A ROYAL SPENDTHRIFT.
THE PRINCE OF WALES' DEBTS.—The British Nation Likely to Be Saddled with Them.
 [Correspondence of the New York Tribune.]
 LONDON; July 25.—A report has already gained currency that the long-expected crisis has occurred in the financial affairs of the Prince of Wales, and that the ministry have made up their minds to propose to the House of Commons next session to pay his debts. The sum named is £640,000 sterling, nearly three millions and a half of our own money and four times the sum voted in 1787 to appease the creditors for that pattern of royalty who afterward became George IV. They might possibly hurry it through the House as they have just done the grant of £15,000 a year to Prince Leopold, without notice. But if they give the country six months to talk about it, they are certain to be met with a strong opposition. Now there are certain to be two powerful and contradictory sentiments about it, one that the honor of the nation is concerned in providing for the debts of its future king; the other that these debts are of a character which ought to be paid out of the accumulated fortune of the Queen. The latter view rests on the well known fact that the Queen has been receiving ever since the death of Prince Albert the value of the income calculated at her accession to support the expenses of the court in its usual degree of splendor; that her majesty has, however, lived during this period for the most part in retirement, and that the cost of drawingrooms, levees, and other royal pageanties has, in fact, fallen upon the Prince and Princess of Wales, whose income has been unequal to such a burden. The existing debts, or a considerable part of them, have, according to this theory, been incurred in the discharge of these duties; hence it is urged that the Queen, who has had and kept the money given her by the state for such purposes, ought to pay them.
 The vote for Prince Leopold passed without a division, but not without a protest. Mr. Disraeli proposed it in his most stilted manner. Mr. Gladstone seconded it in his most solemn manner, and neither of them used any words less than five syllables long in doing it, which was to insure everybody's understanding it thoroughly. To do both of them justice, I do not believe the business of asking the House to give more money to the princes of the royal family is a thing they heartily like. People with fewer reasons for swimming with the stream have been heard to remark that if they enjoyed a private fortune of two or three millions sterling, they would not send begging letters to Parliament in behalf of their boys and girls. Two or three millions are much less than the Queen is supposed by many persons to possess. Prince Leopold is, by common consent, a cultivated and agreeable young man, of delicate constitution, who likes books and pictures.
 Prince Leopold is the eighth child of the Queen, to whom Parliament has granted an income for life. The Prince of Wales has £40,000 a year, plus the revenues of the Duchy of Cornwall, which amount to over £100,000 per annum. The Duke of Edinburgh had £15,000 yearly granted him on reaching his majority, which was made up last year to £25,000, on his marriage with the Grand Duchess Marie of Russia. Prince Arthur, now Duke of Connaught, has £15,000 a year. The Princess Victoria was granted an annuity of £8,000 a year on her marriage with the Crown Prince of Prussia, plus a dower of £40,000 cash down. The Princess Alice, the Princess Helena, and the Princess Louise, had each a grant of £6000 a year, and dowers of £30,000 on their marriages. There remains the Princess Beatrice, now seventeen and unmarried, the expense of whose support is borne by the mother. Taking no account of the Cornwall revenues, but including only the sums actually disbursed yearly to the Queen's children out of the public treasury, the total is £121,000, which is the interest on £3,630,000. The dowries the girls have had amount in all to £130,000, which is a mere trifle to add to such a total. The Queen has £360,000—or it may be only £340,000—a year, or the interest on over £10,000,000. The calculation includes nothing but specific grants of money, nor

does it even include all grants to all members of the royal family. It might not be easy to compute all the amounts received by them from other sources, such as, for instance, the salaries drawn by the princes in their military and naval capacities, where their rank is honorary and their services are nominal. The Prince of Wales has five children living, and they, too, must, on the present system, be provided for by the public on their coming of age or marrying.

The *Stock Journal* is informed that the only Democratic candidate for Congress in this District praised by the *Express* is Gen. Baylor. Is it satisfied now?

THE tobacco-crop in Kentucky is an unparalleled failure.

MR. JACOB SCHMIDT, an old and respected citizen of New Braunfels, is dead.

Ten persons, recently convicted at St. Petersburg of revolutionary propagandism, were from twenty to twenty-six years of age, and included two married ladies in affluent circumstances. Eighteen months ago the overseer of some tin-works formed the acquaintance of some young men of higher social standing, and discussed the economy question with them. Some peasants afterwards attended meetings, and having agreed that all property ought to be held in common, they built a house in a remote quarter outside the city, set up a secret press and distributed pamphlets advocating the new creed. In these meetings they carried out the fusion of classes, the workman and peasant sitting beside the gentleman. Six members have been condemned from three to ten years' hard labor, while the other four, including the ladies, will undergo imprisonment varying from three days to two years.

THE *Stock Journal* at Pleasanton is stirring up the "Old Scratch" among the Democracy. It goes for our old friend, Gen. J. E. Baylor, for Congress, and pitches into Maj. Brackenridge and "the San Antonio ring" with a vim most refreshing and delightful. The *Herald* of this city undertook, a short time since, to rub down Col. Logan, of the *Stock Journal*, but it rubbed the hair the wrong way, and now it will have to stand up to a regular bear-hug, rough and tumble fight. The philosophy of all this is, the Democracy are split into three factions—for Stockdale, Brackenridge and Baylor, and they will have two, if not three candidates in the field for Congress. The Republicans will then elect their candidate easily. They will support no Coke idorser, nor will they support a Democrat at all unless he be a moderate, national man, devoted to the interests of the frontier and of Western Texas. They will not support Stockdale or Ireland under any circumstances.

THE efforts made in Northern and Eastern Texas, by rivals for the trade now going to Houston and Galveston, to spread a report of yellow fever in those cities, is villainous and infamous to the lowest degree. A man who would do such a thing would throw a railroad trap from the track, and kill scores of women and children, to revenge himself on one man.

THE Republicans of the Sixth Congressional District should keep it in mind that the Congressional Convention is to meet in this city on the 9th of September next. Every county ought to be represented, and it is time they were holding their conventions and electing their delegates. The Bexar county convention is to meet Sept. 5th. The District Convention will be an important one.

THE CONGRESSIONAL-NOMINATION engages the attention of the Corpus Christi *Valley* in its last issue. It is glad to see that the Democracy "recommend the selection of a fair, honest man, and one who admits that the war is closed." It thinks that all the candidates in the Sixth District fill this bill except John Ireland. It says:

If they take Ireland, they may be greatly mistaken. It would at any rate be a public calamity to have him chosen. If we were a party partizan, we should hope he would be the leader, for a more united and stronger opposition could be made to him than to any other man. But we agree with the Democrats in this that it is best to have a good man as a possible Congressman.

The *Valley* is a Republican paper, and we quote the following from it in order to show that if the people of Western Texas are not hereafter united in the promotion of their great interests before the United States Congress, it is not the fault of the Republicans. It says:

The Goliad Convention has the opportunity to present a man who will not be vigorously opposed, judging from the givings out of the *Express* and *Ranchero*, the par excellence Republican papers of the District, as they think. It has the power to put forward a man who will receive the most united and determined opposition of all except Bourbon Democrats. This election need not be a violent party one. Whosoever makes it so will have the blame, and must abide the results. We should be glad if there could be a union nomination. Perhaps that is too much to expect at present.

THE Galveston *Civilian*, though opposing the *News*, protests in the name of decent journalism against the mendacious and indecent assaults of the Coke press. The truth is, the *News*, like Beecher, has been so timid and non-aggressive that it has given its enemies all the advantage. It gently dissents from the course of the Coke administration, and, when assailed by the interested parasites of Cokery, it protestingly defends itself. It gets all the odium and abuse with which the Coke organs think it necessary to crush out independent opinion, without inspiring the respect of fear, which it is abundantly able to command. Had it the courage to call things by their right names, and make open war upon the wrongs of the administration, the administration itself would soon become more decent, the State would thus be benefited, the Coke journals would abate their insolent and disgusting braggadocio, and the *News*, being equal to this crisis in its history, and fulfilling the mission assigned it, would become a power in the land. As it is, the *News* sadly needs a brave and slashing political writer. A cavalry charge, with lance, claymore and pistol, would benefit it much more now than solid squares of infantry to guard against cavalry.

DEMOCRATIC REPUDIATION OF COKE.

The St. Louis *Republican* on Texas Lawlessness—It compares the Administrations of Coke and Davis—It prefers Davis to Coke—It deprecates the Results of Democratic Rule in Texas.

The St. Louis *Republican* is a Democratic paper. We print below its picture of the lawlessness and crime which have overrun the State since "Cokery" came into power. The comparison it makes between the administrations of Davis and Coke are peculiarly suggestive, and its preference for the former must be

extremely mortifying to Coke and his satellites. What a fearful impression must Coke's misrule have made abroad when Democratic papers of other States openly prefer the much abused "Radical" rule of Governor Davis to it! The *Republican* says:

When Davis was Governor and Texas was under a Radical administration, a State police force was employed to suppress lawless combinations. This system of State espionage was doubtless open to objection on the ground of being opposed to the genius of Democratic institutions. But experience has shown that it was better for Texas than is the militia system under Gov. Coke's administration. Desperate diseases require energetic treatment. The society of that State seems to suffer from the most malignant disorder. Disregard of law in isolated cases, might occur without great danger to the welfare of the whole. But Texas is not afflicted alone with that sort of lawlessness. On the contrary, whole counties are under the absolute control of organized bands of desperate men, who set the laws of the State at defiance and levy contributions from the people at will. In Wise and De Witt counties especially have the people been made to suffer not only the disgrace of the presence in their midst of armed bands of outlaws, but in person and purse at the behests of cut-throats. Some months ago, under an act of the Legislature, the Governor authorized the organization of a battalion of militia rangers to operate against the banditti of the border counties. But intelligence from the companies of rangers is not favorable, and it is manifest that militia organizations are not just the agencies to employ against such combinations. The hopes of the people for relief from this source are not likely to be realized. Advances from De Witt county, received as late as the 10th inst., convey intelligence of an attack on Capt. McNally's company of State troops by the Sutton band of law-breakers. One ranger was shot in the shoulder, and another was missing. It appears that the band numbers about fifty men, that they are well armed, and otherwise provided with outfit for campaigning. What is more, they have possession of Clinton, the chief town in the county, and seem resolved to hold it against the forces sent against them.

In Wise county the condition of affairs is no better. In Bell and Comanche counties the Hardin band still divide authority with those appointed to administer the laws, and altogether the State seems far from being tranquil under the Democratic administration of Gov. Coke. The course pursued by Davis in the suppression of lawlessness might have been arbitrary, undemocratic, and scenting of despotism, but, nevertheless, it proved very effective in practice, and gave peace and security in counties where there is now no peace or protection. Perhaps it would be unjust to impute the present state of disorder in that State to an inefficient administration. It may be that Gov. Coke does all that can be done under the existing laws, but the system introduced since the overthrow of the Radical government of the State seems strangely defective, and not at all adapted to meet the requirements of the case. In the matter of maintaining order the last administration succeeded better than the present. This proposition we presume to be incontrovertible.

If the government and law-abiding people of Texas desire to inspire in the minds of strangers and people abroad generally a confidence in their ability and disposition to suppress disorders and afford security and protection to the industrious and peaceable settlers who may go to that State, they must show a more energetic pursuit of the outlaw bands, and a better administration of the laws. Mobs are not likely to permanently effect reforms. The mobocrats are themselves law-breakers, and one party of law-breaking men proceeding against other lawless bands is not a very good way to reassure those who have been accustomed to see crime punished in strict accordance with law after a fair trial and conviction of the criminal.

INDIAN MATTERS.

Stock Operations of the Lo Family in Texas.

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 14.—The Attorney General has received a communication from Governor Coke, of Texas, in answer to one addressed to him, touching his order to Capt. Benavides, commanding a company of minute men, requiring him when in close pursuit of Indian marauders or cattle thieves, to recover property taken by them from citizens of Texas, to cross the Rio Grande, if necessary, into Mexico. The Governor represents that constant depredations are made by Indians from Mexico on the people of Texas; that many persons are murdered by them, and great quantities of property are stolen and carried away; that the forts of the United States stationed along the frontier are totally inadequate to protect the people, and that it is absolutely necessary for their own preservation that they should protect them. The communication gives full details of the condition of affairs on the Rio Grande.

Welder, very promptly decided his motion out of order, whereupon Judge Upson's resolution of invitation was unanimously adopted. Gov. Stockdale is therefore invited to address the Democracy of Bexar, but Maj. B. is not to waste his sweetness on the desert air. His pent up wrath is to demolish Dawes and Butler, "et id omne genus."

LAW
OF THE
UNITED STATES,
PASSED AT THE
FIRST SESSION OF THE FOR-
TY-THIRD CONGRESS.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 63.]
AN ACT to fix the time for the election of Representatives in the Forty-fourth Congress from the State of Mississippi.

(Continued.)
SEC. 6. That it shall be the duty of the First Comptroller of the Treasury and the Second Comptroller of the Treasury of the United States, who are hereby constituted a board of audit, to examine and audit for settlement all the unfunded or floating debt of the District of Columbia and of the board of public works, hereinafter specified, namely: first, the debt evidenced by sewer certificates; secondly, the debt purporting to be evidenced and ascertained by certificates of the auditor of the board of public works; thirdly, the debt evidenced by the certificates of the auditor and the comptroller of the District of Columbia; fourthly, claims existing or hereafter created for which no evidence of indebtedness has been issued, arising out of contracts, written or oral, made by the board of public works; fifthly, claims for which no evidence of indebtedness has been issued, arising out of contracts, written or oral, made by or in behalf of the District of Columbia;

Sixthly, all claims for private property taken by the board of public works from the avenues, streets, and alleys of the cities of Washington and Georgetown; and, seventhly, all unadjusted claims for damages that may have been presented to the board of public works, pursuant to an act of the legislative assembly of the District of Columbia, entitled "An act providing for the payment of damages sustained by reason of public improvements or repairs," approved June twentieth eighteen hundred and seventy-two, which last-named claims shall severally be examined and audited without regard to any examination heretofore made; and shall make a detailed and tabular statement of all claims presented, the persons or corporations owing the same, and the amount found to be due on account of each; together with a tabular statement of the funded debt of the District of Columbia and of the cities of Washington and Georgetown of every kind and character whatsoever, giving the date of issue, time of maturity, and the rate of interest. And it shall further be the duty of said board to ascertain the amount of sewer tax or assessment paid by any persons, or corporation, under the act of the legislative assembly of said District, entitled "An act creating drainage and sewerage sections in the cities of Washington and Georgetown, in the District of Columbia, and providing for the payment of the construction of sewers and drains therein by assessments, and issuing certificates therefor," approved the twenty-sixth day of June, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, and to prepare a tabular statement thereof. Said board of audit shall also issue to each claimant a certificate, signed by each of said board and countersigned by the comptroller of said District, stating the amount found to be due to each and on what account; and a register thereof shall be kept by said board, to be transmitted to Congress, and also by the comptroller of said District; and said board of audit shall also ascertain and report to Congress, at the next session thereof, the amount equitably chargeable to the street-railroad companies on account of paving along and within the tracks of said companies, pursuant to the charters of said companies or the acts of Congress relating thereto, together with their reasons therefor. It shall further be the duty of said board of audit to examine into and audit all of the accounts of the auditor and of the treasurer of the board of public works, and of the auditor, the treasurer, the collector, and the comptroller of the District of Columbia, from the date of the organization of said board and of the present government of said District; and for the purpose hereinbefore specified shall have the power to subpoena witnesses, administer oaths, and examine witnesses under oath, and shall have full access to all of the records, books, papers, and vouchers of every kind whatsoever of the board of public works of the District of Columbia; and to the end that said books and accounts may be thoroughly examined, and the indebtedness of said District, and of the board of public works, and of the state of the books and accounts of each of the officers aforesaid, may be accurately ascertained, shall employ one or more skillful and impartial accountants non-resident of the District of Columbia, and such other assistants as they may deem necessary, to make examination of said books, vouchers, and papers, and discharge their other duties under this act, and shall procure inspection of such books and papers as may be necessary; and they are hereby authorized to allow for the services of such accountants or accountants and assistants such sums as they may deem proper which shall be paid by the Board of Commissioners out of the revenues of said District.

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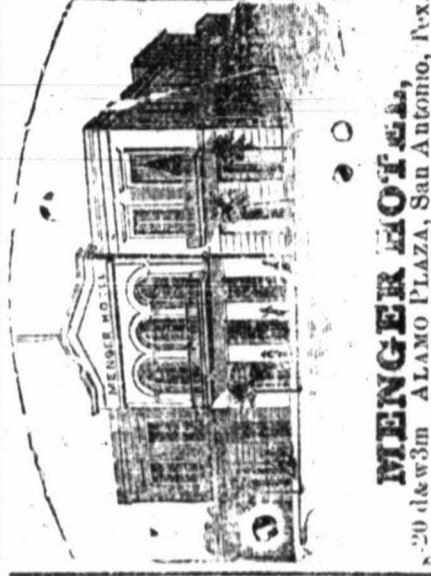
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
