**East African Slave Trade.**  
[From the London Globe, May 15]  
According to a memorial presented to Mr Disraeli last week by an influential deputation, the treaty of June last, between her Majesty and the Sultan of Zanzibar is completely inoperative. By it the Sultan agreed to stop the export of slaves from the African mainland, and to close all slave markets within his dominions. It does not appear to be alleged that the ruler of Zanzibar has broken faith in carrying out the provisions of this treaty. But that they have been successfully evaded by traders engaged in this iniquitous traffic is very evident. An overland route having been established from Lamu to Brava, Dr. Kirk recently reported that in the short space of six weeks 2804 slaves had been forwarded by this road, or at the rate of 25000 per annum. Many other violations of the treaty having been reported to Lord Granville, it seems high time that it was either rescinded altogether or put in force. If the Sultan is unable, as stated, to prevent the inland slave trade in his dominions, another treaty should be made giving England the right to suppress the atrocious commerce by any means she may consider most efficacious. But, in all probability, the Zanzibar potentate winks at these evasions of a treaty which was extorted from him against his will. The duty on slaves having formed an important part of his revenue, he could not be induced to forbid the traffic until Sir Bartle Frere had employed a good deal of that moral compulsion which results from the proximity of a British naval force. Viewing the firm hold still maintained by slavery and slave dealing in many remote parts of the world, all civilized powers should unite in stamping out this disgrace to humanity.

**The Turkish Question Looming Up Again.**  
If the Berlin despatch of the London Times about the action of Germany, Serbia and Roumania regarding the Turkish question can be relied on, the old complications between the European Powers and Turkey will probably be revived. It is said that an agreement has been made between Germany, Serbia and Roumania to mutually protect their interests and position against the designs of Turkey. The report comes at the same time that serious differences have arisen, threatening grave consequences, between the Khedive of Egypt and the Sublime Porte. If these reports be true the Ottoman government is likely to be between two dangerous fires, and possibly there may be an understanding to make a combined and coercive movement upon the Sublime Porte. But what of Austria? Have the Rumanians and Servians overleaped the Austrian Empire, their immediate neighbor, to make an alliance with the great German Power? Perhaps the reported movement is understood and acquiesced in by Austria. If not there may be a danger in it to her as well as to Turkey. While Germany is separated both from Turkey and Roumania and Serbia by the Austrian Empire, Austria is near neighbor of these Eastern States, and must be more deeply interested in their fate. Then Russia could not be ignored in any movement affecting the status of Turkey, Roumania and Serbia. In fact any question affecting them would be considered more Russian than German. Should the report referred to be true there is probably an understanding among the great Continental Powers of Europe to revive the Turkish question, with a view to restore Christian governments over parts of Europe now under Ottoman rule.—N. Y. Herald.

**General News.**  
**BALTIMORE, June 10.**—The graves of the Confederate dead at London Park Cemetery were decorated this afternoon with appropriate ceremonies. General Bradley T. Johnson, of Richmond, delivered an address. A committee appointed by the Army and Navy of the Confederate States placed a handsome cross and bouquet, bearing the inscription "A tribute to the Union dead from Confederate soldiers," upon the cannon guarding the lot in which the Federal dead are interred.  
**LOUISVILLE, June 10.**—General Godfrey Weitzel to-day took charge of the Louisville and Portland canal, and the tolls, which heretofore have been fifty cents per ton. The steamer Charles Bodman, from Cincinnati

for New Orleans, was the first boat through under the new rate.  
**BOSTON, June 9.**—The Commonwealth of Massachusetts paid tribute to the memory of its late Senator to-day by commemorative services in Music Hall. The decorations of the hall were elaborate in design and finish, consisting of black cloth, with velvet and silver trimmings.  
The Executive and Legislative branches of the State left the Capitol shortly after 12 o'clock and marched to the hall in procession. The exercises commenced about 1 o'clock, and consisted of prayer, and selections by Misses Kellogg and Phillips and other artists, followed by an eulogy by George William Curtis.  
**WASHINGTON, D.C., June 12.**—The House this morning suspended the rules and incorporated, in sundry civil appropriation bill, an appropriation of \$2,100,000 to pay the Choctaw Indians, in accordance with the old treaty stipulations.  
**COLUMBUS, O., June 12.**—An evening special to the State Journal says: There has been no special excitement during the afternoon. Part of the negroes have been mining coal, and part are at work on earthworks. During the day about sixty negroes have deserted, but some have returned to camp very drunk. An order has been sent to Memphis for 100 negroes, and to Columbus for 100 more. Still others are expected to-morrow. The Lytle Guards and Sill Guards have been ordered off duty, but with instructions to be ready to come to Nelsonville if needed. A military company at Athens is to be increased to 100, and ordered to be ready to move on short notice.

IRELAND'S Amendment is worse than the Fifteenth Amendment.

THE Houston Telegraph is sound on the public school question, and on most other planks of the Republican platform.

THE majority of the Judiciary Committee of the House report in favor of the impeachment of Judge Durell, of the Federal Court of Louisiana, and the minority report against it.

HON. J. P. NEWCOMB, late Secretary of State, has not been in the least hurt by the efforts of a conspiracy of political enemies to effect his ruin, by implicating him with the stealing of their own hired tool, Green, in relation to the Lunatic Asylum. There is no doubt that Green was hired to swear against Mr. Newcomb, but he perjured himself, got scared, and ran away.

A GENTLEMAN writes us from Seaguin for further information in relation to Col. Pierce's telegram to the EXPRESS, and our comments thereon. We have, since then, fully stated our conviction that Col. Pierce will, if so advised by his counsel, push on to San Antonio without paying any attention to the Ireland Amendment; but if advised that he cannot do so, he will stop work at the San Marcos, and wait for the next session of the Legislature to give him relief; or, he will extend the road to New Braunfels. Our information is that in no case will he comply with the Ireland Amendment. This is his own declaration to Mr. Braden of this city.

LULING is the name of the new town near the San Marcos river to which the Galveston and San Antonio railroad is now being completed. We have an advertisement of the sale of lots there in this issue of the EXPRESS. The Guadalupe Times is informed that Mr. Luling, after whom the place is named, intends to start a steamship line between Galveston and European ports. This is good news to the whole country. We have one steamship line already, and should have more as the country develops. We shall never have our full share of immigration and trade from Europe direct until we have direct steamship lines. Mr. Luling is a New York capitalist, and, we have no doubt, can command sufficient capital for such an important enterprise. The line we now have runs between Galveston and Liverpool; we want one between Galveston and the German ports. We imagine from Luling's name, that his line will be the sort of one we want. As it will be in especial connection with the Galveston and San Antonio railroad, it will help to direct immigrants more particularly to Western Texas.

KANSAS CITY received the Galveston and Houston delegations in magnificent style, on the 17th, conveying them in thirteen carriages. On the route were visible many flags, bunting and streamers, with mottoes. The first was that of the *Journal of Commerce*: "Welcome, the Texas delegation;" second, "Welcome to Texas;" third, "All hail our new seaports, Galveston and Houston;" fourth, "Cheap freights rule the world; distance will tell;" fifth, "The Missouri Valley joins hands with the seaports of the Gulf—Galveston and Houston;" sixth, "The problem of cheap transportation is solved for the West;" seventh, "300 miles beats 1450."

Kansas City, beautifully built upon hills, is very prosperous. Its principal hotel, the Coates House, is said to be the finest West of the Mississippi. Its cattle yards and pork and beef packeries are immense. Its handsome iron railroad

bridge is the first ever erected over the Missouri river. Its waterworks reservoir can hold 16,000,000 gallons of water.

The delegation leave today, Saturday, for Denver; thence, probably, they will visit Omaha, and return home via St. Louis and Texarkana.

Some of the San Antonio business men and press representatives ought to have gone on this trip, just to have got waked up themselves, and then to have waked up our city and West Texas.

## The Spik-d "Cannon" in the House.

When Poland finished the roll-call commenced. The "yeas" rang out thick and fast. The "nays" straggled along thin and slowly. The bill was adopted by an avalanche majority, nearly three to one. It will have less opposition in the Senate. There is no Cannon there. Will be none in the House after this session. He came to test the willingness of Congress to allow an avowed polygamist a seat, and to fight the Poland bill. The bill has been sustained, though a flagrant violation of law. Cannon's presence, a greater violation, will not be endured. He understands the sentiment, and, if spared a formal ejection this session, will not return. He says the result of this bill will be to force another Mormon hegira. Why not give them a "reservation," make treaties with them, and issue them supplies of rifles, blankets, and guns? Mormons are as worthy of preservation as Indians, and the latter are rank polygamists.—*Gleaner in the Chicago Times.*

THE Dallas Herald, a Democratic paper, says that when Mr. Dorn entered upon the office he appointed Judge Randolph chief clerk, for which in our heart we rejoiced. But mark the sequel. After keeping him long enough to learn his own duties and train other new employees, Mr. Dorn discharged him to make room for his own son, a young man, inexperienced in that important position, and, outside of the town of Bonham, unknown to the people. He had already got another son an official position in the land office. We had heard that only Grant and other "radical" officials did such things.

GOV. COKE has issued a proclamation in relation to the mania for blood, murder, and lynch law now devastating the State, in which he makes the humiliating confession that his vaunted administration is powerless to protect the people of the State. He says: "The Executive of the State is not authorized or empowered by law to raise a special constabulary force for the suppression of those disorders and the arrest of offenders, but must rely upon the ordinary machinery of the law, which, it is believed, is adequate for the purpose if used with proper energy."

THE *Israelite* and the *Deborah*, two Hebrew journals, the first in English and the last in German, published at Cincinnati, and edited by Rev. Isaac M. Wise, are very able and interesting papers. Our Hebrew friends should patronize them liberally. Rabbi Wise is a liberal, enlightened, and able man, and an honor to the Synagogue.

GEN. FRANK BRITTON, late Adjutant General of Gov. Davis, gave us a call this morning. He and Gov. Davis are now engaged in the practice of the law at Austin. Gen. Britton has many friends wherever he is known, and we wish him and Gov. Davis the greatest success.

THE *Stock Journal* predicts a victory for Senator Ireland in the railroad contest between him and Col. Pierce. We predict the contrary, but we may be mistaken. The wish may be father to the thought, but we think not.

GEN. BRAXTON BRAGG, one of the great soldiers of the Confederate army, and under whom some of us served the last half of the war, is on a visit to Galveston.

## Telegraphic

J. P. Farmer, policeman, was shot through the window of the passenger depot at Bryan, and killed, on the night of the 16th.

A man named Braghy was shot in the head, not mortally, at Rockdale on the 16th.

The seven horse thieves of the Hardin gang were sent to De Witt county by rail and steamer to avoid rescue.

An accident on an excursion train of the Carolina Central railroad on the 17th killed three, and badly hurt many.

Splendid rains reported in all parts of Texas. Good crops and great rejoicing.

Conductor Phelps was killed by the cars near Jacksonville, Texas, on the 17th.

LISBON, June 17.—The steamer Africa has returned after successfully unburying her section of the Brazilian cable. The cable has been tested and found to work satisfactorily, and handed over to the Brazilian Cable Company. Unbroken telegraphic communication is thus established from England through Lisbon and Medina, to St. Vincent, Cape Verde Islands.

HAVANA, June 17.—The *Diario* says that four armed insurgents who belonged to the bands of Camaguan, have come into the Spanish lines at Terosa Jacara, and

surrendered themselves. They assert that the Marquis of Santa Lucia has been deposed from the Presidency of the Cuban Republic, and Maximo Gomez appointed his successor.

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Reynolds, Minister to Bolivia; Cadwallader, assistant Secretary of State; Henderoff, collector Pearl river; O'Connell, collector of Mobile; Pierce, Marshal of the Newbern district of Mississippi.

Sprague, from the Committee on Public Lands, reported without amendment, the bill extending the time for the completion of a railroad in the State of Louisiana, from the Texas State line to a point on the Mississippi river, opposite Vicksburg. It was placed on the calendar.

## Texas News.

The *Stock Journal* congratulates Atascosa county on its road contracts, and calls on Bexar county to help make good roads to this city.

A man named Wilson, who had stolen a horse in De Witt county, was arrested a few days since.

Mr. Bennett Musgrove, of Black Hill, six miles of Pleasanton, had three fine horses stolen a few nights since.

The citizens of Refugio county, since the murder of Mr. and Mrs. Swift, and other outrages, have organized and armed for protection of life and property, and call on the citizens of Nueces, San Patricio, Aransas, Live Oak, Bee, Goliad, Victoria, and Karnes counties for co-operation.

Dr. R. W. Lunday, an eminent physician and surgeon in Houston, died on the 16th instant after a long illness.

THE HABEAS CORPUS CASE of Huebner and Borman came up before Judge Noonan in the District Court this morning; the 20th. Huebner was the deputy sheriff who arrested Bliker about the 23rd of May at Leon Springs. Borman, with whom Bliker had been working, assisted him. Since they left with him, Bliker has not been seen or heard of at all. The prisoners were brought into court, the witnesses called, sworn, put under the rule, and sent out. Wm. Topperwein testified that at Leon Springs, about the 23rd of May, at 1 o'clock P. M., Huebner and Borman arrested Bliker, disarmed and tied him, took from him a carbine, a six-shooter, and a five-shooter, some clothing and money, and left, going toward San Antonio, they riding and he walking. Borman attempted to strike the prisoner with a pistol, but Huebner prevented. Defendants drank before they left, four glasses of beer and two toddies each. Never saw prisoner afterward.

Terry O'Neil testified that Huebner had told him he had turned Bliker loose—that he had got away.

Julius Opperman, or Hufferman, testified that he saw Defendants and prisoner at Braun's, about 5 o'clock P. M. They drank a bottle of beer, and gave prisoner beer. Borman left with the prisoner. Huebner remained a short time, then said he must go, as he could not trust Borman with the prisoner, alone. Never saw prisoner again.

Andreas Garza testified that he lives near Chabanos Water Hole. Two weeks ago, at the request of the Grand Jury, he examined the region, where he saw a large tree, with a limb pointing South, a path under it, the bark rubbed off the top and sides, and buzzard tracks and deposits, indicating that either a man or an animal had been hung, and the carcass eaten by the buzzards. Tree about a mile and a quarter West of Braun's. There was a cart track about fifty yards East of the tree. Chas. Smith was with him. Chas. Frost testified, corroborating Topperwein as to the circumstances of the arrest. Said Borman ran to the prisoner with his pistol cocked, but was restrained by Huebner. Borman claimed all the things taken from prisoner, and wished to strip the pantaloons off him, but Huebner prevented.

David Booker, colored, testified that he met Huebner about three weeks since, after the reported arrest of Bliker, about a mile this side of Chabanos Water Hole. Huebner asked if I had seen Bliker—said he was hunting him.

Shadrach Sykes, colored, testified that nearly a month since, on Sunday morning, at Huebner's house, Huebner gave him a coat. (A grey sack coat was produced in court.) This is the coat. I asked Huebner where he got it. He said it made no difference. I was told afterward I had better not wear that coat.

Mr. Ebers testified that Borman told him that Bliker had fallen down and broken his neck, and that the buzzards would find him.

Mr. Leal testified that Antonio Bermudez said he had seen the body of a man hanging on the road.

There was much other testimony, but we have given all of any importance up to the time of leaving court. The testimony was not near through at that time.

GENUINE India Pith Hat to be found at PANCOAST & SON, can be sold low.

EL PASO ONIONS AGAIN.—We have recently had something to say of the importance of cultivating the El Paso, or Mexican onion, and the profit that could be made out of it, especially after the railroad reaches here. Apropos to this we find the following in the Houston Telegraph:

Mr. Norworthy, the Buffalo Bayou farmer, purchased last fall a pound of El Paso onion seed in this city, and sowed an acre of ground with them. He has probably laid out fifty dollars in cultivating that acre and fertilizing it. As a result, he has harvested fifty barrels of onions, that he has sold at six dollars and a half per barrel. Samples of his onions exhibited yesterday were fifteen inches in circumference and weighed a pound and a half. Mr. Norworthy says he is unacquainted with the onion culture, and can greatly improve on this year's crop with the experience he has thus gained.

Mr. Norworthy can get full information as to the onion culture by writing to Mr. R. G. Andrew, Atascosa postoffice, Bexar county. He has both the seeds and the sets. He breaks the ground with the turn plow, subsoils with a bull-tongue, then beds with two and a half feet between the rows, plants the seed in September, and transplants as early in the spring as they are large enough to separate the sets. But the sets, or small onions especially, set out in September, will produce the largest sort of onions by the first or middle of the next June.

B. Penrose, Commissary of Subsistence, U. S. Army, May 18, 1874, to Captain Herman Schreiner, 2nd Cavalry, Depot Commissary of Subsistence.

The Board will also examine and report upon a quantity of subsistence stores reported unfit for issue.

A General Court Martial will convene at Fort Sill, I. T., on the 1st day of July, 1874, for the trial of First Lieutenant Charles E. Norstrom, 10th Cavalry.
