Platform of the Republican Party of the sixth Congressional District.

1st. TELEGRAPHIC.

NEW ORLEANS.
 NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 21.—The conference committee that have been holding daily sessions since Thursday last, had their final interview this afternoon. The object of the conference was to arrange for a joint supervision and control of the machinery of the November elections. Everything apparently progressed satisfactorily, until the question of the composition of the returning board was reached. This board, which is the key to the whole election scheme, consists of five members elected by the last Senate. The law provides that vacancies shall be filled by the remaining members of the board. It is proposed that those vacancies should be created, two of the vacancies to be filled by them, the other to be filled by a joint action of the parties, who should select some gentleman of irreproachable character, without regard to his party convictions. This proposition was positively declined by the Republican committee, and the conference committee finally adjourned without results.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 21.—General James Longstreet, commander-in-chief of Kellogg's army, says the State House and arsenal were surrendered for want of ammunition to defend them, and places the responsibility on Attorney General Field. General Judge Dibble, in a letter to the Picayune, says he fired two shots from a window in the Custom House at those who deliberately fired at him withstanding there looking out, but taking no part in the fight last Monday.

FOREIGN.
MADRID, Sept. 21.—The Iberia says the Duke of Parma, and Counts Caszete and Bari have had a conference with Don Carlos, at which it was agreed that Don Carlos should be the sole representative of the four Bourbon branches, with presumptive right to the French throne.
LONDON, Sept. 21.—It is rumored that the French government is endeavoring to induce the Bey of Tunis to retire the boundary line on the Algerian frontier, and is already erecting forts on coveted territory. England and Germany, it is also said, will protest against any change.
VIENNA, Sept. 20.—Commissioners from the United States are here, on their way to inspect the improvements in the navigation of the Danube.
PARIS, Sept. 21.—Pierre de Jour, the French dramatist, is dead.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Frederick Doekero, an American, who was arrested in Cuba by the Spanish authorities, and after detention there some time sent to Spain, has reached Santander. He has been landed, and it is said, cruelly incarcerated.
COPENHAGEN, Sept. 21.—The government of Denmark has directed its envoy at Berlin to ask an explanation from the German government in regard to the exclusion of Danish subjects from Schleswig.

What is Centralization?

We have heard a good deal about centralization; we have yet to see a single explanation of it from any source. It is a new catch word introduced into our politics, and is used with great facility by every democratic orator who chances to make a speech. The discoverer of this new political catchword has not yet been made known, but we think it can be traced to some foreign source, to some diseased brain, overburdened with too much contemplation of the European system of government.

The average Democratic orator gets as far in the explanation as to say; that the tendency of the Republican party is to centralize the powers of the government at Washington, or to make Grant a dictator. But this is about all we ever hear. A great deal of froth is expended over the word "centralization", and the public is left floundering in a maze of uncertainty as to what it all means. We are not told how the government might be centralized, or pointed to a single tangible evidence of such a design.

The first real and practical step towards centralizing the powers of government would be to restrict the right of suffrage—for instance to make property a necessary qualification for a voter, or some educational test. Either of these methods would be a step toward practical centralization, as the poor and unlearned would be deprived of the right to vote, and the rich and educated could readily shape the ends of government to their own benefit and the oppression of those who had no voice in the government. Another step would be a reduction of representation in Congress. The next would be to lengthen the terms of office and remove even from the privileged voting classes the burden of frequent elections. The next and final step would be the obliteration of all State governments, and the adoption of a system similar to that existing in France or England. If we are to believe the Southern Democracy at all sincere, the change of government from a Republic to that of a Monarchy, like England, or a military dictatorship like that existing in France, would just suit them.

Now we ask for the first sign of "Centralization", or a tendency on the part of the Republican party to centralize the government. In the first place, instead of restricting the right of suffrage, through its instrumentality the suffrage has been extended to the colored man, adding more than half a million free men to the army of voters; and the constitution has also been amended in order to secure not only this suffrage to the late slave, but securing to all citizens of the United States their rights of citizenship in every State. If this is centralization, then what shall we call the effort of the so-called Democratic party to restrict the suffrage to white men, and to leave the right of suffrage, the most sacred right of the citizen, to the whim of State governments?

In addition to the extension of the suffrage to every man in the Republic without distinction of race, color, or previous condition, the representation in the national Congress has been increased.

No effort has been made to do away with any department of the government. The Congress, elected directly by the people, make the laws, levy the taxes, and represent the people. Neither the courts nor the executive, are the laws, or the officers, appointed by their execution, and they possess more power than was possessed fifty years ago.

As long as the Congress of the United States and our present constitution remain intact, this talk about centralization is sheer nonsense, and its utterance no compliment to the good sense of any American citizen.

Forty years of Democratic rule finally culminated in the war of secession, and an attempt on the part of the slave States to enforce the State sovereignty or States rights doctrine, contended for by the Calhoun faction of that party. The terrible civil war resulted finally in the preservation of the Union, and the doctrine that we are one people, one nation, one Republic, is substituted for the secession principle. The initial declaration of the Constitution is now construed strictly and literally to mean just what it says: "We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

If there was any doubt about the intention of our fathers when they adopted this declaration, the people have settled it by putting down the Southern rebellion. Slavery was guarded by this same constitution, in explicit terms. It would be the height of folly for a Democratic State rights politician to claim, that slavery still existed because the doctrine of States rights still survived in their party platform, for slavery was the real object of solicitude on the part of Southern State rights politicians. There is nothing left for States rights, or State sovereignty to fight over, since slavery has perished and the right of American citizenship is established by the constitution, independent of State regulations.

The strict enforcement of the provisions of the constitution, serves to strengthen and concentrate the powers of government. The events of the last few years, the strain upon the Republic, has brought into action all the latent powers contained in the Constitution, but this is not centralization.

The area of freedom has been extended under republican rule, and the Union preserved, while the fact stands out in bold relief, that for forty years the Democratic party held the reins of government, and instead of building up and strengthening and perpetuating the Republic, ended its mission by the war for the perpetuation of slavery, and the dissolution of the Union. This was the result of forty years of decentralization. The lesson will not have to be repeated soon again. Nor will any intelligent American citizen be alarmed by the cry of "centralization", because the Constitution is enforced, and he is made to feel he is a citizen of the United States.

The Republican party has broadened the spirit and intent of our government, and as far as citizenship is concerned, thrown down the barrier of State lines and made our territory, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, from Maine to Texas one country. This is the "centralization" that has frightened the State Rights Democracy. The democratic theory is that the arm of the Federal Government is long enough to reach to the utmost limit of the earth to protect the American citizen, but too short to protect him within the bounds of his own country. The Republican theory and practice is that the arm of power can and must protect the citizen every where under the sun. This is the centralization, we hear of.

Letter from the Const.

GULF COAST, WESTERN TEXAS, }
September 6, 1874. }

Editor San Antonio Express:

The Republicans of these lower counties have only just heard of the Republican Convention to be held in your county on the 9th inst., and it is now too late, sparsely settled as we are, to call county conventions to send delegates; but nevertheless we are with you, heart and soul, and are perfectly satisfied to leave to the good judgment of our friends of old Bexar and its surroundings, the selection of our standard bearer in the coming contest.

The late convention of the center held at Goliad, shows plainly the divided front. Alas for the over-weening confidence of Gov. Stockdale! His pretensions were quite unceremoniously whistled down the wind, with others of the same genus, and an unknown man brought to

the front. I say unknown, for the rank and file of the Democracy here, declare they never heard of him before, and d—d if they'll vote for him.

Give us now, some sterling well known Republican for our nominee, and his election follows as night the day. We have plenty of them—Haynes, Powers, Siemering of the EXPRESS, Degener and others. We are apparently quiet down this way now. The excitement against the Mexican population has subsided for the present, except in the vicinity of San Diego, from whence we hear rumors of more or less outrage, and complaint of Capt. Wallace with his company of rangers, but we are a peaceable people compared with other parts of the State.

The Corpus Christi & Rio Grande R. R. will be built, so say the leading men of that enterprise, and when finished, will help civilize that benighted region, known here as out West, a consummation devoutly prayed for by all good people this way.

Corpus Christi is flourishing like a green bay tree, the steam ships of the Morgan line now run directly there, and no longer pay subsidy to Rockport, which little hamlet is in the sea and yellow leaf.

We hear nothing recently of the unhappy feud in DeWitt county, except that the arrest of Gov. Coke's Washington County Guards to that locality, had created a fourth party, which includes nearly the entire county, who do not like their soil to be invaded by a set of irresponsible outsiders. No wonder Col. Fortis of your city refused to endorse the administration of Gov. Coke.

Grant Telegraphs Gov. Brown of Tennessee—He Expounds the Law.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—The President this evening sent the following telegram to Gov. Brown, of Tennessee:

EXECUTIVE MANSION, }
Sept. 19, 1874. }

Hon J. C. Brown, Governor, Nashville:

SIR—Your dispatch of yesterday has been received and referred to the U. S. District Attorney for the Western District of Tennessee for a report, as there is no official information of his proceedings here. When his report is received I will give you a more definite answer or have the Attorney General do so. I will state, however, that it is very gratifying to know that the State authorities of Tennessee are disposed to suppress and punish a class of lawless acts so dangerous to life and so opposed to every political, financial and moral interest of the State; but the Constitution makes it my duty to enforce the acts passed by Congress, and Congress has passed laws giving the United States jurisdiction in such cases as are referred to in your dispatches. No special order has been given to the Federal officials in Tennessee, further than the circular of September 3, of the Attorney General, which is general in its nature, and constitutes instructions to all marshals and district attorneys wherever violations of said acts may occur. I will add that the State and General Governments, as you are well aware, may have concurrent jurisdiction over the same of force, as for example, in case of counterfeiting, and the action of the State authorities in such cases does not prevent the General Government from proceeding against the offenders. FALL RIVER, Sept. 19.—The loss in the burning of the Granite Mills is a half million dollars. The operatives in the spooling room on the fifth story were panicked and thirty were killed. The injured and dying are many more.

A FLOOD OF RAIN fell this morning by the space of two hours, which, in addition to the long-continued previous rains, threaten to drown out everything. Hastily riding down to the office about ten o'clock from a half mile to three quarters up Flores street, with the margin of the San Pedro ditch on our left, and the San Pedro itself in full view on our right, the signs of a considerable inundation were already apparent. The ditch was overflowing its banks nearly everywhere, and the pleasant residences, with the ditch in their front, and between them and the street, with its blue waters so beautiful, refreshing, and convenient and dry, hot weather, now had many of their yards overflowed. Boys and girls were disporting themselves like young ducks in the flood at their doors, and the little ones were looking with an eager desire for the time to arrive when they also should be large enough thus to enjoy themselves.

The San Pedro, which, in its normal condition, is, at that distance, entirely invisible,—a mere tiny thread of water, coursing gently between its green banks—was a broad stream, filling all the little valley adjacent, and seeming suddenly ambitious of putting on the airs of its big sister, the San Antonio.

And still, as we write, the rain continues at intervals, pouring down in sudden and tremendous showers. And still, the whole horizon is overcast with a vast rain cloud, thick, dark, and watery, indicating that the end is not yet. If this state of things continues much longer, we shall most probably have one of those floods which, at intervals of many years, visit San Antonio, and when the river, breaking over the numerous short curves which mark its winding course through the city, pours across the streets in every direction. Commerce street, just West of the EXPRESS office, is one of the points where such a thing is likely first to occur, and where, in times past, great damage has been done to property. We trust such a thing may not occur now, but the prospect for it is certainly very strong.

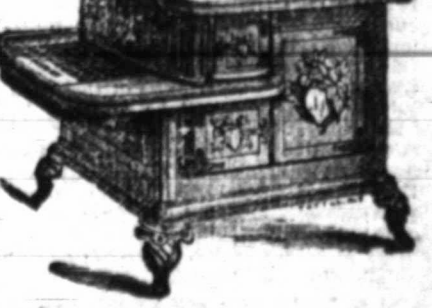

Provided, that the President may withhold the said supplies from said Indians, or any band thereof, until they shall consent to remain north of the Niobrara and outside of Wyoming, if he deems it expedient to do so.

For pay of physician, five teachers, one carpenter, one miller, one engineer, one farmer, and one blacksmith, per thirteenth article treaty of April twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, ten thousand and four hundred dollars.

For second of three instalments, for the purchase of seed and agricultural implements, to be furnished to heads of families or lodges who shall engage in farming, as per eighth article treaty of April twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, fifteen thousand dollars.

For industrial school at the Santee Sioux agency, three thousand dollars.

For transportation, and the necessary expenses of delivering goods, to be purchased for the different bands of the Sioux Indians, under treaty of April twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, seventy-five thousand dollars.

SIoux, Sisseton and Wahpeton, AND SANTEE SIOUX OF LAKE TRAVERSE AND DEVIL'S LAKE.

For this amount, being the second of ten instalments of the sum of eight hundred thousand dollars named in a certain agreement, which agreement is hereby confirmed, made by the commissioners appointed by the Secretary of the Interior, under the provisions of the act of June seventh, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, with the Sisseton and Wahpeton bands of Sioux Indians of their claim to or interest in the land described in the second article of the treaty made with them February nineteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, the same to be expended under the direction of the President for the benefit of said Indians, in the manner prescribed in said treaty of eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, as amended by the Senate, said amendment as amended having been ratified by the Indians, as provided by act of February fourteenth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, eighty thousand dollars.

YANKTON TRIBE OF SIOUX.

For sixth of ten instalments, (second series,) to be paid to them or expended for their benefit, commencing with the year in which they shall remove to and settle and reside upon their reservation, per fourth article treaty of April nineteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, forty thousand dollars.

For transportation of goods, one thousand and two hundred dollars.

SIoux AT THE FORT PECK AGENCY.

For this amount, to be expended in such goods, provisions, and other useful articles as the President may, from time to time, determine, including transportation in instructing in agricultural and mechanical pursuits, in providing employees, educating children, procuring medicines and medical attendance, care for and support of the aged, sick, and infirm, and in any respect to promote their civilization, comfort, and improvement (including storekeeper, blacksmith and carpenter, at nine hundred dollars each per annum; assistant storekeeper and one cook, at six hundred dollars each per annum; and three laborers, at six hundred dollars each per annum) one hundred and fifty thousand dollars; but this appropriation shall be expended for the benefit of such portions of said bands only and for such time as they maintain friendly relations with the United States.

WALLPAHPEE TRIBE OF SNAKE INDIANS.

For third of ten instalments, to be expended under the direction of the President, as per seventh article treaty of August twelfth, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, one thousand two hundred dollars.

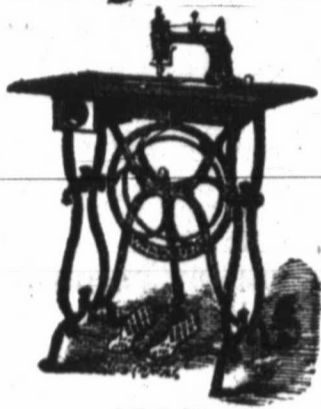
