SOME bad white man, who is nei-
 ther the friend of the nobler man or
 the Quaker policy, has reported that
 the Apache Chief Cochise died of
 that highly civilized malarial known
 as *mosaic fever*, and that his last at-
 tempts were wild and incoherent;
 but a letter from Indian Agent Saffold
 to the Commissioner of Indian
 Affairs, reporting the death of Co-
 chise, states that there was no dan-
 ger of trouble resulting therefrom.
 His last words to his people, as re-
 ported by Agent Saffold, were to
 come to the agencies, men, women
 and children, and forever live at
 peace with our people. Cochise
 thus went off to his happy hunting
 grounds in grace.

It is strange how accounts will
 vary in regard to the way in which
 people die. When the Mier prison-
 ers, Texas soldiers captured by the
 Mexicans more than thirty
 years ago, were decimated, one of
 them, Major Jas. D. Cooke, was re-
 ported to have told the survivors
 to write to his friends in Texas that
 he died decently. One of these sur-
 vivors visited the NEWS office on
 the occasion of the late meeting of
 Texas Veterans, and stated the man-
 ner of the Major's death to the
 writer as follows: He took up his pan-
 talons and gave them to a Coman-
 che, saying, "Down the Mexicans;
 they shan't have them. Tell the
 boys I died in grace."—*Galveston
 News.*

Telegraphic

St. Louis, July 4, 1874.

The great bridge is christened.
 The ablest scientific feat of the
 country received to day the admir-
 ing plaudits of half a million of
 people.

It has been the hottest day of the
 year, and a jam of sweltering huma-
 nity lined the streets from early
 morn till late at night. The pro-
 cession was fifteen miles long, and
 was just five hours passing a given
 point.

No accident of note occurred to
 mar the festivities, and the pro-
 gramme of the day was carried out
 in every particular.

Fully 100,000 strangers were in
 the city, including many distin-
 guished men.

General Grant did not arrive.
 The only incident which created
 unusual excitement was a false
 alarm of fire, which caused some of
 the engines, all of which were in
 line, to rush through the mass of peo-
 ple but without serious results.

The most imposing thing in the
 procession was a team of 56 horses,
 belonging to one lumber firm.

At night, the citizens and guests
 congregated on the levee, which
 had been cleaned and swept from
 one end to the other. Two hundred
 boats and numberless barges were
 all filled with people, and every
 available house adjoining the levee
 was crowded.

It is safe to say that at least 350,
 000 people witnessed the fire works,
 which were all successfully fired ac-
 cording to the programme. After
 this, Fourth, Fifth and a few other
 streets were brilliantly illuminated,
 and the most remarkable celebra-
 tion the West ever seen ended in a
 blaze of light.

CLEVELAND, July 3.—Two girls
 were burned to death by lighting a
 fire with gasoline oil.

PHILADELPHIA, July 3.—Henry
 Loth's sewing machine case man-
 factory was burned; loss \$60,000.

NEWCASTLE, DEL., July 3.—Dur-
 ing a heavy thunder storm last
 evening, an unknown vessel was
 struck by lightning below Wilming-
 ton Creek, and burnt to the water's
 edge. No particulars have been re-
 ceived about the fate of the crew or
 the name of the vessel.

WILMINGTON, DEL., July 3.—Dur-
 ing a severe thunder storm to-night,
 the cotton mills of Joseph Riddle,
 Son & Co., were struck and set on
 fire, but it was quickly suppressed.
 The storm was most severe.

At Newark many trees in the col-
 lege grounds were blown down.
 Three buildings were struck and se-
 veral unroofed. No one was hurt.

At Elkton a hotel was unroofed
 and considerable damage done.

NEW YORK, July 3.—Mayor Hav-
 meyer has reappointed the Police
 Commissioners Charlot and Gardiner,
 who had been convicted of mal-
 feasance.

GEN. SHERMAN has returned to Washington from his recent visit to St. Louis, where he has been making arrangements for the transfer of army headquarters. The removal will take place positively by the 1st of October.

MAYOR HURLEY told a correspondent of the Kansas City Times "that rates on corn from Kansas City to Galveston had been contracted at sixty dollars per car, and on ore from Denver to Galveston at sixteen dollars per car less than ever before known."

THE charges of Theodore Tilton against Henry Ward Beecher are too grave to be passed over in silence by the person against whom they are directed. Whether true or false, they give such a point and coherence to scandalous rumors which have been floating about for a year or two past, that the real weight must be promptly and satisfactorily ascertained.

THE action taken by the State Department in the "Virginia" matter has been in strict accordance with the agreement made last winter between Secretary Fish and Admiral Polo. Our government was to call the attention of the Spanish authorities to the matter of indemnity to families of those executed, and this has now been done, for the purpose of pushing the case to a settlement. If the two governments do not fully agree, the matter will be submitted to arbitration. There is nothing whatever of a sensational character in the situation, and in fact nothing outside of the regular order of business in settling the matter by diplomacy.

W. B. NEWTON of Gonzales is now running a line of hacks from Walder, on the Galveston and San Antonio Railroad, to Gonzales, connecting with the San Antonio stage line, making close connection with the trains and stages.

To comprehend the changes President Pierce is making in the transportation of freight, and to show how he is benefiting Galveston, we append a few statistics:

Heretofore the San Antonio business has been done by the way of Indiana, or by the way of Austin. Even now Mr. Pierce has shortened the route to San Antonio forty five miles, and has materially reduced the expense of both travel and transportation.

As soon as the cars get to Luling, a line of stages will connect with the cars, and the trip from Galveston and Houston to San Antonio will be made twenty-four hours shorter, and five dollars less than by the way of Austin.

FRANCE.—The seizure of a number of documents in the house of Paul de Cassagnac, editor of *Le Pays*, by the French government, is pretty good evidence that Marshal McMahon is determined to stand up for himself and his septennium, and to show as little favor to a proposed restoration of the Empire as he has shown to Count de Chambord's attempts to restore the monarchy. Paul, it must be remembered, is the great fighting-coke of

the Bonapartists, a first class bully, and not only a literary bully, as editor of a newspaper, but one who bullies people into duels with equal ferocity. He it was who recently proposed to fight with his eleven co-editors any twelve Republican members of the National Assembly, and let not a day pass without insulting Gambetta in the most offensive way in his paper by calling him a drunken sot, coward, &c. That McMahon should have ordered the house of the Bonapartist ruffian to be searched must have convinced the Imperialists that their hopes of assistance from the septennium were premature. It is quite likely that they may now conclude that their whole conduct has been premature, and that the bold game of bluff which they have tried to play upon the French people has come to naught. What Count de Chambord lost by not taking advantage of the proper moment and by his Bourbon laziness, the Imperialists seem likely to lose by precipitate action and injudicious fury. No doubt they thought that the game was in their hands; and the conduct of the Republican party has shown that they had reason to believe so.

If Marshal McMahon is as successful in breaking up this conspiracy of the imperialists as he has been in defeating de Chambord's projects, the Republican party will have more confidence in him, and would most probably make his septennium permanent by establishing him for seven years as President of the French Republic.

Telegraphic.

AUSTIN, July 4.—The Fourth of July is being very generally celebrated. The Travis Rifles, Fire Department, civic officers, etc., turned out to honor the Hibernian Benevolent Association Picnic, at Rosenfield & Goldsey's grounds. Mr. O'Neal, President of the Association, introduced Col. Robertson, who read the Declaration of Independence, and then delivered an appropriate address.

Lieutenant Governor Dick Hubbard followed in one of his characteristic speeches; it was one of his happiest efforts, and in the era of good feeling vein.

Galusha A. Grow followed, evidently in a prepared speech, abounding in florid imagery.

Judge Reagan was called for, and responded. Gen. Shelby and others also spoke.

After the presentation of the flag, the gift of N. B. Mitchell, Mr. O'Neal, the President, delivered an admirable address. Dancing and other amusements wound up the entertainments, which were continued until midnight.

The Germans celebrated the day at Pressler's Garden.

HOUSTON, July 4.—The Houston and Western Narrow Gauge Railroad Company, of which T. W. House has recently been elected president, and J. G. Tracy, secretary, appears to be again moving with the view of a resurrection of the enterprise.

It is understood that a party or parties from a distance have proffered to build the road, provided the city or its citizens shall subscribe \$75,000; of this amount over \$30,000 have been subscribed.

Some comment was excited this evening by the appearance here of a poster, signed by Abram Cross, of Galveston, denouncing Jas. H. Baker, of that city.

HEARNE, July 4.—The Central Railroad Company have nearly completed at this point the finest and most spacious round-house in the State. It is being constructed of brick and iron; it has 132 ft. front, 216 ft. rear, and is 70 ft deep, with stalls for 12 locomotives. Capt. M. G. Howe, chief engineer and designer, and J. C. Nichols, Esq., superintended the construction. A well 53 feet in depth has been sunk, and will supply an abundance of water.

General News.

THE COMET.—Coggia's comet is now visible to the naked eye, though few would observe it without knowing that it had appeared. Those having little knowledge of astronomy may find it about nine or ten o'clock at night, by drawing an imaginary line from the two stars forming the outer edge of the Little Dipper and continuing in a straight line half way down toward the horizon; but, in a clear evening, by looking to the northwest, below the North star, almost any one will find it.—Galveston News.

A night school has been established in the city jail of Vera Cruz.

The gale of last week resulted in the loss of 32 lives along the eastern coast of New Brunswick, 19 being fishermen. Four barks and nine schooners were stranded, and about 30 fishing boats wrecked.

NEW YORK, July 2.—The Church of England Synod, and two Presbyterian Synods, are meeting here. The question under discussion is on the Episcopal Church unions with each other, and with the Canadian Presbyterian Church.

YANKTON, DAKOTA, July 2.—Winter-

mute, who killed Gen. McCook, has been sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary.

PHILADELPHIA, July 2.—Morton Michael, of the *North America*, sails for Europe. A large number of prominent persons are accompanying him down the river.

FONDA, N. Y., July 2.—Lightning killed one and badly hurt two persons near here to-day.

MADRID, July 2.—The Republicans are fortifying the line of defense against the Carlists that was planned by the late Marshal Concha.

Several accounts represent that the Carlists at Maro were on the point of retreating, when Gen. Concha was killed.

OF THE
UNITED STATES,
PASSED AT THE
FIRST SESSION OF THE FOR-
TY-THIRD CONGRESS.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 33.]
AN ACT making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending June thirtieth eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and for other purposes.

(Continued.)
MARINE CORPS.
For pay of officers of the Marine Corps, and for pay of non-commissioned officers, musicians, and others of the corps, one hundred and nineteen thousand seven hundred and sixty dollars: Provided, That the office of commandant of the Marine Corps having the rank of a brigadier-general of the Army shall continue until a vacancy shall occur in the same, and no longer, and when such vacancy shall occur in said office, immediately thereafter all laws and parts of laws creating said office shall become inoperative, and shall expire of their own force, from thenceforth to be void: And provided further, That thereafter the commandant of the Marine Corps shall have the rank and pay of a colonel, and shall be appointed by selection by the President from the officers of said corps.

For the civil force of the Marine Corps, ten thousand dollars.
For pay of fifteen hundred privates, and non-commissioned officers and musicians, one hundred thousand dollars.

For provisions, one hundred thousand dollars.
For clothing, one hundred thousand dollars.

For fuel, thirty thousand, eight hundred and fifty-six dollars.
For military stores, namely: For pay of mechanics, repair of arms, purchase of accoutrements, ordnance stores, flags, drums, files, and other instruments, nine thousand dollars.

For transportation of troops, five thousand dollars.
For transportation of officers traveling without troops, one thousand dollars.

For repairs of barracks, and rent of officers where there are no public buildings, six thousand dollars.
For wages for horses belonging to field and staff officers, three thousand dollars.

For hire of quarters for officers, where there are no public quarters, ten thousand dollars.
For contingencies, namely: Freight, ferris, ferries, tolls, cartage, wharfage, purchase and repair of boats, labor, burial of deceased marines, stationery, telegraphing, apprehension of deserters, candles, gas, repairs of gas and water fixtures; water-rent; barrack furniture; furniture for officers' quarters; fuel, sacks, wrapping-paper, oilcloth, crash, rope, twine, spades, shovels, axes, picks, carpenter's tools; repairs to fire-arms; purchase and repair of engine hoist; purchase of lumber for benches, mess-tables, bunks; repairs to public carriages; purchase and repair of harness; purchase and repair of hand carts and wheel-barrows, scavenging; purchase and repair of galleys, cooking-stoves, ranges, stoves, where there are no grades; gravel for parade grounds; repair of pumps; brushes; brooms; buckets; paving; and for other purposes, fifteen thousand dollars.

For Fort Monroe, Hampton Roads, Virginia, thirty thousand dollars.
For Fort Moultrie, Charleston Harbor, South Carolina, twenty thousand dollars.
