A Joke from the Bench.

Many a joke transpires in the court room which is never recorded. Judge Baine, the genial of Cleveland, "shot off his mouth" while presiding over the District Court, last week, in so happy a joke that we propose to rescue it from oblivion. He had just delivered the opinion of the bench that the administrator of a certain deceased litigant need be made party to the suit, and mentioned casually that this would work postponement to the suit. Then, in his off-hand manner, he said: "But the attorney in the suit need not feel badly because of that, for unless the case progresses more rapidly than it has since it was begun, all the parties will be represented by administrators before it is finally decided." The smile came in and the judge proceeded with the docket.—[Toledo Democrat.]

THE British Constitution is again in danger, being threatened this time by no less revolutionary an assault than a request to the Government to open the public museums and galleries of art on Sundays. It is such reckless and audacious attacks as this which cause the average Briton to get red in the face and to gasp for breath. If the libraries and museums and galleries were open on Sundays, people who work on week days might be shameless enough to walk in and look around, and even if England could stand that she would never wish offending God Almighty, who has been put into the Constitution of England, and who is understood to be opposed to common folks amusing themselves when their work is over.

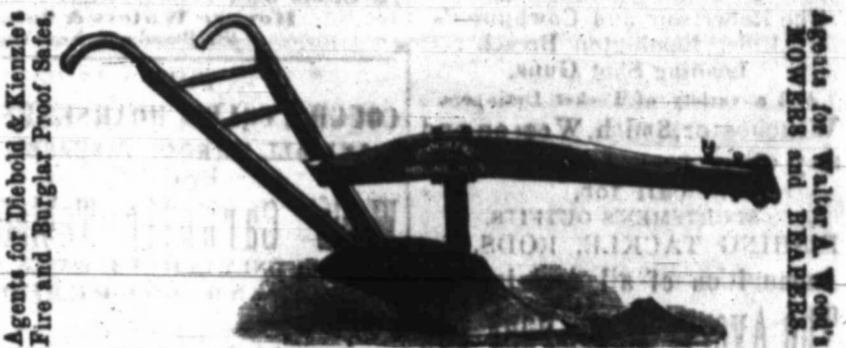

We are very sorry to learn that Mr. Peter Wirth, of Boerne, was killed last Friday by the accidental discharge of his own pistol.

The San Antonio Grand Fair will come off some time in the coming autumn.

The Southern Baptist Convention, recently in session at Jefferson, represented the whole Baptist Church in all the Southern States, and was, we believe, the first session of that body in Texas.

The State Fair at Houston begins tomorrow, and will continue throughout the week.

The Lunatic Asylum imbroglio still occupies public attention, and the end is not yet.

The Kansas City Delegation for the promotion of the export of the immense grain products of the Great West through Galveston, reached the latter city on Thursday last, and were cordially received.

San Antonio now has the prospect of being reached by two railroads in a comparatively short space of time.

The Civil War in Arkansas.

The latest dispatches inform us that the contest for the Governorship of Arkansas is about to reach a definite crisis.

Then military operations began, skirmishes and combats followed, and a bloody and decisive battle would have been fought some time since but for the active intervention of the Federal troops.

In the mean time, Baxter issued a call for the meeting of the Legislature. They obeyed the call, and are now in session, but not in the State House.

When Baxter succeeds in regaining possession of the State government, it would seem that Brooks will be in danger of arrest and trial for high treason.

One of the most remarkable incidents in the history of this imbroglio is the fact that Attorney-General Williams, with singular infelicity,

recommended that Baxter and Brooks should both issue a call for the meeting of the Legislature, thus giving to Brooks a quasi recognition.

Telegraphic.

LITTLE ROCK, May 14.—They are still arresting each other.

Two Brooksites while making cartridges thought they would smoke, and exploded each other.

LITTLE ROCK, May 13.—Both houses met this forenoon and adopted the following joint resolution:

WHEREAS, The Legislature of the State of Arkansas has convened, and a quorum of each house being present, and

WHEREAS, The Capital of the State is occupied by armed and contending forces and

WHEREAS, The State House is now in possession of armed troops. Therefore be it

Resolved, By the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas, that the President of the United States be, and is hereby requested, to put this Legislature in possession of the legislative halls and public property on the State House square,

The situation as to the two armed forces remains unchanged.

The Senate appointed a committee to act in conjunction with the House.

The committee appointed yesterday notified Governor Baxter, that the General Assembly was ready to receive any message he might desire to deliver.

The Governor's message it is thought will be read to both houses this evening.

LITTLE ROCK, May 15.—The Baxterites captured Brooks's carriage, his daughter and coachman.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—It is understood that President Grant has consented to St. Louis for General Sherman's headquarters.

The Cabinet talked two hours over Arkansas matters. The Legislature will be supported.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—A number of Southern Representatives had a meeting in the room of the House Committee on Agriculture to-day to fix on some measure for the reimbursement of the cotton tax levied by the government eight years since and subsequently pronounced unconstitutional by the United States Supreme Court.

The currency bill passed. It provides for free banking until greenbacks are reduced to \$300,000,000.

The House Freedmen's Bank bill passed as heretofore telegraphed.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—The Senate to-day passed the finance bill after amending it so as to provide that the amount of United States notes equal to 25 per cent. of the new national bank notes issued shall be retired, instead of 50 per cent. as the committee recommended.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Senate is considering bills from the committee on claims.

Citizens of Mississippi have petitioned the government to take charge of the levees.

Bills referring the claim of the heirs of Stephen A. Douglas to the Court of Claims passed.

A bill for the relief of the German Evangelical Churches in West Virginia was passed.

Senator Edmunds gave notice that on Monday the Senator from New Jersey, Mr. Frelinghuysen, would ask the Senate to resume the consideration of the civil rights bill and dispose of it before taking up any other measure.

Senator Clayton gave notice that on Monday he would call up the resolution introduced by him on Tuesday last to provide for the appointment of a committee of the Senate to proceed to Arkansas to investigate the condition of affairs there.

Senate bill for the relief of Hiram L. W. Love was discussed at some length. It directs the Secretary of the Treasury to pay Love \$5000 in full for all claims and demands against the United States for damages growing out of the destruction by the military forces of the United States in 1864, of a crop of cotton growing on his premises in Desha county, Arkansas, which was looted by Love from the United States.

Senator Wright moved to amend the bill so as to appropriate \$20,000 instead of \$5,000.

Senator Chandler moved to recommit the bill.

Senator Gordon introduced a bill to remove the political disabilities of John Forsyth, of Alabama. Referred to Committee on Judiciary.

There was an executive session, but nothing interesting transpired.

No nominations.

The postoffice appropriation bill was taken up, when the House adjourned.
