It is evident that the democracy have not heard the news from Vermont and Maine. Col. Upson had to refer to the late election in Texas in order to illustrate the manner in which governors are elected under Republican rule.

The EXPRESS must be very piquant reading for the Galveston *Civilian*, from the quickening of its usual drowsy diction whenever commenting anything from this paper. It congratulates itself that we are "not Adam's EXPRESS, but Siemering's." Rather good—for the *Civilian*.

MR. SCHLEICHER, before this, had to carry the burden of Coke's mal-administration and Morgan's odious anti Western monopoly; now he has to carry the additional burden of Penn and McEnery's bloody, treasonable, and disastrous rebellion. Will the Atlas like shoulders of Col. Upson's "giant" be sufficient for all this? We think not.

We are gravely informed by the Democratic Candidate for Congress in this District that "States Rights" is the great fundamental, undying principle of the Democratic party, and that as the trees raise their heads again after the storm has passed, so the State rights doctrine, again begins to erect its mischievous head above the political arena, the war which it created having subsided. State rights, as interpreted by the Democratic party, inevitable leads to the right of secession. It led the country into the late civil war. It is the only danger that threatens the nation to-day.

Had Grant checked the impatience of Coke and his hungry set when they besieged the Capitol, and by military force compelled them to wait until the terms of their predecessors expired; or sustained Brooks in Arkansas when he dislodged Baxter; or sent troops into North Carolina and Mississippi to secure fair play at the ballot-box, the peace would have been better kept. But the Republican party would be compelled to meet the cry of military interference in the affairs of the South. Now Louisiana has illustrated the let us-alone doctrine so forcibly that we shall hear a different tune next November: We see before us the outstretched corpse of the Democratic party; its throat cut from ear to ear, by its friends!

THE DAILY TIMES is the name of a new Republican paper published at Denison, Texas, which has just reached us. It is very small in size, but very well edited, and filled with short and interesting articles. We place it on our exchange list with pleasure, and wish it abundant success. N. R. Baker is the editor.

Like the EXPRESS, it supports Throckmorton for Congress, even going so far as to place his name at the head of its editorial columns. At the same time it contains a call from Hon. H. L. Ray, chairman of the Republican Executive Committee of third District for a Convention to meet in Denison on the first of October, "for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Congress, or for consultation," etc.

The Democratic papers are denouncing Gov. Kellogg of all sorts of crimes, yet they cannot mention one which has anything to sustain it. He is an intelligent, accomplished and amiable man, and has labored with great zeal and success to extricate the State from the corruption and heavy taxation imposed by his predecessor, Warmoth, who feuded the Democrats against him. LOOK out for more thunder for Galvan from the North and East in a few days: The New Braunfels Zeitung fired the first columbiad.

The San Marcos Free Press comes to us greatly enlarged, and improved in every way. It is now a very handsome paper. It is also industriously, ably, and tastefully edited. We are glad to observe such signs of prosperity in this paper, because it is moderate, conservative and patriotic, and free from the miserable partisan clamor and ferocity so common, and yet so hurtful to the best interests of society and country.

The Fredericksburg Sentinel says that Mr. Schleicher is a native German, and landed in Indianola in 1845 at the age of 22. He settled in San Antonio and won the confidence of all Western Texas by his ability as an engineer, and as a member of the Legislature of Texas. During the war he was a faithful friend to the now "Lost Cause" and still affiliates with Southern principles and Democracy in part and in toto. He also is one of the few native Germans in Western Texas who ever identified themselves with the cause of slavery, and became a slave-holder himself.

GREAT sorrow is expressed in Democratic journals over the death of Maj. Gourdain, S. B. Newman, Maj. Robin, and other estimable citizens, slain in the late rebellion in New Orleans. We sorrow for them also, but we sorrow most of all that such worthy men should have lost their lives in the act of treason and murder. But we sorrow still more for the men who lost their lives on the other side, in the discharge of their sworn duty.

The San Marcos Free Press learns that the Central railroad has engaged to transport cotton from that region for half the rates previously asked. It then adds: "So much for the influence of Luling. But Luling lost this time by being too slow." But we ask, who and what made Luling too slow? The answer is, Coke and Morgan, in stopping the International railroad, which crippled the Pierce railroad, to the great injury of San Marcos, Luling, San Antonio, and all the West. Shall we vote for the candidate of the huge monopoly indicated in this move of the Central?

The Austin Statesman makes some quotations from the EXPRESS in relation to the New Orleans treason and murders, and then has some maudlin twaddle about "a paper in a foreign State" that would say such things as we have said. We are not so much surprised to know that the position we occupy in the action with the law of public opinion of

the country, with truth and justice, and that it will be sustained by the verdict of history. The Statesman is not the only one that has been the abject slave of local and sectional prejudice and passion so long as to be unable to judge according to the plainest principles of morality. The papers and people who have sustained this outrageous treason and murder are prepared for any political crime, and no country's laws or liberties can be trusted in their hands.

THE NEW BRAUNFELS ZEITUNG has a full and candid article on the late Republican Convention in this city, its platform, and its nominee, Judge Galvan. We give its principles, as follows:

"If we correctly understand the proceedings of the Convention, we must truthfully confess that it was a meeting of men who had the welfare of their country more at heart than a mere victory of party views. Aye, it appears to us that a first and most successful step for the united action of all the liberal elements of the Democratic and Republican parties has been accomplished.

"Such a movement we shall support with all our heart, and the candidate who stands upon such a platform is our candidate, whether German, Irishman, or American.

"The platform, which we publish to-day, expresses our opinion concerning our home affairs in such distinct words that we accept it in all its particulars.

"Although a man stands on the Democratic platform who is not only a German, but a brave, capable, and honest man, whom personally we highly esteem, yet we say: This JEREMIAH GALVAN, whom we do not know, stands upon a platform consisting of planks of sound timber. And should they carry him to Washington in good health, and set him down in the Hall of Representatives, we say: "Good luck on thy journey, Jeremiah!" We have no objection.

"If the gentlemen Democrats have five Congressmen, it is but just and right that the Republicans should have at least one. It is not necessary for the Democrats to hold all the Federal offices, in addition to all the State offices. Too much won't work well, and will make the stomach sick.

"Then, for Congress from the 6th District, JEREMIAH GALVAN, of Cameron county!"

## TELEGRAPHIC.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 19.—About 9 o'clock this morning Gov. Kellogg returned from the Custom House to the Executive office in the St. Louis Hotel, taking possession.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 19.—In the examination in bankruptcy of Jay Cooke & Co., the evidence given by Jay Cooke shows, regarding certain purchases of Northern Pacific bonds, that proper credits were not given in the books of the firm for any such purchases.

LITTLE ROCK, Sept. 19.—Rinaldo Rinaldino is between the Hot Springs and the railroad station, where several stages were robbed. The ladies and invalids were unmolested.

FALL RIVER, Mass., Sept. 19.—Granite Mill No. 1, in this place, was burned this morning, just after the operatives had commenced work. It is said there was fearful loss of life.

Since the above was received, communication between New York and Fall River has been lost, probably owing to the fire.

BOSTON, Sept. 19.—In response to an offer to send aid to Fall River by the superintendent of the Fall River railroad, of this city, the following dispatch has been received:

FALL RIVER, Sept. 19.—J. R. Kinlock, superintendent—No help is required. The fire is under control. There are, probably some ten lives lost—mostly by jumping from fifth story.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 19.—Gov. Kellogg, and such other State officers as are now in the city, went down to the State House at ten o'clock this morning, and the military authorities formally delivered possession of the building to them, and furnished a military guard. The Secretary of State, Speaker of the House, Lieut-Gov. and Attorney General, are somewhere North, and it is understood that Gov. Kellogg has telegraphed for them to come back at once. He has also telegraphed to the members of Congress, who are all absent from the State, except Congressman Smith, requiring them to return at once to their respective constituencies.

Gov. Kellogg, yesterday, sent the follow-

ing to Congressman Sypher and Senator West: "I see by Western papers that you have severely criticized my leaving the State House. I left on Monday at the earnest solicitation of all our friends, the Lieutenant-Governor and Speaker of the House being absent from the State. An accident to me, they felt, would have made existing complications more desperate. None but colored militia was in the State House, and had they made any resistance they would have been burned out and massacred, the building being entirely indefensible. If our friends will come here and help us we will be very glad."

On last Saturday we paid strict attention to his speech, determined to be convinced as to his real merits, and every intelligent man who heard it must pronounce him a mere declamatory, Democratic orator of the old style, so hurtful to the country.

In 1861 it was just this class of Northern-Southern fire-eaters, whose more than natural Southern enthusiasm placed them in the lead in fanning the storm of civil strife, and whose prudence and discretion after the storm began, has spared them to this day to beat the air with their empty declamation.

**GOSHIP BAND.**  
For eleventh of twenty instalments, to be expended under the direction of the President in the purchase of such articles, including cattle for herding or other purposes, as he shall deem suitable to their wants and condition as hunters or herdsmen, per third article treaty of October twelfth, eighteen hundred and sixty-three one thousand dollars.

**SHOSHONES AND BANNOCKS, SHOSHONES**
