 place the Eight infantry.

**A Beautiful Investigation of the  
 Germ-Theory of Disease.**  
 The germ-theory of disease has  
 recently received a most interesting  
 and demonstrative contribution from  
 an eminent German scientist. The  
 communication of his experimental  
 investigations and the conclusion he  
 has reached are singularly and  
 strongly confirmed by Helmholtz,  
 on the Continent, and Tyndall, in Eng-  
 land. The researches which are so  
 decisive were made by Professor  
 Binz, of Bonn, with powerful micro-  
 scopic apparatus, and extend over  
 a period of several years.  
 Being a victim to a distressing  
 malady—hay fever, so prevalent in  
 May and June in this country—the  
 Bonn investigator suspected, from  
 the seasonal prevalence of the dis-  
 ease, that it was traceable to the  
 vegetable organisms. Having armed  
 himself with the powerful-immersion  
 lens of a Hartnack microscope,  
 he subjected the nasal secretions to  
 analysis. In examining the secre-  
 tions, he uniformly found organisms  
 wholly absent, except when suffer-  
 ing with the disease in the spring.  
 When laid on the warm stage of the  
 microscope these organic or parasit-  
 ical bodies were distinctly seen in  
 motion, vibrating backwards and  
 forwards in life, and, after several  
 days, had evidently increased in  
 size. They adhere tenaciously to

the lower cavities of the nose, and  
 can be discharged only by violent  
 sneezing. But the most beautiful  
 part of the research was in the dis-  
 covery of the remedy for their pre-  
 sence in the human system. On pre-  
 paring a neutral solution of sulphate  
 of quinine, free from adulteration by  
 cinchonia, and applying this to the  
 nostrils with a pipette or simple  
 nose douche, the desired effect was  
 immediately secured. The poison-  
 ous action of quinine on infusoria  
 was perfectly brought out, the  
 symptoms of irritation completely  
 disappeared and the lens revealed  
 the entire absence of animalcula in  
 the subsequent secretions. The re-  
 sults agree with those arrived at in  
 1870 by Dr. Frickhofer, of Schwal-  
 bach, and Prof. Bush of Bonn, both  
 of whom, with Helmholtz, the great  
 physiologist, have successfully ap-  
 plied quinine for the cure of this  
 parasitical malady.—N. Y. Herald.

MAJ. JOHN T. BRACKENRIDGE of San Antonio is proposed for Congress in this District by the Indiana Bulletin.

THE POPE says that propositions have been made from high-quarters for a reconciliation between the Italian government and the Holy See, but that he can yield nothing.

EMANCIPATION DAY was celebrated on the 19th in Galveston, Houston and other places, with great eclat. In Austin one gentleman asked another what the celebration meant. The reply was that it was "in honor of Coke's hundred days," in which time he promised to bring State obligations to par. The facetious gentleman was a Democrat.

DR. R. W. LUNDAY died in Houston on the morning of the 17th. He was one of the most eminent surgeons and physicians in the State, or in the South, and was finely endowed by nature, and highly accomplished by culture. During the war he was superintendent for a long time of the Texas Hospital in Richmond. Had he lived, he might, if he had striven for it, have reached almost any position of note in the line of his profession. But he fell in the prime of life.

It is a current Democratic joke in Austin that Gov. Coke kept silent for months while robbery, murder, and lynch law were rampant throughout the State; but as soon as his one-eyed, bobtail pony was stolen, he immediately issued his proclamation, declaring himself helpless, and urging all magistrates and peace officers to protect him and the rest of the unfortunate people.

ONE reason why Texas gets so small a share of the foreign immigration that reaches the American coast is, first, that our land owners are too meanly stingy to give them a fair showing, and second, that our State is full of sharpers who disgrace the name of Texian, and who cheat the new-comers outrageously whenever they get a chance. Such things, after all our boasting about "Texas hospitality," "open arms," and the like, look like huge lying. Then, Texas supports no government that punishes murder and lynch law. Tell the truth and shame the devil.

SCORE one for the Mercury. It is the Gazette's turn now. If the Gazette can string together a more stupid and barefaced pack of falsehoods, the unmitigated inventions of the editor, than the Mercury put forth yesterday, it shall have the prize of infamy. Unless it succeeds at once, the Mercury will be entitled to wear the brand as the most infamous slanderer in this or any other State. It is a thousand times too contemptible for even this notice.—Houston Telegraph.

### A Stranger's Opinion of our Mountain Region.

FREDERICKSBURG, Tex., June 18.  
Editor San Antonio Express:

DEAR SIR.—Instead of going direct to Austin as intended, we have taken the mountain route and intend to go as far as Mason County, where we shall probably arrive next week. If any part of Texas possess attractions, certainly this section contains more than any other we have seen. The atmosphere of this region is certainly as fine and as invigorating as any I ever felt; and after having been through Texas from the Red River to the Rio Grande, and through Mexico, California, Central America, the West

Indies, and the Canaries, on the coast of Morocco, and most of the States of this Union, I think I can say with truth I have not seen a more beautiful, romantic or delightful region of country. There is absolutely no sickness here, and the air at this time is cool and delightful, decidedly more so than it is at this season of the year in the northern States lying south of the Lakes.

### Sudden Death of Col. S. G. Newton.

Yesterday morning our whole city was shocked by the unexpected intelligence that Col. S. G. Newton had died suddenly the night before on his way home from Austin, when within about twenty miles of San Antonio. He had left home about a month since to attend the Supreme Court at Austin, and, including other business, to be gone about six weeks. The illness of his estimable lady, which at one time threatened her life, caused him to hasten his affairs in order to return home, and she was anxiously expecting him.

On Saturday morning last he took the stage at Austin for San Antonio apparently in perfect health. Passengers who were with him say that he was in fine spirits, and that he conversed during the day with great freedom and vivacity. In crossing the Guadalupe river, and after he walked up the steep ascent on the southern bank, he complained of pain in the region of the heart, and of difficulty of breathing. When the stage reached New Brannfels, he suffered so much that he determined to lie over for the Sunday's stage and requested one of the passengers to inform his wife that he would be at home on that day.

But, having consulted a physician while the passengers were eating supper, who assured him that he might venture to proceed, he again took the stage. But when they had proceeded about five or six miles this side of New Brannfels, he requested the driver to stop, declaring that he could go no farther. He asked some one to hand him his shawl, and, spreading it upon the ground, he laid down, saying that he was going to die, and asking the passengers to rub him. In from five to ten minutes he expired.

This terrible blow has fallen with indescribable horror upon his beloved and anxiously expectant wife and family, and has filled the community with grief and sorrow. The body was brought into the city yesterday afternoon.

Col. Newton was born in Missouri, lived afterwards in Arkansas, then removed to Eastern Texas, from whence he removed to San Antonio, where he has had his home for twenty-five years. Here he married, and here his large family of children were born. During the war he was the Lieutenant Colonel of Col. Lockett's Third Texas Infantry. He was a lawyer of high ability and stood in the front rank of his profession. He was highly esteemed by his fellow citizens generally, stood high as a public man, and was devotedly loved as a husband and father.

He was in the fifty-second year of his age. He was a large and powerful man physically, somewhat corpulent, weighing over two hundred pounds, and had the promise of a good old age. He was severely jolted by a railroad collision at Hempstead about three weeks since, but there seems to have been no connection between this and his last fatal illness.

### The Indiana Road.

The agent of the Morgan road is now visiting our city, and gives the assurance that Morgan will push his road directly to Austin without delay. The railroad has now reached Yorktown, and will shortly reach Gonzales, crossing the Colorado within 12 months. Morgan is a keen financier, and fully realizes that his business interests draw him to the capital of the State rather than to San Antonio, whose trade he is secure of at any rate.

The above we clip from the Austin Statesman of the 11th inst. A slight error in the above needs correction. The railroad has not reached Yorktown, but Cuero in the same county—De Witt. Cuero is about 20 miles northwest of Yorktown. There it has stood for some unexplained cause, and the prospect for a forward movement towards Gonzales is not yet apparent to "us folks," who reside in Indiana. Mr. Morgan may be a keen financier in some matters, but, in the opinion of many, he don't fully realize that his business interests are receiving a heavy drawback on this bay from the want of a more energetic construction of his road to Austin and San Antonio. There is bad management somewhere, as the merchants in this city can testify in the great falling off in their business, all of which affects the interests of Mr. Morgan—especially in the meagre freights arriving on his steamships, and the consequent falling off of railroad freights. The keen financial ability of Mr. Morgan we do not dispute; but we think he has lacked financial foresight in the present instance. A rapid construction of our railroad facilities would have added considerably to the interests of the Morgan road, as well as to the people of Western Texas. That this bay will be connected with Austin at some future time is beyond a doubt, but whether the credit will be due to Mr. Morgan, or not, is to be seen. We should like, however, for the agent in question, who has been visiting Austin, to give the people of this section some assurance that the road will be pushed on to Austin without delay. Then would many of our people and principal merchants give up their contemplated exodus to other points next fall if our railroad facilities are not extended farther westward by that time. Our merchants have so long been encouraged by promises from the owners of the road of its being carried forward to San Antonio and Austin without delay, that they have become incredulous, and will no longer believe what is said in relation to the matter—therefore, if nothing is done by fall to convince them by actual observation of these facts they will, of a necessity, to retain their old business, bid good bye to this bay and its prospects forever.—Indiana Bulletin.

**INDIAN NEWS.**

FORT DAVIS, TEX., June 13, 1874.

**Editors Express:**  
On Wednesday the 10th inst., a band of Indians attacked the ranch of Mr. Smith, living near the rancho of John Davis, sixty miles from here, on the road to Presidio del Norte. How many shots were fired, or whether Smith defended himself is not known, but he was killed; the rancho burned, and everything of a valuable nature destroyed. Mr. Davis hearing of the affair, despatched a messenger to this post for ammunition and assistance. At present writing nothing further is known of their movements, or their numbers. As soon as the facts were made known to the commanding officer, Lieutenants Tyler, Landon, and Merritt, with all the available cavalry, were started in pursuit, but there is not the slightest probability that they will come up with them.

The stage escort, who returned from Eagle Springs yesterday, reports having seen a party of Indians about eighteen in number, near Van Horn's Wells, forty miles or more from here on Thursday. This is in all probability the same party that killed Smith. It is believed that if troops were stationed at Presidio del Norte, their intercourse with the troops at Fort Davis would do much to stop the incursions of Indians in that now wholly unprotected region of country, besides giving needful protection to the U. S. Custom House and its officials at Del Norte. It is also believed that a company of infantry might well be spared from Fort Davis for this purpose. VERITAS.

**Texas News**

The Fredericksburg Sentinel says that a company have undertaken to bring out the water of San Saba for the irrigation of that beautiful valley; and their canal has already approached very near to Menardville. The successful completion of this good work will make Menard one of the most prosperous counties in Western Texas.

Mr. Lawless was shot and killed by a band of horse thieves a few days ago, a few miles from San Saba town.

DEWITT COUNTY is still over-run by desperadoes. So says the Cuero Star. The public meeting at Clinton on the 15th passed good resolutions, which may or may not be enforced.

EMANCIPATION DAY was celebrated on the 19th in Galveston, Houston and other places, with great eclat. In Austin one gentleman asked another what the celebration meant. The reply was that it was "in honor of Coke's hundred days," in which time he promised to bring State obligations to par. The facetious gentleman was a Democrat.

DR. R. W. LURDAY died in Houston on the morning of the 17th. He was one of the most eminent surgeons and physicians in the State, or in the South, and was finely endowed by nature, and highly accomplished by culture. During the war he was superintendent for a long time of the Texas Hospital in Richmond. Had he lived, he might, if he had striven for it, have reached almost any position of note in the line of his profession. But he fell in the prime of life.

It is a current Democratic joke in Austin that Gov. Coke kept silent for months while robbery, murder, and lynch law were rampant throughout the State; but as soon as his one-eyed, bobtail pony was stolen, he immediately issued his proclamation, declaring himself helpless, and urging all magistrates and peace officers to protect him and the rest of the unfortunate people.

ONE reason why Texas gets so small a share of the foreign immigration that reaches the American coast is, first, that our land owners are too meanly stingy to give them a fair showing, and second, that our State is full of sharpers who disgrace the name of Texian, and who cheat the new-comers outrageously whenever they get a chance. Such things, after all our boasting about "Texas hospitality," "open arms," and the like, look like huge lying. Then, Texas supports no government that punishes murder and lynch law. Tell the truth and shame the devil.

SCORE one for the *Mercury*. It is the *Oselle's* turn now. If the *Gazette* can string together a more stupid and barefaced pack of falsehoods, the unmitigated invention of the editor, than the *Mercury* put forth yesterday, it shall have the prize of infamy. Unless it succeeds at once, the *Mercury* will be entitled to wear the brand as the most infamous slanderer in this or any other State. ## A Stranger's Opinion of our Mountain Region.

FREDERICKSBURG, Tex., June 18.  
*Editor San Antonio Express:*

DEAR SIR.—Instead of going direct to Austin as intended, we have taken the mountain route and intend to go as far as Mason County, where we shall probably arrive next week. If any part of Texas possess attractions, certainly this section contains more than any other we have seen. The atmosphere of this region is certainly as fine and as invigorating as any I ever felt; and after having been through Texas from the Red River to the Rio Grande, and through Mexico, California, Central America, the West

Indies and the Canaries, on the coast of Morocco, and most of the States of this Union, I think I can say with truth I have not seen a more beautiful, romantic or delightful region of country. There is absolutely no sickness here, and the air at this time is cool and delightful, decidedly more so than it is at this season of the year in the northern States lying south of the Lakes.

I saw the beautiful farm of Dr. Kingsbury near Boerne, and was sorry I could not tarry in that charming vale for a few days, but our ambulance was hired for the trip and we had to pass on. Will write you again as opportunity permits.

## Sudden Death of Col. S. G. Newton.

Yesterday morning our whole city was shocked by the unexpected intelligence that Col. S. G. Newton had died suddenly the night before on his way home from Austin, when within about twenty miles of San Antonio. He had left home about a month since to attend the Supreme Court at Austin, and, including other business, to be gone about six weeks. The illness of his estimable lady, which at one time threatened her life, caused him to hasten his affairs in order to return home, and she was anxiously expecting him.

On Saturday morning last he took the stage at Austin for San Antonio apparently in perfect health. Passengers who were with him say that he was in fine spirits, and that he conversed during the day with great freedom and vivacity. In crossing the Guadalupe river, and after he walked up the steep ascent on the southern bank, he complained of pain in the region of the heart, and of difficulty of breathing. When the stage reached New Braunfels, he suffered so much that he determined to lie over for the Sunday's stage and requested one of the passengers to inform his wife that he would be at home on that day.

But, having consulted a physician while the passengers were eating supper, who assured him that he might venture to proceed, he again took the stage. But when they had proceeded about five or six miles this side of New Braunfels, he requested the driver to stop, declaring that he could go no farther. He asked some one to hand him his shawl, and, spreading it upon the ground, he laid down, saying that he was going to die, and asking the passengers to rub him. In from five to ten minutes he expired.

This terrible blow has fallen with indescribable horror upon his beloved and anxiously expectant wife and family, and has filled the community with grief and sorrow. The body was brought into the city yesterday afternoon.

Col. Newton was born in Missouri, lived afterwards in Arkansas, then removed to Eastern Texas, from whence he removed to San Antonio, where he has had his home for twenty-five years. Here he married, and here his large family of children were born. During the war he was the Lieutenant Colonel of Col. Luckett's Third Texas Infantry. He was a lawyer of high ability and stood in the front rank of his profession. He was highly esteemed by his fellow-citizens generally, stood high as a public man, and was devotedly loved as a husband and father.

He was in the fifty second year of his age. He was a large and powerful man physically, somewhat corpulent, weighing over two hundred pounds, and had the promise of a good old age. He was severely jolted by a railroad collision at Hempstead about three weeks since, but there seems to have been no connection between this and his last fatal illness.

## The Indianoia Road.

The agent of the Morgan road is now visiting our city, and gives the assurance that Morgan will push his road directly to Austin without delay. The railroad has now reached Yorktown, and will shortly reach Gonzales, crossing the Colorado within 12 months. Morgan is a keen financier, and fully realizes that his business interests draw him to the capital of the State rather than to San Antonio, whose trade he is secure of at any rate.

The above we clip from the *Austin Statesman* of the 11th inst. A slight error in the above needs correction. The railroad has not reached Yorktown, but Cuero in the same county—De Witt. Cuero is about 90 miles northwest of Yorktown.

There it has stood for some unexplained cause, and the prospect for a forward movement towards Gonzales is not yet apparent to "us folks," who reside in Indianola. Mr. Morgan may be a keen financier in some matters; but, in the opinion of many, he don't fully realize that his business interests are receiving a heavy drawback on this bay from the want of a more energetic construction of his road to Austin and San Antonio. There is bad management somewhere, as the merchants in this city can testify in the great falling off in their business, all of which affects the interests of Mr. Morgan—especially in the meagre freightage accruing on his steamships, and the consequent falling off of railroad freights. The keen financial ability of Mr. Morgan we do not dispute; but we think he has lacked financial foresight in the present instance. A rapid construction of our railroad facilities would have added considerably to the interests of the Morgan road, as well as to the people of Western Texas. That this bay will be connected with Austin at some future time is beyond a doubt, but whether the credit will be dug to Mr. Morgan, or not, is to be seen. We should like, however, for the agent in question, who has been visiting Austin, to give the people of this section some assurance that the road will be pushed on to Austin without delay. Then would many of our people and principal merchants give up their contemplated exodus to other points next fall if our railroad facilities are not extended further westward by that time. Our merchants have so long been encouraged by promises from the owners of the road of its being carried forward to San Antonio and Austin without delay, that they have become incredulous, and will no longer believe what is said in relation to the matter—therefore, if nothing is done by fall to convince them by actual observation of these facts they will, of a necessity, to retain their old business, bid good bye to this bay and its prospects forever.—*Indianola Bulletin*.

Nearly a hundred carriages, besides a large number on horseback and on foot, formed the procession that followed the hearse.

**INDIAN NEWS.**

FORT DAVIS, TEX., June 13, 1874.

**Editors Express:**  
On Wednesday the 10th inst., a band of Indians attacked the rancho of Mr. Smith, lying near the rancho of John Davis, sixty miles from here, on the road to Presidio del Norte. How many shots were fired, or whether Smith defended himself is not known, but he was killed, the rancho burned, and everything of a valuable nature destroyed. Mr. Davis hearing of the affair, despatched a messenger to this post for ammunition and assistance. At present writing nothing further is known of their movements, or their numbers. As soon as the facts were made known to the commanding officer, Lieutenants Tyler, Landon, and Merritt, with all the available cavalry, were started in pursuit, but there is not the slightest probability that they will come up with them.

The stage escort, who returned from Eagle Springs yesterday, reports having seen a party of Indians about eighteen in number, near Van Horn's Wells, forty miles or more from here on Thursday. This is in all probability the same party that killed Smith. It is believed that troops were stationed at Presidio del Norte, their intercourse with the troops at Fort Davis would do much to stop the incursions of Indians in that now wholly unprotected region of country, besides giving needful protection to the U. S. Custom House and its officials at Del Norte. It is also believed that a company of infantry might well be spared from Fort Davis for this purpose. VERITAS.

The Fredericksburg Sentinel says that a company have undertaken to bring out the water of San Saba for the irrigation of that beautiful valley; and their canal has already approached very near to Menardville. The successful completion of this good work will make Menard one of the most prosperous counties in Western Texas.

DEWITT COUNTY is still over-run by desperadoes. So says the Cuero Star. The public meeting at Clinton on the 15th passed good resolutions, which may or may not be enforced.
