MR. SCHLEICHER inform us that the railroads are all in harmony. This accounts for Morgan and Moses Taylor buying Coke's bonds.

THE OPINION of Attorney General Williams on the Louisiana rebellion, as published on our outside, will be read with interest by all our citizens who wish to reach a legal view of the case. Its reasoning is unanswerable.

THE question is, who comes nearest being a Know-nothing, Schleicher or Galvan? From Saturday night's performance, Schleicher is ahead. He was the only "know-nothing" at Goliad. Every body else knew just how he came to be nominated. He has not got it through his head yet.

The Democracy of different States held enthusiastic meetings, lit bonfires, and fired hundreds of guns, when the wires flashed the news of the outrage of their partizans in Louisiana. They went wild with delight over the success of their party in a murderous and treasonable wrong. But now, that the law has been enforced, the wrong righted, and the Republican State government restored, the Republicans are guilty of no such folly, even though their party was successful in the right. Comment is needless.

THE EXPRESS, laboring in the interests of the peace and welfare of Western Texas, and striving to allay the fearful bitterness of party strife which has almost ruined Arkansas, Louisiana, and other States, recommended that all parties support Hon. John Hancock. It defended him against the fierce assaults of the Bourbon Democratic press, whose nominee he was, because he was an original Whig and Union man. We are happy to know that the Washington Chronicle, Republican, copies our article, and approves its tone, while justly condemning "the old spirit" of secession and slavery which sought to ostracize him.

Morgan's Last Move.

Chas. Morgan has purchased the telegraph line between Brownsville and Brazos Santiago. This is significant and illustrative. He has had from the beginning of our State history the control of our whole Gulf coast, and of all the channels of our interior trade. His steamships have had the monopoly of all our sea-ports from the very beginning. During late years it became necessary to the firm maintenance of his monopoly to look a little to railroads. He secured the only railroad outlet from Indianola to the West, in order to cripple the construction of the road from Galveston to San Antonio, because he did not happen to own the latter. This road having been crippled, he stopped his road at Cuero, prepared to next move anywhere, or nowhere, as his interests might demand, in violation of all his pledges, and to the great injury of Western Texas. The move he made was to get hold of the Houston Ship Channel, so that he might control the new port of Houston, as well as the old one of Galveston, and play one against the other. This also gave him a firm alliance with the Central Railroad, another powerful monopoly of the trade of the centre of the State. His next move was to take the bonds of the State which Coke could not sell on the market. This gave him a strong alliance with Coke, in effort to break down the International and Great Northern Rail

the Central to own all the railroads in Texas, constituting a monopoly of every trade channel in this vast and rapidly growing State.

And now, last of all, as completing the vast control of the State, from New Orleans to Brazos Santiago, he buys the telegraph line from the latter place to Brownsville! All this the people of Texas can see. But Mr. Morgan has still far reaching designs which are not so apparent. He wants the same sort of control of the increasing trade with the ports of Mexico. He wants also a grand subsidy from Congress for a grand Mexican steamship system.

Therefore, he wants a Congress man, and sends his employe, Mr. Schleicher, to us, and bids us elect him!

Mr. Schleicher.

Since Mr. Schleicher's speech on Saturday night last, we feel disposed to treat him tenderly. It was an appeal to his old acquaintances, not to judge him harshly because of the company he is compelled to keep. He expressed himself in the most conservative way, and tried to trample the "lost cause" under his feet and bury all the animosities of the past. He did not say one word about Coke and the present Democratic State administration, and we are to infer that it was a disagreeable question. Does he repudiate Coke?

From Mr. Schleicher's speech we are forced to the reflection that his election to the U. S. Congress would be a harmless affair. The rampant Democracy would be more disappointed than Republicans, and there is no danger of his setting the Potomac on fire, Columbus Upson to the contrary notwithstanding. But is this the kind of a man the people of the West want in Congress? We think not.

TELEGRAPHIC.

United States Troops take Possession of the State House
NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 17.—The war is over, as shown by the following:

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 17. }
CIRCULAR.

John McEnery and D. B. Penn, styling themselves respectively Governor and Lieutenant Governor of the State of Louisiana, having informed the Department Commander of their willingness under the President's proclamation, to surrender the State property now in their possession, and to disband the insurgent forces under their command: Brevet Brigadier General J. R. Brooke, Lieutenant Colonel 3rd Infantry, is charged with the duty of taking possession of the arms and other State property. He will occupy the State house, arsenal, and other State buildings until further orders. He is hereby appointed to command the city of New Orleans until such time as the State and city governments can be reorganized. The present police force in the city, under the charge of T. Hoyle, will remain on duty and be responsible for the good order and quiet of the city until regularly relieved.

Formal Surrender to the Agent Federal Government.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 17.—At 6 p. m., in accordance with arrangements previously made, Gen. J. R. Brooke, accompanied by Lieutenants Wallace and Roe, went to the Executive office at the St. Louis Hotel. Immediately upon their entrance, Gen. Brooke was met by Govs. McEnery and Penn, and who, after shaking hands with him, introduced the three Federal officers to a number of prominent citizens present. Gov. McEnery then stated to Gen. Brooke that he gave him possession of the State Capitol and all other State buildings within the limits of the city. Brooke merely bowed in acceptance, and the Governor read to him the address.

At the conclusion of this address, Gen. Brooke was seated in the office and required from Lieut. Gov. Penn a statement of all records, etc., which were in the building when they took possession. Gov. McEnery and his followers then withdrew, leaving the capitol of Louisiana in possession of the military officers of the Federal Government. At 7 p. m. two companies of the Third Infantry marched down and were quartered in the building.

The Kellogg Government Reinstated—Kellogg Accepts.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 18.—The following explains itself:

To the Hon. Wm. P. Kellogg, Governor of the State of Louisiana:
SIR—In obedience to the orders of the President, I have the honor to inform you of the surrender of the insurgents, lately in arms against the State government, and to afford you the necessary military support to re-establish the State government. Very respectfully, your obedient servant,

Maj. Gen. W. H. Emory, U. S. A., Commanding Department of the Gulf:

SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of this date, informing me that you are prepared to afford the necessary military support to re-establish the State government. I will promulgate an Executive order in the official journal to-morrow morning, instructing all officers of the State who have been prevented from performing their duties to resume their functions at once. Owing to the disorganization of the police force in New Orleans, resulting from the recent conflict of arms, the commissioners of the metropolitan police will not be able to get their officers on their beats until to-morrow; therefore, I must request you to assume the maintenance of the peace and order of the city during the coming night. Kellogg's Official Order—The Metropolitan Police to be Reorganized.

The following orders was subsequently sent to the official journal:
Executive Order.

All State officers who have been prevented during the recent troubles from performing their duties, will immediately resume their official functions. The Board of Metropolitan Police will at once assemble and organize the police force of New Orleans, and assume the maintenance of the peace and order of the city.

The political conference is without result. Nothing will likely come of it.

Statement of Lieutenant Governor Penn
NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 18.—Lieutenant Governor Penn makes the following statement relative to the State government: The two governments have been organized since 1872. There was a meeting of the McEnery Legislature last session. In every respect, therefore, the status of the de facto and de jure governments were maintained. The troops engaged on the 14th instead of being insurgents, as styled in the President's proclamation, were the militia of the McEnery government, duly commissioned, etc.

They overthrew and drove from the soil of the State the officers of the de facto government, establishing the McEnery as a de facto, as well as a de jure government, under the strict letter of the law. Kellogg would not call on the United States to interfere, and his government being out of the State, and unable at the time of his application to maintain himself on Louisiana soil, but a refugee in the Custom House, the proclamation of the President has been obeyed. While the United States forces are in possession of the archives and property of the State, the McEnery government is still organized and simply deprived of its de facto functions by the United States authority and power. The McEnery government can assert its power, and it will be obeyed throughout the State; The Kellogg government can be reinstated by the United States forces, but can only maintain itself through that power. Penn then asks: Is this the republican form of government guaranteed to every State under the Constitution?

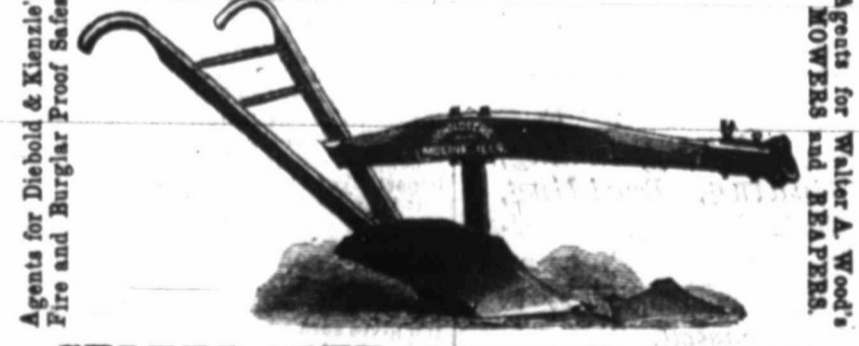

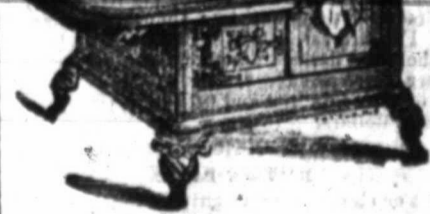
