**An Unparalleled Rain-Storm.**  
**MORE THAN TWENTY-FOUR HOURS'**  
**RAINFALL.**

For several days previous to the heavy  
 rain storm just past, the heavens had  
 presented a cloudy appearance indicating  
 rain, which all were anxious to see. Apparently  
 to gratify these desires of all hearts, the  
 welcome moisture began to descend on  
 Saturday morning, a light fall of rain  
 continuing till night—by bed time  
 increasing to a heavy rain fall, accompanied  
 with a very strong North wind. The wind  
 and rain continued to increase until 3  
 o'clock on Sunday morning, when it  
 became a fearful rainstorm. After  
 raging half hour or so, during which  
 we greatly feared the roof of our house  
 would be carried away, it ceased somewhat,  
 but the rain continued to descend till  
 11 A. M. when appearances of a break  
 up were perceptible, but not a complete  
 cessation of either the wind or rain.  
 We should remark here, however, that  
 about 7 in the morning the wind changed  
 from North to South-East, from the reason  
 we suppose that the supply of North wind  
 had been exhausted—had blown

itself away. From about half past 11  
 A. M. to 3 P. M., there was a clearing  
 off, and all appearances indicated that  
 the rain was over. Never was there a  
 greater mistake. A few minutes after 3  
 the rain began gently to come down,  
 in a short time becoming a general  
 heavy rain, which continued till 5 o'clock,  
 when it ceased till 7. Hard showers  
 now began to fall, would suddenly  
 cease, then suddenly resume, continuing  
 thus until midnight.—*Stock Journal.*

**FOR CONGRESS,**  
Sixth Congressional District,  
**Jeremiah Galvan,**  
FROM CAMERON COUNTY.

**Legislators to be Elected.**

In addition to the elections for Congress, to be held on the third day of November, the following officers are also to be elected, under the proclamation of the Governor:

In the counties composing the Third Senatorial District, to-wit—Cherokee, Houston, Trinity and Angelina: Two Representatives to the Fourteenth Legislature of Texas, to fill the places of J. T. Smith, deceased, and Frank Rainey, resigned.

In the counties composing the Twenty-second Senatorial District, to-wit, Grayson, Cook, Montague, Clay, Wichita, Wilbarger, Hardeman, Archer, Baylor and Knox—One Senator to the Fourteenth Legislature of Texas, in the place of W. H. Trolinger, resigned.

In the counties composing the Thirteenth Senatorial District, to-wit: Austin, Fort Bend and Wharton. One Representative to the Fourteenth Legislature of Texas in the place of J. N. Baughman, whose seat was, by the House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature, declared vacant.

AUSTIN, September 5, 1874.

The four principal lumber dealers of Austin met together this morning, and discussed the action of the Central Railway Company, regarding the lumber trade. They exhibited bills from the Texas Lumber Manufacturing Company, of Houston, which charge them from \$14 to \$16 per 1000 feet; also, bills from the Central Railway, which, in each instance, has been \$50 per carload of \$5000 feet. They also claim that it costs them \$1 per 1000 to unload the lumber from the cars and place it in their yards, making a cost of \$25 per 1000 feet. They also claim that one-fourth of each car load is graded here as second-class, for which they can only get an average of \$3.25 per 1000 feet, at \$50 for first class. They state, in addition, that the railway urged that they should secure large supplies during the summer, which they did, in many instances paying a heavy rate of interest for the money necessary to pay for lumber and freights. Only a few days since Mr. Sam. Allen, President of the Texas Lumber Manufacturing Company, insisted upon the Austin merchants reducing their selling price to \$25. This they declined to do. Again yesterday he wrote Messrs. Loomis: "The railroad company is going to put lumber in your city, and sell at \$25 per thousand. They say they will get it from Hearne, if our company will not let them have it. They will give us no reduction of tariff on less than 150 cars. You can tell other dealers about this, as it is true and no gammon."

These dealers assert that this will necessitate a great loss to them, if not a failure. They have been informed that the lumber company are leagued with the railroad company, and that the road will make a rebate of three dollars per thousand to their agent, which is to be his profit. They do not believe that Mr. W. R. Baker, or the Superintendent, can be cognizant of these proceedings, or they would interfere. They desire the railroad company to attend to its legitimate business, and not attempt to control or monopolize local commercial pursuits, particularly after the merchants have invested so largely at their suggestion, thereby giving employment to their cars during the dull season. They fear there is a bug under a chip, which, when raised, will profit some favored individual, and ask Mr. Baker, or the Superintendent, to investigate and do them justice.

Some curiosity was caused on the boulevards by the appearance of a woman attired in a singular costume—viz, large Zouave trousers, closed by gaiters, small gray paletots, trimmed with black and tall felt hats, who were stopping at the Grand Hotel. On enquiry they were found to be Miss Walker, an American medical practitioner, and two of her pupils. The lady is about fifty years of age and the apostle of the emancipation of woman in the United States, and belongs to the sect of the Bloomerists.

She is said to be on her way to Turkey, where she has accepted the post of private physician to the Sultans seraglio.—*Galignani.*

## The Republican Convention.

THURSDAY MORNING.

The Convention, pursuant to adjournment, was called to order at 10 o'clock by the temporary chairman, Mr. Carson.

The minutes of the previous day were read by the Secretary, Mr. Goodrich, and approved.

The Committee on Credentials reported the following list of delegates and proxies. The basis of representation adopted was one vote for each fifty Republican votes cast at the last gubernatorial election:

NUCES—8 votes; Nelson Plato, H. Taylor, delegates, J. L. Haynes, proxy. ARANSAS—1 vote; Judge Upton, delegate, C. Carson, proxy.

ZAPATA—3 votes; J. H. Farrell. CAMERON—12 votes; R. B. Kingsbury, Nat. Mitchell, E. H. Goodrich, Ransom Fey, J. W. Bradford, F. Cortez, C. Carson.

BEXAR—37 votes; G. W. Brackenridge, Thos. Anderson, F. Galan, H. McCormack, D. Bell, James Callaghan, A. Dittmar, L. Huth, A. Siemering, R. Booker, S. W. McAllister, Dr. Herff, Jas. Westmoreland, Jacob Goll, Fritz Rummel, J. H. Biggar, J. W. Mozer, Sol. Brassfield, Wm. Reed, H. C. Smith, Wm. Junius, J. N. Fisk, W. H. Houston, J. M. Chavez, A. M. Locke, M. Michel, F. Guilbeau, A. Krakauer, W. W. Gamble, C. O. Gillespie, J. F. Minter, Austin Thornton, P. Scheiner, M. Slocum, J. H. Kampmann, P. Ujazy.

The Committee on Permanent Organization reported as follows: Col. C. O. Gillespie, President, C. Runge and N. Mitchell, Vice-Presidents, H. McCormack and A. Dittmar, Secretaries; H. C. Smith, Serg't at Arms, and recommended the adoption of the majority rule in the decision of all questions before the Convention.

The report was unanimously adopted.

Col. Gillespie, on taking the chair said: "Gentlemen of the Convention, I return you my thanks for the honor you have conferred on me. While I propose to make no regular address, I feel it due to yourselves, your constituents and the situation to say a few words. Owing to various causes, among others mal-administration, division and selfishness in our own ranks, the Republican party has been ingloriously defeated, so that at last the tide of Democratic fraud and oppression has reached a barrier on which will be found inscribed the fiat of the long suffering people of Western Texas 'here shall your proud waves be stayed.' Amid the general gloom there is a gleam of light in this Western region. 'Our people understanding well their own interests, the needs of their ranches and of their frontier, raise now the banner of reform. The West has been shamefully neglected by the rest of the State. For twenty years I have lived in and worked for Texas as a whole, but my residence in this section has shown me cause to sympathize with the feeling entertained by many Democrats and Republicans that a division of the State has nearly become a necessity. I believe the people of Western Texas honor and love the Texas name, for whose prestige they have done so much, as truly as any people in the broad domain of the State. Yet they have no railroad, no share in the subsidies freely given to every other part of the State, and to-day our only hope of railroad assistance is endangered by a monopoly whose power is greater than most can understand who are not familiar with railroad management. Mr. Morgan and Gov. Coke have joined hands to crush the International Railroad Company on the fortunes of which the fate of the Pierce road depends. Gov. Coke's pretext for his hostility is that the International opposed the credit of the State. Why, the facts of the case alone destroyed the credit of the State. On the merits of the question, Gov. Coke could not sell a single bond to any disinterested American or European capitalist, and he has not sold one. His only sale has been made to Mr. Morgan, who sends his lieutenant to you for election, and Mr. Morgan is a man who never spends a dollar unless he sees two in return.

The nomination you make to-day will be Republican, but not partisan. We seek the interests of our District and intend that a man shall be named who will see that the Federal Government protects our frontier, and that our harbor bars are deepened, not to the draught of Morgan's ships, but to that of the commerce of the world. [Loud applause.]

The thanks of the Convention were unanimously voted to the retiring officers.

On motion of Mr. Houston a Committee on Platform and Resolutions, composed of one delegate from each county, represented in the Convention was appointed by the chair, as follows: A. Siemering, Nat. Mitchell, B. Brucks, John K. Farrell, Mat. Usery.

On motion of Mr. Carson a committee of

five for the nomination of an Executive Congressional Committee for the ensuing two years was chosen as follows: W. H. Houston, C. Runge, John K. Farrell, Mat. Usery and Crispe Carson.

Adjourned to 2 P. M.

## EVENING SESSION.

The Convention re assembled at 2 p. m., when the following report was presented: We, the Committee on platform and resolutions, appointed by the chairman of the Republican convention of the 6th Congressional Convention, hereby propose the following platform:

1st. We, the Republicans of the 6th Congressional District of the State of Texas, having regard to the necessities of Western Texas, declare that in our nomination of a candidate for the representation of the people of this District, in Congress, we place the protection, development and welfare of our country above all partisan considerations, and pledge our candidate to labor assiduously for the common good.

2nd. We hereby charge the administration of Gov. Coke with a neglect, willful or ignorant, of the interests and rights of our section, and we charge that the Goliad Convention, by its endorsement of Gov. Coke, forfeited all claim on the part of its candidate to the support of the patriots and well-wishers of Western Texas.

3rd. We demand from the Federal Government the fulfillment of its contracted treaty obligations for the defence of our bleeding frontier and pledge our candidate, if elected, to use every proper effort to give effect to our demand.

4th. Whereas past experience has taught us that Western Texas cannot receive from the State Government the aid which is due to her, and necessary for the development of her natural resources, and believing that a division of the State will be beneficial for the promotion of her material interests, we do declare in favor of a division of the State.

5th. We are in favor of harbor and river improvements of the State.

6th. We oppose the fostering of monopolies by the officers of this State and the members of Congress.

7th. We sustain the President of the United States in his opposition and veto of the inflation bill, and favor a speedy return to specie payment.

**FORT WORTH, Sept. 4**—Mr. Cooper, of the firm of Cooper & Garner, contractors on the Texas and Pacific Railroad, is here. He proposes to the citizens of Fort Worth that if they will take thirty thousand dollars worth of the Harrison county bonds belonging to the Texas and Pacific Railroad Company, at fifty cents on the dollar, they will obligate themselves to complete the road and have the cars running here by the first day of March next, Gen. Dodge to furnish the rails as fast as the road is graded.

The merchants of Shreveport, La., propose to take bonds, also, at fifty cents on the dollar, and furnish provisions for the hands.

Eighteen thousand dollars were subscribed to-day, and the prospects are good for the remainder.

**AUSTIN, Sept. 5**—Ex-Gov. Davis never did pardon Billy Cotton, as reported some time ago. Cotton voluntarily returned to prison, and has been working on the Rusk tramway ever since, but will soon be clear—Gov. Coke having late last evening signed his pardon, considering the evidence insufficient.

**CORNICANA, Sept. 5**—Thos. Moore stole a horse that was hitched in front of the store of C. W. Jester, on yesterday about 12 o'clock. He was followed and caught twelve miles from here and brought into this city, tried before Judge Bright, found guilty, and bound over in the sum of \$500. All of this transpired within four hours from the time the theft was committed.

He will be sent to the Houston jail for safekeeping to-morrow.

Riley Sharpe, a negro, waylaid another negro in this place on Wednesday night and fired fourteen buckshot into his leg. He was arrested the next day in a well, where he had secreted himself, and bound over to await the action of the Grand Jury. He had an accomplice, who confessed to the commission of the deed, and gave evidence against Riley. They will be both taken to the Houston jail.

This will give three more inmates for the State Penitentiary without doubt.

The disposition of this people is to clean out the Aegean stables and to enforce the law to the conviction of all violators of it.

**AUSTIN, Sept. 5**—J. M. Phillips, Captain of the Bannock County Minute Company, reports capturing and turning over to the San Saba authorities Robt. Edwards and Monroe Waldrop, fugitives from said county.

He reports the capture, also, of Ben. Waldrop, who is said to be implicated in the murder of the deputy sheriff of Comanche county.

The money market here is stringent. The veteran bonds are selling at 68 cents; school warrants 50 cents; new warrants 40 cents.

**PARIS, Sept. 5**—Bazaine has gone to England.

**LONDON, Sept. 5**—At a meeting of the cotton spinners of Manchester, yesterday, it was decided that cigelars should be sent to the Lancashire mills, advising that work be limited to four days a week.

A special dispatch to the Times from Madrid says: Gen. Babola will remove from that city. General Morinez will be appointed Commander-in-Chief of the army, or Marshal Serrano will be styled Generalissimo with power to appoint Generals.

Don Corios has gone to Alsatia to meet the ex Duke of Parma.

The Carlists have picked up a sailor who probably deserted from the German man-of-war Albatross. They sent him across the frontier to the French authorities, by whom he was delivered to the German Consul at Bayonne.

A later account of the Austrian polar expedition, states that the explorers penetrated to 40° latitude.

The Times says the Marquis of Ripon has become a Roman Catholic. The announcement a few days ago, that he had resigned the Grandmastership of Freemasons, and that the Prince of Wales would temporarily succeed him, caused much excitement.

At noon, yesterday, the Great Eastern had paid out 1534 nautical miles of the Anglo-American cable. She was then in latitude 51 north 30, longitude 47 35 west. All was going on well.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 73.]  
AN ACT making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and for other purposes.

(Continued.)  
APACHES, KIOWAS, AND COMANCHES.

For seventh of thirty instalments; as provided to be expended under the tenth article treaty of October twenty-first, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, concluded at Medicine Lodge Creek, in Kansas, with the Kiowas and Comanches, and under the third article treaty of the same date with the Apaches, thirty thousand dollars.

For purchase of clothing, as provided in the same treaties, twenty-six thousand dollars.

For pay of carpenter, farmer, blacksmith, miller, and engineer, five thousand two hundred dollars.

For pay of physician and teacher, two thousand five hundred dollars.

For transportation of goods, four thousand dollars: Provided, That the foregoing stated appropriations for the Apaches, Kiowas, and Comanches shall be expended only in behalf of those Indians who go and remain upon reservations and refrain from hostilities.

ARICKAREES, GROS VENTRES, AND MANDANS.

For this amount, to be expended in such goods, provisions, and other articles as the President may, from time to time, determine, including transportation thereof, in instructing in agricultural and mechanical pursuits, in providing employees, educating children, procuring medicine and medical attendance, care for and support of the aged, sick, and infirm, for the help- less orphans of said Indians, and in any other respect to promote their civilization, comfort, and improvement, (including pay of one physician, one thousand five hundred dollars; one farmer, one carpenter, one engineer, and one blacksmith, at nine hundred dollars each; also, one teamster and one herder, at seven hundred dollars each per annum), eighty-five thousand dollars.

APACHES.

For this amount, to be expended and properly care for the Apache Indians in Arizona and New Mexico who have been or may be collected on reservations in New Mexico and Arizona, namely, for those in Arizona, three hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars; and for those in New Mexico, one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars, five hundred thousand dollars: Provided, That this appropriation shall be expended only in behalf of those Indians who go and remain upon said reservations and refrain from hostilities.

ARAPAHOS, CHEYENNES, APACHES, KIOWAS, COMANCHES, AND WICHITAS.

For subsistence of the Arapahos, Cheyenne, Apache, Kiowa, Comanche, and Wichita Indians, (and transportation of the same,) who have been collected upon the reservations set apart for their use and occupation, in the Indian Territory, three hundred thousand dollars: Provided, That this appropriation shall be expended only in behalf of those Indians who go and remain upon said reservations and refrain from hostilities: And provided further, That no troops shall be kept stationed on the reservation on which said Indians are located, but the northern line of Texas shall be guarded, so far as possible so as to prevent the Indians from roaming into that State or the whites from intruding on the Indian reservations, except such troops as may be necessary to preserve order.

ASSINABOINES.

For this amount, to be expended in such goods, provisions, and other articles as the President may, from time to time, determine, including transportation thereof, in instructing in agricultural and mechanical pursuits, in providing employees, educating children, procuring medicine and medical attendance, care for and support of the aged, sick, and infirm, for the help- less orphans of said Indians, and in every other respect to promote their comfort, civilization, and improvement, (including pay of one detective, nine hundred dollars; one cook, four hundred and eighty dollars; and two laborers, at six hundred dollars each,) thirty thousand dollars.

BLACKFEET, BLOODS, AND PIEGANS.

For this amount, to be expended in such goods, provisions, and other articles as the President may, from time to time, determine, including transportation thereof, in instructing in agricultural and mechanical pursuits, in providing employees, educating children, procuring medicine and medical attendance, care for and support of the aged, sick, and infirm, for the help- less orphans of said Indians, and in every other respect to promote their civilization, comfort, and improvement, (including pay of one blacksmith, one farmer, one carpenter, one teacher, and one detective, at nine hundred dollars each per annum; and one assistant teacher, at six hundred dollars per annum,) fifty thousand dollars.

CALAPOOIAS, MOLALLAS, AND CLACKAMAS OR WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

For last of five instalments of the fourth series of annuity, for beneficial objects, per treaty of January twenty-fifth, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, tenth article, five thousand five hundred dollars.

CHEYENNES AND ARAPAHOS.

For seventh of thirty instalments provided to be expended under tenth article treaty of October twenty-first, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, twenty thousand dollars.

For purchase of clothing, as per same article, fourteen thousand five hundred dollars.

For pay of physician and teacher, as per thirteenth article same treaty, two thousand five hundred dollars.

For pay of carpenter, farmer, blacksmith, miller, and engineer, as per same article, five thousand two hundred dollars.

For transportation of goods for the Cheyennes and Arapahos, five thousand dollars.

CHICKASAWS.

For permanent annuity in goods, per first article treaty of February twenty-fifth, seventeen hundred and ninety-nine, and tenth article treaty of April twenty-eighth, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, three thousand dollars.

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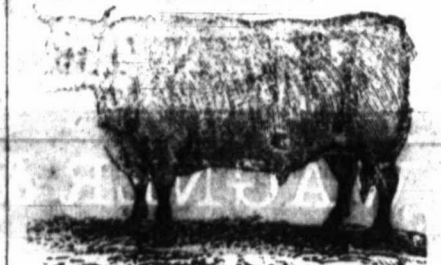
